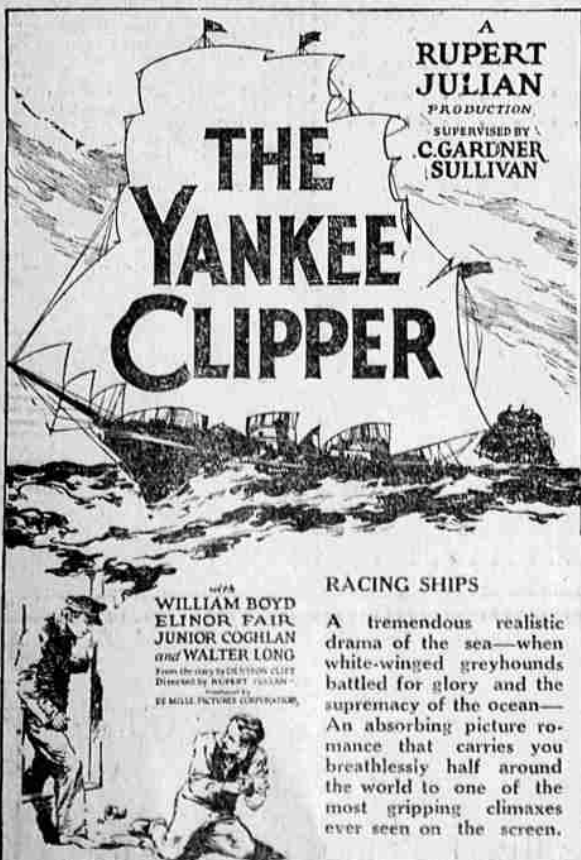

CONSERVATORY
MUSIC-ART TO
END THIS WEEK

Mrs. Chas. S. Heinline Will
Conduct Private Studio
in Future.

ESTABLISHED 8 YEARS

Department Teachers Will
Open Own Studios
of Music Here
in Fall.

Announcement by Mrs. Charles S. Heinline that the Heinline Conservatory of Music and Art is being closed is greatly regretted by the public of Roseburg as well as music patrons. Mrs. Heinline intends to open a private studio and will teach only her own pupils in the future, devoting her entire time to their instruction. During the past two years Mrs. Heinline has not been in the best of health and her decision to have a private studio instead of the supervision of some of the heavy work involved with such a large institution. Mrs. Heinline, however, intends to open a conservatory again in a few years and will not entirely retire from public work. The entire staff of teachers in the conservatory, with the exception of Walter S. Germain, instructor of the band instrument department who has accepted a position at the coast, and Miss Dorothy Winston intends to return to Roseburg in the fall to open their own private studios and instruct individually. The conservatory has been in existence for eight years, being founded by Mrs. Heinline, who has

entirely supported the institution herself. It is the only conservatory of several departments in the city and it has filled a place which will be keenly missed. The conservatory has afforded students of music and art the finest of opportunities to study with the best of teachers, and has established a high standard of music.

Mrs. Heinline has conducted a wonderful school of music which has won high praise by writers in various magazines of music. She has made arrangements to move to new quarters on the opposite side of the hall to the conservatory, and in this week being established in the new studio. During the summer she intends to keep open her new studio, teaching her pupils during the morning hours, and will close the first part of August until the opening of the fall season. Mrs. Bertha Hodge, instructor of the dramatic art and public speaking department, is remaining during the summer with Mrs. Heinline and will instruct. In the fall she will probably open her own private studio.

Miss Naomi Scott, who has been instructor of the stringed instruments department this year, is leaving to spend the summer in Portland and will return in the autumn to open a studio. She will instruct in violin and other instruments.

Miss Lucille Sappington, instructor in the Dumbier department, will go to Washington, Wash., for the vacation period. In the fall she will open her own studio in Roseburg, instructing in the Dumbier method.

Mrs. Charles Brand, who has been with the conservatory for a number of years, is leaving her present quarters in the conservatory and will teach private lessons in the future, again opening at the close of the summer season.

Mrs. Ida Holdridge has had charge of the art department for the past year and a month ago moved her teaching quarters to her home, where she will continue to do private work.

