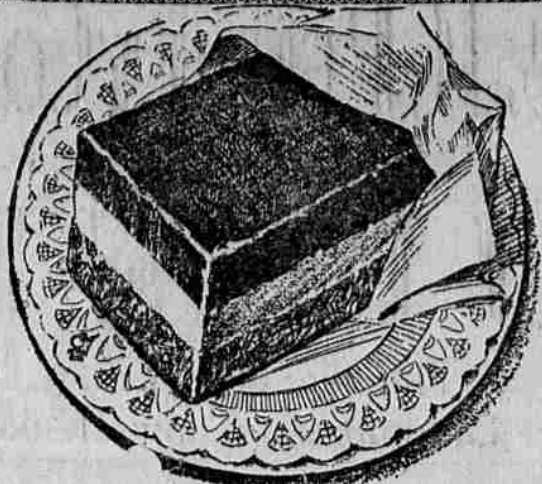

CLUB WOMEN ON RECORD TO CURB FIREARMS TRADE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., June 3. —The club women of America today went on record as opposed to an indiscriminate traffic in firearms, as favoring establishment of a nurses' corps in the public health service, "a more equitable proposition of service to the farm home and home maker" through demonstration work under the Smith-Lever law, and recognition of the classification "home maker" in census reports.

Resolutions on these subjects were adopted at today's session of the biennial council of the general federation of women's clubs. A motion asking earnest cooperation

of club women in giving relief to flood sufferers was also passed. The Indian again came in for consideration in a resolution of Mrs. S. A. Atwood of Riverside, Calif., which was tabled yesterday. Removed from the table, the resolution underwent amendments which removed a statement that "many complaints have been made by responsible persons and organizations charging improper and imprudent administration of Indian property by the bureau of Indian affairs."
