RECEPTION TO LINDBERGH TO BE HUGE AFFAIR

Official functions be held in his honor before his departure for Cherbourg to embark on the U. S. S. Memphis, for home. It is likely, however, that he will pay a short visit to the Paris post of the American Legion tomorrow night, while the International League of Aviators expects him for luncheon.

No engagements for him have been made at the embassy, although the ambassador and his staff have been deluged with requests from Paris and the provinces.

3 Days in New York—NEW YORK, June 2.—The gigantic welcome arranged by New York for Captain Charles A. Lindbergh will be carried out, although Washington will be the first city to welcome the nation's hero back to America.

All the elaborate plans for what is intended to be one of the greatest reception in the history of the metropolis, will stand. Grover A. Whalen, chairman of the mayor's reception committee, said after a telephone conversation with Secretary of War Davis in Washington.

Lindbergh will fly the Spirit of

St. Louis from Washington to Miller Field, Staten Island, June 14.

He will cross the harbor on the city tug Macom, thru a lane of welcoming steamers and beneath a squadron of airplanes, from the battery he will parade up Broadway and receive an official welcome at City Hall. Then will follow a big parade up Fifth avenue to Central park, where Governor Smith will decorate him with the state medal of valor.

Captain Lindbergh will remain in New York three days, attending receptions and dinners, and on Friday, June 17, he is scheduled to fly to St. Louis, arriving there that afternoon.

Lindbergh, in a telephone conversation from London to New York with R. R. Blythe, one of the backers of his flight, said:

"I consider it a great honor to have received a personal invitation from President Coolidge to attend the reception in Washington. I cannot, however, overlook what the people of New York did for me before I started."

SAMMY MANDELL NOT LIABLE FOR DEATH OF BOXER

KANSAS CITY, June 2.—There is no basis for any criminal action against Sammy Mandell, lightweight champion, in connection with the death in the ring here last night of Steve Adams, Chicago boxer, Arthur J. Mellott, Wyandotte county attorney, announced today following an investigation.

A broken neck was announced as the cause of Adams' death by Dr. J. W. Hayward, county coroner. The boxer, naked, freely from the opening bell and after sharp inflicting in the second round Adams jumped back quickly from a clinch. His head struck the top rope and he slid to the floor. After a few convulsive movements he lay still. Referee Walter Bates counted him out.

When the seconds and the referee found Adams unconscious, they called for a physician. Dr. D. Mable, medical examiner for the state boxing commission, jumped into the ring and supervised administration of artificial respiration. Firemen brought a pulmotor but after 15 minutes Adams was pronounced dead.

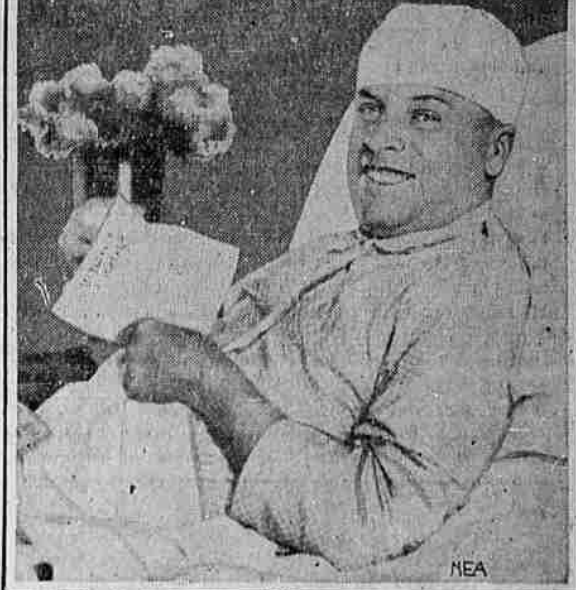
