SUPPLIES RUSHED TO REFUGEES, TWO DAYS SANS FOOD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW ORLEANS, La., June 2—Supplies were being rushed today to between 300 and 400 people in the Woodside and Odessa sections on the west bank of the Atchafalaya river as a result of a report received at Baton Rouge flood relief headquarters that they have been without food for two days.

The engineers' corps boat Chocoma was dispatched to the scene last night with food for the refugees and enough feed and forage for 1,000 head of livestock. Additional supplies will be sent from Baton Rouge today.

The section is approximately 140 miles northwest of New Orleans on the opposite side of the Mississippi. Flood waters, falling more rapidly in the upper Atchafalaya basin today, were rising at the mouth of the river at Morgan City. A naval aviator who flew over the city yesterday reported that only two blocks in the city were above water. The water was dropping sharply at other places, however, and he reported that Breau Bridge and St. Martinville were almost free of the flood and that New Iberia was emerging rapidly.

The situation on the lower Mississippi was unchanged. The gauge at New Orleans showed a further drop of .2, now reading 18.6.

NEW YORK, June 2—The same zeal for hard work that marked Pete Latzo climb to the world's welterweight championship characterizes his training campaign for defense of his title tomorrow night at the Polo Grounds against Samuel Lazzaro of Baltimore, known to the ring as Joe Dundee.

RELIEF WORK IN WAKE OF LOSS OF 108 LIVES ASEA

MANILA, June 2—The storm which caused the sinking of the inter-island steamer Negros off Romblon Island Sunday with a probable loss of 108 lives, abated today, giving rescue workers an opportunity to aid the few survivors of the wreck who were encamped on the Bohol peninsula. Severino de Guzman, chief officer of the Negros, who commanded the life boats in the rescue, said his ship sank in three minutes. The confusion as a result of the sudden approach of disaster caused a panic and the passengers stampeded for the life boats, he said.

T-B STUDY AMONG KLAMATH INDIANS WILL SOON BEGIN

A survey to secure statistics showing the presence or amount of tuberculosis among the Indians on the Klamath Indian reservation, is to be undertaken at once by the government working jointly with the national tuberculosis association, and a corps of physicians and nurses are now enroute to Klamath Falls to begin the work. The survey of the several hundred Indians, men, women and children, will probably take all of a month, and the government will act according to the findings, following up the first survey in a short time, when all affected Indians will be put under observation and treatment. In past times, tuberculosis has been one of the worst enemies of Indians, their intermarrying and unsanitary conditions being conducive to the development of the disease. Under present-day government supervision on the reservations, the disease has been greatly arrested, but cases of it are still found, when prompt treatment by the Indian department keeps it under control.

Doctor G. C. Bellinger, head physician of the Oregon State Tuberculosis hospital, will be in the party making the survey, as well as a physician from the National Tuberculosis association at New York, C. A. Statistichan, and a corps of nurses from Portland will assist. Miss Grace Millgate, field demonstrator nurse of the Oregon State Tuberculosis association, who has been in Roseburg the past month assisting the county health department, leaves today for Klamath Falls having been delegated for this work.
