YOUTH WHO SLEW SOVIET MINISTER RUSSIAN REFUGEE

Poland Regrets Murder on Her Soil but Delivery of Killer Is Held Impossible.

(Associated Press London Wire.)

WARSAW, Poland, June 8.—Although the assassination of M. Volkoff, Soviet minister to Poland, was committed by a Russian refugee, who is not a Polish citizen, it was causing much anxiety in Poland today. It was feared that Soviet Russia might demand the extradition of the 19-year-old assassin, Boris Kowceda, to which Poland could not possibly agree without a loss of prestige and violation of the principle of not surrendering political offenders. Members of the Russian colony in Warsaw repudiated connection with Kowceda and fear deplorable consequences.

Notwithstanding Soviet denials, the Polish public connected M. Volkoff, when he was sent here in 1924, with the murder of former Emperor Nicholas of Russia. When he arrived in Warsaw the foreign office proposed to give him special protection, but he refused and appeared offended at the proposal.

It was pointed out here that the Russian judge, Sokoroff, in a book written after an investigation of the czar's death, stated that Volkoff was involved. He gave a photograph reproduction of a document alleged to have been signed by Volkoff, showing that he had delivered gasoline for the burning of the royal family. At first the Polish government declined to receive Volkoff as minister, but accepted him when an official denial came from the Soviet government that he had anything to do with the death of the royal family.

Poland Expresses Regret

President Maslowski has sent a message to President Kallin of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, saying:

"Very deeply shocked and indignant over the outrageous murder of M. Volkoff."

Commenting on the assassination, the Kurjer Warszawski declares that all Poland will have heard with indignation and horror the news of the crime.

"The murder," it says, "is not the action of a Pole; it is an act absolutely foreign to the moral sentiment, traditions and interests of Poland. None the less, the fact that the crime was committed on Polish soil will certainly compel Polish opinion to protest unanimously and warmly against methods of political warfare of this type."

The paper adds that M. Volkoff

applied himself to consolidating neighborly relations between Russia and Poland; was not a supporter of mutual distrust, but on the contrary, was fully alive to the reciprocal advantages thru loyal partnership of the two countries.

LONDON, June 8.—The assassination of the Soviet minister to Poland, M. Volkoff, is regarded here as creating a dangerous situation between Soviet Russia and Poland. Developments were being watched with anxiety today.

"It does not create surprise," the Daily News comments, "that as Moscow reports, Russian opinion sees the hidden hand of Great Britain behind the assassin's revolver. It will not be surprising if Moscow's mentality holds British statesmen directly responsible for the murder. Nonsensical as such accusations appear to intelligent persons, they nevertheless have to be reckoned with seriously in the devil's game of international politics."

MOSCOW, June 8.—The Polish minister at Moscow, M. Patek has called on Maxim Litvinoff, acting foreign commissar, and expressed the profound condolences of the Polish government for the murder in Warsaw yesterday of M. Volkoff, Soviet minister to Poland. He voiced condemnation of "this criminal act."

M. Patek informed the foreign commissar that a vigorous police investigation would be carried out and the guilty persons punished to the utmost severity of the law.

At the same time Mr. Litvinoff handed the minister a note for presentation to his government protesting against the assassination and saying that the Polish government could not repudiate responsibility for the outrage. "Poland," the note declares, "will be held responsible for any assassination. The government of the Soviet considers this an unprecedented criminal act, bound up with a whole series of acts aimed at destroying diplomatic representation of the Soviet union abroad and creating a direct menace at peace."

The note accuses the Polish government of not having taken necessary precautions against criminal activities in Polish territory of Russian counter revolutionary terrorist organizations.

Approximately 325,000 of the pamphlets will be mailed to the voters of the state. The law requires that the pamphlets be in the mails at least 10 days before the election.

TEXAS CLEARING CATTLE REGIONS OF WOLF HORDES

Over 2,000 Already Slain in Campaign; One With \$30,000 Record Is Taken Alive.

MARFA, Texas, June 8.—The mountain howls of the wolf packs, which have struck terror in the hearts of many a cattle and sheep raiser in the big land country of Texas, soon may be stilled.

A wholesale wolf extermination campaign now is under way in the highland country of Texas, and since its inauguration more than 2,000 wolves have been poisoned or shot. State and federal wolf hunters are rapidly clearing the country of these destructive enemies of the stockman with traps and poisoned baits.

The wolves range in size from the small gray coyote to the huge golden black Texas lobo, which attains an enormous size, some specimens weighing 200 pounds. "Old Blackie," huge she-wolf, which eluded capture for 10 years and did damage estimated in excess of \$50,000 to the live stock men of the section, recently fell a victim of the trapper. The huge wolf, coat black in color, with whitish green eyes, was caught by a trapper who first captured one of her cubs and used it as a bait to lure the dam into his steel trap. She was taken alive, and several of the larger zoos of the country are seeking to get her as a specimen.

Baits composed of poison enclosed between two pads of pork have been distributed throughout Brewster and Presidio counties by the hundreds of thousands.
