Migratory Salmon Aided by Water Ladders

Removes Extermination Danger Created by High Dams of Power Companies.

Although it may be hard to teach an old dog new tricks, it was apparently to teach them to that sporty fish, the salmon. For, as is pointed out by Robert Bradon in an article in this week's Liberty, engineers are striving to devise a plan by which salmon can be trained to climb fish ladders 80 feet high in their annual migrations up Pacific coastal rivers to their spawning grounds.

Unless this can be done, the writer explains, it is feared that the dams erected in the rivers for hydro-electric plants will prevent these spawning migrations and eventually kill off most of the salmon.

"Already," the writer points out, "the Pacific salmon have been trained to climb 42-foot. The highest fish ladder in the northwest is that high, and it is in the Willamette river at Oregon City falls. The magnificent fish used to climb these falls without aid from man, but when a paper company built its plant and diverted the flow, the water became too shallow for the fish to make the climb, so artificial steps were blasted in the falls to enable the fish to ascend them by easy stages. A salmon can climb straight up a falling water to a height of fourteen feet.

"How far the salmon will travel upstream is an unanswered question. Some experts believe that a salmon not only returns to the river in which it was spawned, but to the same place in that river; to which its ancestors came. Pacific salmon have been caught more than 2500 miles from the mouth of the Yukon."