Walter S. Germain, the only one who will not return to Roseburg in the fall, is leaving Friday for Montreal, from where he will sail for London. Mr. Germain had four years experience with the military bands in Canada, which entitles him to a free course at the Nodell college in London, a college for band masters only. Following his course at the college, he will return to the states in the autumn and will go to Marshfield where he has been offered a position of supervisor of music in the city schools.

Mr. Germain has had charge of the instruction in the band instruments department for the past two years and also has been director of the boys' band. He has made a fine organization of the latter and his influence will be missed. He hopes to make some arrangement whereby he can be in Roseburg on Saturdays to instruct the band.

ceased the casualty list had mounted to three known dead and more than twenty wounded, some of them seriously. Many were removed to hospitals.

Dead Line Fixed
Colonel Sumner L. Lowry is in charge of the state troops now guarding the jail. His force will be augmented by several additional companies ordered to report to him today. The soldiers are armed with machine guns and teargas bombs. They have taken up positions inside the jail and in a negro church building across the street. A roped off area to hold the mob at least two blocks away from the jail on all sides has been established and is being continually patrolled by the guardsmen.

Early this morning the mob again became quiet but had not entirely dispersed and after last night's experiences, officers would make no prediction that the siege was at an end.

continue along in good shape for the canneries.

"The black cherry is bringing a high price on the fresh market. This is because of the frost and the growers are receiving 10 cents or better. The outlook for Royal Azores is not so promising as the growers are receiving only 5 cents. Other crops will maintain normal prices. The California apricots opened at 15 to 16 cents per pound to the growers for dried fruit or \$50 per ton. There is an overproduction of peaches in California—more than the market can absorb and it will influence all fruits. The crop is about 75 per cent of last year and they do not know what to do with it.

"The apple market will be sustained and this crop seems to have staged a comeback. The greatest outlet for apples last year was in the foreign market, the highest price being paid in Germany. Prunes went on the market as an early export and the packers cleaned up their stock, there being less than 1900 tons in the packers' hands at the present time. A fair price for prunes is promised the growers this year.

"The canning business is very sick," said Mr. Norton, "especially in the east. Overproduction of corn and peas last year made it necessary to turn out too large a pack and the surplus had to be thrown on the market at a loss. It has caused a demoralized situation affecting all crops.

"The crops in the east are very late. The New York apples are just in the blossoming period and other crops are similarly late. The floods in the Mississippi valley will have little or no effect on the coming crop. The flood will not affect the sugar situation, as has been said, although the price of sugar will be higher due to the fact that Cuba is limiting its production, the president having issued an edict to that effect. While there were 116 mills operating at this time last year at present only 12 are running. Soon there will be a scramble for sugar and the price is bound to rise.

"Douglas county crops will bring about as much as they did last year in proportion to the amount raised. More drying room will be available for this year's prune crop and conditions are very favorable."

Mr. Norton's talk was applauded loudly by those who had gathered at the luncheon.

E. G. Kingwell, secretary of the Sutherland Chamber of Commerce, spoke from the standpoint of a real estate man and he offered some hot spots that kept his audience in close attention. "Let's get away from this petty jealousy existing in the various parts of the county and get together to boost our wonderful section to the outside world," he said. He urged lower freight rates as a means of encouraging the farmers and fruit growers. He said that the canneries needed lower rates and he told of the fight which the Sutherland Chamber of Commerce is waging to get a decision to that effect from the interstate commerce commission.

A large delegation of Roseburg citizens are planning to attend the Sutherland meeting next Wednesday.

At next week's forum luncheon, Prof. Vining will be the main speaker on the program.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—A revision of livestock rates between western producing points proposed to make effective today, has been blocked by an order of the interstate commerce commission.

The commission held the proposed revision would result in a substantial increase on most of the traffic affected and ordered the western railroads to maintain their present schedules until January 1, pending an investigation to determine the reasonableness of the new rates.

Illustrating the effect of the schedules which it suspended, the commission said that the livestock rates from St. Paul to Chicago on the present basis is 34 cents per 100 pounds, while the proposed rate would be 33 cents; from Sioux Falls to Chicago, a present rate of 34 cents per 100 would become 33 cents, while from Omaha the present rate of 36 cents would become 35 cents.
