RADIO STATION KPO TO INSTALL PIPE ORGAN

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6.—A great pipe organ which has been designed and constructed especially for broadcasting, will soon be a

feature of KPO's main studio in the Hale Brothers building. This instrument will cost more than \$25,000 and will be the largest radio studio organ in the country.

It was built in the laboratories of the Welte Organ company under the specifications of Ida Waldrop, the station's official organist. The installation of the instrument in the KPO studio has required the work of several men steadily for more than six weeks. The organ contains more than 1000 separate pairs of wire for carrying the electrical currents to the magnets which will operate the keys, pedals and stops.

Waldrop will play his first concert on the new organ probably some time in June.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6.—Three Zuni Indians, Melika, Hamon and Chechee, picked as the toughest and best of the longer distance runners of the Zuni reservation near Gallup, N. M., have been entered by Mike Kirk, noted Indian trader of Manvelita, N. M., to compete in the Redwood highway Indian marathon, which will be started from the civic center of San Francisco by Mayor James Rolph Jr., at 10 a. m. Tuesday, June 13.

Announcement of the participation by New Mexico in the Redwood highway marathon was made today by Tom P. Brown, special representative of the Redwood Empire association, which is sponsoring the event, on his return today from Los Angeles where he closed arrangements with Kirk to bring the three Zunis 1200 miles from their desert home to run under the colors of the Eureka, Whitts and "Marvelous" Marls.

BEST PITCHING WINNING GAMES IN BIG LEAGUE

Major league teams with the best pitching are the ones that are getting the most victories at this stage of the pennant races.

Pitching weakness was demonstrated by two teams at once in the closing game of the Giants-Reds series yesterday at Cincinnati which went to the Reds by a 10-9 count. Of nine pitchers who took the mound, none could stop the hitting. Tight twirling was seen at St. Louis where Brooklyn pitching won half a double header with the Cardinals. In the first game Alexander demonstrated the champion's own pitching strength by granting only eight hits for an 8 to 0 shutout. But in the second bill, Donk of the Robins allowed five safeties in a 6 to 1 victory.

In a 7 to 0 whitewashing administered by the Chicago Cubs to the Boston Braves, Blake allowed but five hits, and Zachary of the St. Louis Browns pitched a six-hit game for his teams third straight over the Senators, 9 to 1.

The only exception to the rule that tight pitching wins, was the 5 to 3 victory of the New York Yankees over the Detroit Tigers who out-hit them, 12 to 6. However, one of the half dozen hits made off White Hill was Babe Ruth's 17th homer of the year.

WRESTLING FAKES ARE EXPOSED AT ILLINOIS PROBE

CHICAGO, June 6.—William Demetral, a professional wrestler for 20 years, testified today that he was forced to put up \$5,000 and give a quit claim deed to his home in Chicago as a guarantee that he would not throw Ed (Strangler) Lewis in their two matches decided at Cleveland within the last year.

Demetral's startling revelation was made at the resumption of the legislative inquiry into the Illinois state athletic commission and the boxing commission in Chicago. Demetral testified that he was a member of the ring in control of wrestling, that he engaged in fake matches but finally broke with the ring after his second match with Lewis.

SHEVLIN-HIXON ROAD BUY EASES O. T. EXTENSION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—Confirmation of purchase of 2 1/2 miles of logging railroad from the Shevlin-Hixon Lumber company to be made part of the extension south from Bend by the Oregon

Trunk has been received from Ralph Hadd, president of the Great Northern, which is financing the extension. This brings the extension to within 45 miles of Paulina and eliminates some of the most difficult building on the route. Some engineering work will be necessary on curves and grades and heavier steel and more ties will be required. It was said by Oregon Trunk officials.

Negotiations between President Bull and President Sproule of the Southern Pacific for joint use of tracks between Paulina and Bend, and the joint use of Shalimar line trucks are to be started, and upon the result will depend whether the Oregon Trunk will build the "D" route independently to Klamath Falls from Paulina.

A. J. Witchell, chief engineer of the Oregon Trunk, who has returned from central Oregon, said that satisfactory progress had been made in preliminary work on the rights of way.

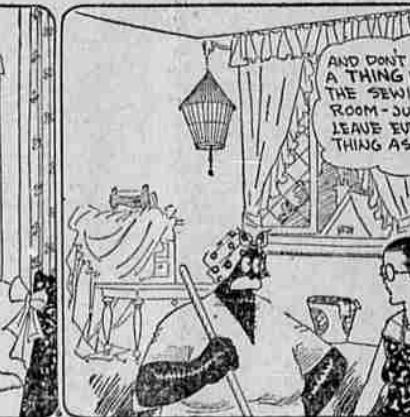
John Louis Tabor, Columbus, Ohio, master of the national grange, delivered the commencement address and Governor I. L. Patterson extended greetings to the graduates.

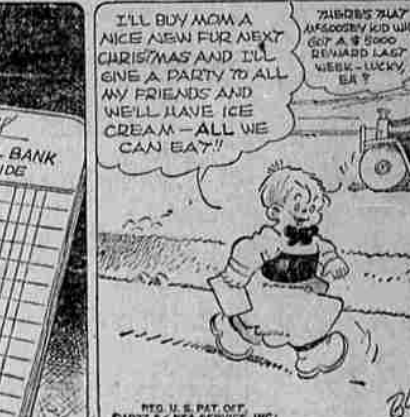
