10.—Ray and Roy de Autremont, twin brothers, arrested here for train robbery in Oregon after a four year search waited impatiently today to get out of the city jail and on their way to Jacksonville, Oregon, to stand trial.

The fugitives told police they were tired of the Steubenville Jail in which they spent two days and nights and said they were eager to "have it all over."

They faced arraignment before a United States commissioner today after which they were to be taken to Columbus, Ohio, and later to be started for Jacksonville in the company of officers.

The twins were arrested as fugitives. They waived extradition on charges of robbing the mails. When they get back to Oregon, they probably will be turned over to state authorities and tried on charges of murder for the deaths of a postal clerk and three trainmen who were shot during the robbery.

"Long Trip" Planned
If the federal meff had required two months longer to track the de Autremonts here their efforts might have been in vain. Roy de Autremont revealed to a city detective who aided in his arrest.

"If you had given us two more months here you wouldn't have found us," Roy said. "We were going to take a long, long trip."

The wife of Ray de Autremont, who goes by the name of Mrs. Elmer Goodwin, and who had no knowledge of her husband's real identity until he was arrested, will be returned to her parents at Hanging Rock, Ohio.

Ray told police that he married in an attempt to avert suspicion. "The only mistake I made was that I married a good girl," he said. "I wasn't going to. I just wanted to get married and hide. I am sorry for her. But she's pretty and young and she'll get another man."

Although they have been in Berlin only a little more than three days, the American embassy, where the flyers are stopping, is filled with gifts—cigars and cigarettes, golden cigarette cases, and silver cups, cases of champagne, wearing apparel and floral tributes. As neither smoked and Chamberlain only drinks light beer occasionally, some of the gifts are destined to find their way to hospitals and other institutions.

DES MOINES, Iowa, June 10.—Chamberlain's home state is preparing to honor him with an "all Iowa-Chamberlain day."

Military maneuvers will be held in honor of the intrepid flyer, a gubernatorial reception tendered him, and the rank of Brigadier-General by special gubernatorial excoction conferred on him, if the proposed plans go through.

Much depends on Chamberlain's ability to come to Iowa. His mother said that "it would be up to Mr. Levine, a good deal, whether Clarence can come, but I hope he does."

Mrs. Chamberlain promised that when she meets her son in London she would talk to him about the proposed return to his home state.

Individual owners of radio sets will probably be listening in on their sets at home, and as a courtesy to the hundreds of people in the city who will be endeavoring to listen to this program, operators of electrical devices are asked to cooperate by keeping interference reduced to a minimum. Ultra violet coils, high frequency apparatus and x-ray machines of the older type cause much noise in radio sets and sometimes ruin reception entirely. It is urged that unless absolutely necessary that there be no operation of these devices during the period of the broadcasting, a co-operation which will be greatly appreciated by the numerous radio fans and listeners.

May Change Plans.
Although his trans-Atlantic airplane, the Spirit of St. Louis, which is being brought on the Memphis, will be immediately re-assembled by navy aviation mechanics upon its arrival, Colonel Lindbergh has not yet decided definitely whether he will fly this machine to New York. There has been a suggestion here he may pilot an army amphibian plane so as to land in New York harbor and thus avoid the danger of the crowds which are expected to mass at the landing field on Staten Island, the place of his "hop-off" on his ocean flight. Another pilot they would fly the Spirit of St. Louis to New York.

American aviators are to play a chief role in the tribute to the former air mail pilot. At the dock Lindbergh will pass through a double line of several hundred fellow citizens, many of whom also have won the highest laurels of the flying "game." Among those who will greet him will be Commander Richard E. Byrd, the North Pole flyer; Commander A. C. Read, commander of the first trans-Atlantic flight of the NC-4, Lieutenant Eric Nelson and John Harding of the army world flight; Lieutenant Russell Maughan, the down to dusk transcontinental pilot; Lieutenant Oakley Kelly, coast to coast non-stop flyer and Captain Hawthorne Gray, holder of the world's altitude record.

Films Sent Ahead
U. S. S. MEMPHIS, June 10.—(By wireless to the Associated Press.)—The first home contact for Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, New York to Paris flyer, occurred at 6:05 a. m. today when the destroyer Memphis met the scout cruiser Memphis at sea. The vessels met 250 miles off the coast. The destroyer took aboard movie films, made of the aviator during the voyage and a bag of official mail which she was to carry to New York. The destroyer was expected to reach New York late today.

Stamp Honors Dead
WASHINGTON, June 10.—The Lindbergh air mail stamp, the first copy of which is being mounted in a special album for presentation to Lindbergh tomorrow by Postmaster General, will be placed on sale June 18 at four postoffices and the government's philatelic agency here.

Crowds Besiege Mother
BALTIMORE, June 10.—A hair dressing establishment visited by Mrs. Evangeline Lindbergh, mother of the famous flyer, was besieged by such a crowd today that the doors were barred and a call sent to the police. She had stopped off here on her way to Washington in order to avoid the crowds there.

Mrs. Lindbergh waited behind the locked doors and the sheeted window for a squad of detectives to escort her through the rear to her suite at the Bellevue.

Before visiting the hair dresser she bought a paper in a drug store and then went to a hat shop in the same block and bought a hat of black straw, similar to the one she wore. She was accompanied by the manager of the hotel where she stopped. She utilized the newspaper to hide her face, trying to avoid cameramen.
