PORTLAND TO HAVE GREAT ROSE FESTIVAL

City Prepared as Never Before for Its Annual Show.

IN GALA ATTIRE

Pageant "Rosaria" to Be One of Greatest Features of Festival—Chinese Will Aid.

PORTLAND, June 10.—Portland is prepared as never before to celebrate its annual Rose festival during the week of June 13 to 18. Generous cooperation of Oregon and northwest communities gives promise of making it the most interesting and successful fiesta in the 20 years that it has been a civic activity.

The city is in gala attire and is prepared to entertain the many thousands of visitors who will be brought by the railroads on special rates. In addition to the hosts who will drive in from the close-in districts.

Particular attention has been paid this year to preparations for the pageant "Rosaria," to be presented on the first five nights of the festival on the special stage, the largest ever built in the west, at Multnomah field. Twenty-five hundred singers and dancers, carefully trained, and an orchestra of 100 members of the Portland Symphony orchestra, will participate in the pageant. Special scenery and mechanical equipment will be used for startling stage effects.

The festival will open Monday morning with annual parade and inspection of Portland's police department, followed by the coronation of Queen Dorothy (Miss Dorothy Mielke) at Laurelhurst park, and a model boat regatta. The festival center will be formally opened in the afternoon, and a military parade including Oregon National Guard units and sham battle will precede the initial performance of "Rosaria."

Portland fire bureau will give an exhibition of fire fighting and life-saving Tuesday morning. The rose show will be opened at the civic auditorium. There will be a Chinese-baby show in Chinatown, and in the afternoon the Chinese dragon, imported from Hong Kong

for the occasion, will be introduced to festival revelers. There will be a typical celebration in the Oriental quarters.

Eight hundred children will participate in "The Fairy Rose" juvenile pageant at Laurelhurst Park on Wednesday. An illuminated fireboat drill in the harbor will precede the showing of "Rosaria." The carnival in Chinatown will be continued.

Thursday's entertainment will include the famous floral parade in which every Oregon community of size will be represented.

Friday will be dedicated to the spirit of mardi gras and will be featured by the "Merrykhana" parade of fun and frivolity.

The festival will close Saturday with street dancing and firecracker fiesta in Chinatown. There will be band concerts and concession entertainment day and night throughout the week.

CUSTOM PRUNE DRIER BEING BUILT NEAR OAKLAND

C. H. Maupin and son, G. A. Maupin, who reside near Oakland, have started construction on a prune drier, which is to be one of the largest and most modern plants of its kind in the country. The drier is to be built by L. N. Miller, of Eugene, who has designed a special type of dehydrator which has proven unusually successful. The drier will have a daily capacity of 1,000 bushels. It will be electrically operated and will use oil fuel.

The plant is to be used for custom work, and will be greatly appreciated. It is believed, by the growers of that vicinity as several thousand bushels of prunes were lost last year because of lack of drier space. It is expected that the plant will be ready for operation about September 1.

BEAUTY-BARBER SHOP IS OPENED AT MYRTLE CREEK

A. G. Pennington, a live-wire from California, has opened a barber shop and beauty parlor in Myrtle Creek, supplying a long-felt need for that vicinity. The shop is located in a new co-

ment building just completed by W. R. Hurst, manager of the telephone office, who is locating the telephone exchange in half of the new building. The interior of the building is finished in white plaster and white enamel, and two barber chairs, with complete equipment has been installed. Mr. Pennington is an experienced barber, having had a large shop in California, but like many others, feels that Oregon, which unlike California, has not been over-inflated, presents better possibilities. Though an expert in marcelling and general beauty shop work, Mr. Pennington is too busy to see to that work, and has engaged Mrs. Grace Chaney, an experienced marceller, lately from Eugene. The rear room of the building has been piped, and shower baths are contemplated.

CANYONVILLE NOW HAS MODERN HOTEL

Canyonville can now enjoy the distinction of having one of the best and up-to-date hotels of any of the smaller towns along the highway with the leasing of the Greystone Hotel from J. S. Boals, by Mrs. E. M. Marsters of Myrtle Creek last week.

The hotel has been built only three years, but owing to the advanced age of Mr. Boals, had been somewhat neglected, but Mrs. Marsters is thoroughly renovating the place and planning new improvements. The building which has two stories, has an entire front of glass, the floors are polished and the walls are all in white plaster, making a bright airy place. There are seventeen rooms, three with private baths, a roomy lobby and parlor and a large sunny dining room. Home cooked meals will be served, with a daily special chicken dinner which no doubt will prove a drawing card to people of the county as well as travelers.

Mrs. Marsters is well known to local people and her name is an assurance of a well kept establishment. The hotel has been named the Polyanthus after a restaurant conducted by the Marsters at Myrtle Creek, and patrons are assured fine accommodations and palatable meals.

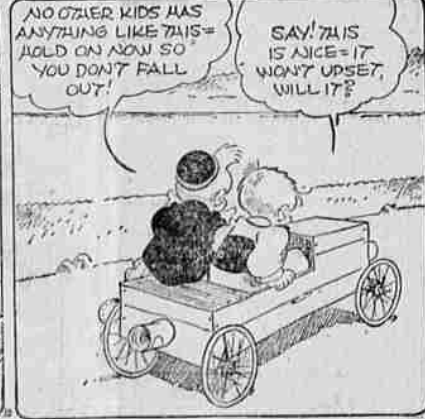
