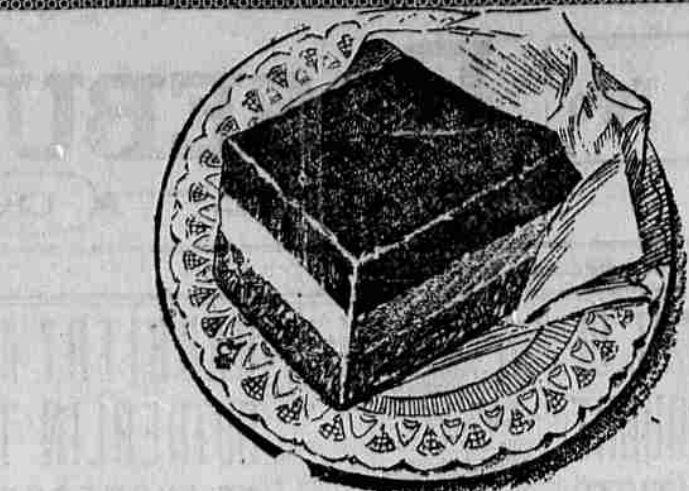

EMPLOYMENT IN NORTHWEST SHOWS UPWARD TREND

PORTLAND, June 10.—Employment throughout the Pacific Northwest has taken an upward turn turning the past 30 days, according to the 41 employment letter published here today. Neither logging nor lumber manufacturing activities have been increased, however, the latter said, and the improved conditions are due to seasonal work, such as farming, railroad maintenance and construction work, and general construction. The letter reported berry picking to be well under way in Oregon, and that there was a slight demand for berry help, somewhat later than is usual.

Reports from various northwest cities were quoted in the 41 letter as follows: Portland and Columbia river—The number of unemployed in this city and district has been greatly reduced since early May. Logging in this section is slightly more active than it was one month ago, but lumber manufacturing is in less volume, rather than mere.

Aberdeen-Hoquiam, Wn.—Logging in Grays Harbor district 85 per cent normal. Sawmills very active. Labor turnover light. Slight surplus of men here who are not accustomed to cannery or mill work. Tacoma—Few jobs of any kind offered. Logging and sawmilling less active than last June. Strike of local laundry workers in progress. Labor surplus here made up mostly of transients.

Seattle—Employment conditions improving. City construction in full swing. Logging 80 per cent normal; a few concerns have laid off fallers and buckers. Water-front work below normal. More than enough men in this city to fill any and all jobs offered.

Bellingham—Due to opening of a new logging camp, increased activity on farms, where beet thinning on 2500 acres has started, and to extensive building operations and some street work, employment in this district is on the increase. All but one sawmill cutting. Cement factories and pulp plants busy.

Spokane-Inland Empire—Seasonal work, about one month later than usual is slowly settling under way. There is considerable unemployment in this city and district. Much help has been attracted here by reports of large construction jobs. Logging has been slowed by wet ground. Woods help is plentiful. Calls for brush pilers are just beginning to be listed. Sawmills, less active than a year ago, are generally operating.

Boise—Employment here is less than average for this time of year. Two logging camps have been closed for ten days. Sawmills not cutting capacity. Much labor has been attracted here by recent railroad developments and there are more men than jobs.

NEW CAFE OPENED AT MYRTLE CREEK LATELY

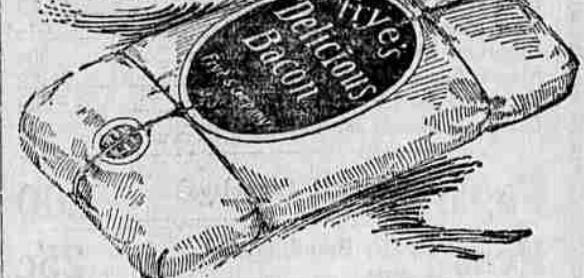
