FLIER-LOCHINVAR FAILS TO OBTAIN MAID'S CONSENT

Charles La Jotte Kidnaps Noreen Burke and Gets Warning Never to Call Again.

LOS ANGELES, June 7.—A comic strip suggestion for an airplane wooling taken seriously by Charles La Jotte today had left the aviator no less a rejected suitor than he was prior to Sunday afternoon when he "kidnaped" Miss Noreen Burke from a San Diego flying field, only to return her to Los Angeles about 20 hours later. For although he literally swept the San Diego society girl off her feet, he didn't do so figuratively he admitted yesterday to deputy sheriffs who awaited the coupe at the Los Angeles air field. On the Two Twenty Nine Palms, a resort oasis in the Colorado desert, east of San Diego, where they spent the night with the parents of La Jotte's employer, Ellwood Lloyd of Los Angeles, he said the roar of the motor prevented a renewal of his spurned proposal.

When they arrived there, he said, the San Diego girl was "a little peevish," put a foot down firmly on the elopement plan and insisted on a return to San Diego. The aviator-Lochinvar said he was on his way to San Diego with Miss Burke when they descended here and were received by a delegation of deputy sheriffs and H. R. Royle of San Diego, the girl's brother-in-law.

Miss Burke was quoted by the deputy sheriffs as saying on her arrival that she had been held against her will by La Jotte, while the aviator cheerfully admitted to the officers that he had chosen his stormy method of wooing on a tip from a newspaper cartoon, and to "kiss one over on a rival." Both Miss Burke and her brother-in-law, however, refused to prosecute the case, although Royle warned the flier never to call at the girl's San Diego home. Fellow aviators said the privilege had been denied him even before the "air kidnaping."

MAMMOTH LIGHTING SYSTEM THE PAGEANT "ROSARIA"

The lighting system for the pageant "Rosaria" colorful spectacle to be produced at the civic stadium Portland Rose Festival week from June 13 to 18, will call for 500 kilowatts, lighting plant in itself sufficient to create current to light a city of more than 4,000 inhabitants. This is the most complete lighting system ever planned for a pageant in the entire west. Electrical workers of Portland have completed the pageant "Rosaria" lighting system using the great basement of the public auditorium as a workshop. The lighting system was built under the supervision of F. A. Hoffaker, the stage director and master mechanic of the auditorium, who also designed and built the massive stage for the pageant. There will be more than five miles of wire under the stage for the pageant "Rosaria." The equipment calls for 200 one-thousand

Wait flood lights, a battery of G and G spot and search lights, baby spots, olivettes, strip border lights and other types to give light and color to the episodes of "Rosaria" with its cast of 3,000 people. The entire lighting system will remain the property of the Portland Rose Festival and was built for less money than it cost to rent the equipment in 1925, when the pageant "Rosaria" was first produced.

Steam for use in the steam curtain will be supplied by two 150-horsepower boilers of the Multnomah Athletic club. This steam is being piped across Multnomah field for a distance of 300 feet, out through a separator and dried. The steam is then expanded in a lower pressure and used in the curtain. The steam finally escapes through 640 sixteen inch nozzles.
