excellent condition and beg you both to come with me to the American embassy, where you will be my guests."

Honored At Kottbus
KOTTBUS, Germany, June 7.—Shortly before their hop-off for Berlin today, Chamberlin and Levine, the American aviators, were honored citizens of Kottbus with solemn ceremony.

The action of the officials in conferring the honor, was confirmed by a rousing demonstration from the crowd of about 5,000 inhabitants who packed the market place.

The local orchestra had practiced overtime learning "The Star Spangled Banner," and greeted the aviators with the anthem as they entered the big ceremonial hall of the Rathaus. As the first bars were played the whole audience, composed of staid burghers in their Sunday best, with their wives and families, arose and stood at attention.

Lord Mayor Kreutz in a brief speech presented the aviators with two magnificent silver and the orchestra again played "The Star Spangled Banner."

Devitt C. Poole, counselor of the American embassy in Berlin, replied in German in behalf of the fliers, and called for three cheers in behalf of Germany.

Then the provincial governor of Brandenburg in a rousing speech declared the "heroes of the air, and masters of the ocean," had celebrated the union of two continents and two nations.

At the conclusion of the brief ceremonies, the entire audience rose and lustily sang, "Deutsch Uber Alles," while Chamberlin, formerly in the United States aviation service, stood strictly at attention.

On the return to the hotel the fliers were acclaimed with sonorous "hochs," the feminine part of the crowd throwing flowers at them.

Welcome Enthusiastic
When the Columbia swooped to land, thousands at the airport cleared the tables of cups and kites and then mounted them as vantage points to see the landing.

The greatest enthusiasm prevailed, girls waving handkerchiefs and throwing kisses. The hand struck up American airs when Chamberlin and Levine appeared.

Ambassador Schirmer walked out on the landing field where he met the fliers and escorted them to the official reception stand where both were formally greeted.

Huge laurel wreaths were placed on the plane's propeller and the Americans were escorted to the reception hall of the Rathaus, while the Columbia was hauled into one of the Luftwaffe hangars.

Crowd Insistent
As Chamberlin and Levine left the plane the crowd impudently attempted to break the police cord about it, but did not get far. At the conclusion of the welcome, the fliers raised three deafening cheers for Chamberlin and Levine and then strove madly to get near the airplane. Chamberlin mounted the fuselage of the Columbia and acknowledged the tribute.

Meanwhile the thousands in the outer sections of the crowd raised a continuous din, demanding a chance to see the aviators, and Chamberlin and Levine entered an open automobile and were driven around the field amid cheers.

The reception platform prepared for the Americans was piled high with floral tributes. One of the laurels of the wreaths was taken from former German navy fliers.

After circling the field in the automobile, the Americans were taken in tow by the reception committee.

In welcoming the aviators, the German minister of economics, Dr. Julius Curtius, said:

"In the name of the German people, I extend hearty welcome to you on German soil and express my most cordial felicitations to you and your nation. May your admirable achievement tend to cement the bonds between America and Germany still more firmly."

Wives Are Enroute
NEW YORK, June 7.—Speeded on their way with cheers and honors, two proud wives were on the Atlantic today, bound for Berlin to tell their husbands what heroes they are.

Their flying husbands went to Germany in 42 hours. It will take Mrs. Wilda Chamberlin and Mrs. Grace Levine ten days. They are bound for Bremen on the north German Lloyd liner Berlin as guests of the steamship company. But upon joining their husbands, Mrs. Levine revealed, they hope to make a tour of European capitals in the Bellanca monoplane Columbia which carried Clarence D. Chamberlin and Charles A. Levine on their record-breaking journey.

Mrs. Chamberlin carried the first offer for her husband to turn into cash part of the distinction won in the flight. A Fifth avenue department store, after presenting Mrs. Chamberlin with a complete wardrobe, announced willingness to pay anything up to \$50,000 if Chamberlin would carry its buyers to Chicago and return with dress models to be displayed in connection with the 100th anniversary of the store next August.

U. S. S. MEMPHIS, BY WIRE.—LESS TO THE ASSOCIATED PRESS, June 7.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh is having such a good time on his "private" warship that he wouldn't mind a bit if the cruise were to continue a few days longer, except that the arrangements have already been made for his reception at Washington and elsewhere.

Immediately he learned that the trans-Atlantic plane Columbia had

landed on German soil, he dispatched a radio message to Clarence D. Chamberlin, the Columbia's pilot, congratulating him. To the newspaper correspondents aboard the Memphis, he remarked: "It was a very fine piece of work and another feather in the cap of aviators. Feats such as the Columbia's all have a tendency to aid in the development of aviation throughout the world."

recent months. He also stated that during the high water he saw scores of the rodents scurrying around the dump or swimming in the muddy water. The petition was referred to the committee on health and police for an investigation and report.

The board of fire commissioners, through Councilman Deen, stated that an investigation had been made of the old Marks building, located in the rear of the Liberty theatre. The building was found to be unsafe and a fire menace and it was recommended that it be torn down. The city attorney was directed to take the necessary legal steps to provide for getting rid of the unsightly structure.

The street committee reported that temporary repairs had been made to the decking of Deer Creek bridge which collapsed under a Shell Oil company truck last week. It was recommended by the committee that immediate steps be taken to construct a new bridge or arrange for repairs to the present structure.

The city recorder reported that notices of completion have been posted on the North Roseburg drains and a resolution was adopted accepting the work and authorizing final payment to the contractor.

The committee on electric lights was authorized to seek bids for the city's electrical work for the ensuing year.

The city street department was instructed to take over the task of checking up on the clocks controlling the lights at the city gates. This work has formerly been done by the electrical inspector who recently increased the charge for the labor.

The city engineer was instructed to segregate the assessments on blocks affected by the amended plat of Laurelwood.

One card bore the name of

Utah. The latter wired police he

believed the dead man to be Grant,

a former employee of the Silver

Coalition Mines company of Utah.

He said Grant left Utah two weeks

ago for California where he in-

tended joining the navy.

Other papers found on the body

included envelopes from Medford

and Grants Pass, Oregon, and a

card bearing the name "Joe Damp-

ley, Pasco, Wash."
