Langley Medal Struck
WASHINGTON, June 6.—Charles A. Lindbergh today was admitted to the rare company associated with Samuel Pierpont Langley in the founding of aviation.

The Smithsonian Institution awarded him the coveted Langley medal, which in the 19 years since its establishment has been given to only four others, all permanent stars in the science of aeronautics. They were Orville and Wilbur Wright, Glenn H. Curtiss and Gustave Eiffel, a Frenchman.

Lindbergh's citation reads: "For his magnificent non-stop flight from New York to Paris."
The tie for the medal is kept in the Paris mint and it is expected the presentation will be delayed. Chief Justice Taft probably will make the formal award at the ceremony.

AUTO SERVICE ACT
OF OREGON TAKEN
TO CIRCUIT COURT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., June 6.—The United States Automobile Service club has brought suit in the circuit court for Multnomah county against Attorney General Van Winkle and District Attorney Stanley Myers of Multnomah county in an effort to have declared unconstitutional senate bill 220 of the 1927 session, providing for the licensing and regulation of automobile service clubs.

A temporary restraining order has been granted.

The complaint alleges that the act, which became effective May 28, is a violation of both the federal and the state constitutions in that it grants a monopoly to a competitor and that it impairs the obligation of contracts, both between the club and the state, by virtue of the corporate laws and between the club and its members.

The only competitor of the club in Oregon, says the complaint, is the Oregon State Motor Association. The portion of the act which is attacked mainly is that providing that a required \$25,000 deposit with the state treasurer, or a bond of equal amount, need not be given if a club can prove that it has been in operation in the state over five years and that its membership exceeds 5,000.

This, it is alleged, is a discrimination against the plaintiff, which claims a membership of about 3500.

PORTLAND CHILD
OF 6 TELLS TALE
OF KIDNAPPING

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—Rose Wagner, 6, was kidnapped from Portland streets yesterday, to escape from her captor a short time later and he returned safely home.

Rose was playing when she was suddenly picked up and taken away by a shabbily dressed man driving an old car.

Two hours afterward Rose was returned home by Theodore Kurrock, who said he picked her up on the Lincoln road. Rose said she had escaped her captor when he went out to repair a tire that went flat.

Rose, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Wagner, was apparently unharmed upon her return home. Detectives today are investigating.

GREATER OREGON
ASSN. ASKS DEFEAT
INCOME TAX PLAN

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—The Greater Oregon association, in a statement today, urged the electorate to vote against the state income tax at the special election June 28. The statement was signed by the executive committee consisting of J. O. Elrod, chairman; J. H. Frank, treasurer; R. L. McLeary, Ira F. Powers, John B. Yeon, John H. Burdard and W. S. Babson.

It contended that an estimated state deficit was only a matter of bookkeeping and that expenditures of the state should be curtailed instead of more revenue being collected.

Jury examinations. A. L. Gall, of Medford, a former postmaster, called to the box, under defense questioning said he did not regard the defendant as "an innocent man," but maintained that he could be impartial, that his opinion could be overcome by evidence, but did not think he was not qualified to serve. The defense challenged for cause, the state desisting.

The court questioned Gall upon the doubt in his mind and Gall was excused.

Norman Ort, rancher, Prospect, was next drawn. He had no objections to the death penalty or circumstantial evidence, but held fixed opinions on the guilt or innocence of the defendant, that evidence could not be set aside. Ort was excused by the court upon the state's objection.

J. N. Wilson, realtor, Medford, was next called and was unopposed to capital punishment, and strong circumstantial evidence and held no opinions.

The ventriloquist, queried by the defense denied that the prosecution had not undertaken to ascertain his views within the last few days. Wilson was tentatively selected as a juror.

J. N. Dennis, of Ashland retired, the next ventriloquist, knew none of the slain trainmen. He had no scruples against capital punishment or circumstantial evidence and no opinion that would affect his verdict.

Dennis, under defense queries, said he could give a verdict in accordance with the evidence and after a long series of questions, was tentatively selected as a juror.

Frank H. Dressler, farmer of Medford, next questioned, felt the opinions he had formed prejudiced him as a juror and he was excused by the court.

Otto Winter, retired merchant was next drawn. For 35 years he has lived in Ashland. He declared he held fixed opinions, he could not discard. He was excused.

Charles A. Whitlock, merchant of Medford, was called and excused because of fixed opinions.

William R. Potter was excused on account of his age and C. W. Shields, merchant of Medford, was called as court recessed at noon.

The state questions dealt with prejudices against the death penalty and circumstantial evidence; the defense questions upon the thoroughness of circumstantial evidence.

The court, after the morning recess, excluded three registered pharmacists from service. They were C. C. Whitwood of Jacksonville; W. N. Polley of Ashland and M. B. Jarmin of Medford, the latter in the box. His place was filled by Miles Cantrill, farmer of Rich.

De Autremont viewed the morning session with but casual confidence. His mother sat by his side, but his father, Paul de Autremont, of Eugene, Ore., was not in court.

BOOSTERS URGE
COMPLETION OF
ROOSEVELT ROAD

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—Touting automobile horns, a caravan of delegates to a meeting of the Roosevelt Highway association stormed Portland today and after luncheon at the Chamber of Commerce, they held a meeting at which arguments were presented for hastening work on the picturesquely coasting thoroughfare.

The highway is completed except for a stretch of approximately 70 miles between Newport and Gardiner. It was noted out, and it was urged that this stretch should be completed within a year, or two years at the outside. It was stated that there will be full co-operation between state, highway commission, the federal government and the counties in speeding construction until the last mile is finished. Oregon already has spent approximately \$9,000,000 on the road and the federal government also has expended a large sum.

J. C. Ainsworth, chairman of the Roosevelt Highway association, presided at the meeting this afternoon.
