ing, the utmost harmony, and the closest cooperation between them.

"There, be it resolved, by the regents of the two institutions, in joint assembly:

"(1) That we pledge ourselves to loyal cooperation in administering our trust to the taxpayers of Oregon thru promoting harmony and good will between the two institutions."

"(2) That we enjoin the officers, faculties, and as far as our influence may extend, the alumni and students of the two institutions, to like harmony and cooperation."

"(3) That to give effect to these resolutions a joint organization of the two boards be effected to consider matters of mutual interest."

"(4) That the governor shall act as president and the secretary of state shall act as secretary of this joint organization and

"(5) That regular meetings of the joint organization shall be held in October and March of each year, alternately at the University and at the College and that special meetings may be held at the call of the president."

kin to think about it now."

The coming of Mrs. Chamberlin and Mrs. Levine, who are now on the high seas enroute to Germany, creates somewhat of a problem, it

was frankly admitted by Levine today.

"There is no doubt we will have a new situation to face when our wives arrive, happy though we are at the news of their coming," he said. "We naturally cannot take them along in the plane in case we fly to Vienna, Rome or other cities, nor do I know exactly where we can best arrange to rejoin them."

"This is an added reason why our plans must necessarily be held in abeyance for the present. We haven't had time to collect our thoughts."

Both Levine and Chamberlin today declined to state what mileage they claimed for the Columbia's flight.

Levine said: "We haven't had time to figure it out."

Mail Row Develops

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The first New York to Germany load of air mail carried by the plane Columbia may add fuel to the fire between Charles A. Levine, passenger with Pilot Clarence Chamberlin on the flight and the "post office department."

Levine previously had been in difficulties with the post office department when Postmaster General New last March refused to award an air mail contract to the North American Airways, Inc., of Cleveland, in which Levine held half of the stock. The company's bid was slightly lower than that of the National Air Transport Inc., of Chicago, headed by Paul Henderson, former second assistant postmaster general, which was awarded the contract. Postmaster General New threw out the low bid after an investigation of Levine's dealings with the war and treasury departments.

In the preparation of the air mail load for Germany, the department was informed that Senator Lockwood had asked Postmaster Sealy to cancel 125 letters and Sealy took his cancellation stamp to a Garden City hotel for this procedure. The postmaster then went to Roosevelt Field nearby and cancelled 125 more letters for Levine. Sealy, according to the report, had been approached prior to the Columbia flight about the feasibility of air mail being sent on the trans-Atlantic planes and had been informed upon his inquiry by a post office inspector that it was possible. Colonel Lindbergh, in his flight, however, took no such mail.
