PRESIDENT CAN CHANGE SENTENCE, RULING OF COURT

WASHINGTON, May 31.—The President, without the consent of the convict, can change a death sentence into life imprisonment, the Supreme Court held today in a case from Alaska in which Vinco Perovich was convicted of murder.
