STOCKHOLDERS IN
DEFUNCT OIL CO.
NAMED IN SUIT

Suit to compel the stockholders of the Roseburg Oil & Gas company, a bankrupt concern, to pay the amount still due on their stock in order to satisfy the claims of the creditors, has been filed by Ray H. Compton, trustee in bankruptcy of the estate of the company, in the circuit court. It is claimed that the stockholders subscribed to stock in the company, which was capitalized for \$125,000 but that the full amount was not paid in. The suit is to compel the stockholders to pay enough on their stock to settle the claims of the creditors.

The claims amount to \$5,663.39, and it is estimated that \$11,245.01 will be needed to completely settle the affairs of the company. Judgments against the stockholders for the amount of the unpaid balances on their stock are requested, with a limit to be collected of \$11,245.01. The stockholders named are George A. DEAUTREMONT IS
LESS DEPRESSED
AS TRIAL DRAGS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

COURT HOUSE, Jacksonville, June 11—The sixth day of the trial of Hugh de Autremont opened with the announcement by the state that Lawrence J. B. de Autremont, Wash., had religious scruples against testifying on Saturday and asked the court's permission to change the order of calling witnesses, which was granted.

The youthful defendant, less depressed in manner than yesterday, with one long swim over his chair, eyed with keen interest a map of the scene of the crime, introduced an evidence and identified by his maker, Mr. C. Wilson, of Chicago, Ill., in 1923, a Southern Pacific civil engineer. Wilson was the first witness of the day.

Wilson, a passenger on the second section of the dynamited train, gazed at Siskiyon at the time, seated at Siskiyon at the time, testified to the distance and elevations and designated on the blue prints where shotgun shells and pistol cartridges were found. He testified the distance from the car to the blasting machine was 47 feet and five inches. Photographs, cartridges and shells were identified by the witness in a lengthy examination.

The defense in its questioning stressed the distance, along "the line of least resistance" from the two camps, which the state claims were the rendezvous of the de Autremonts before the crime, to the west portal of the tunnel.

Carl Henderson, of Siskiyon, Oregon, a second crew foreman, called to the stand, testified to seeing the 45 calibre revolver, found by brakeman Benjamin, while the holdups was in progress, and which the state holds was purchased at Albany, Oregon, by Ray de Autremont.

The custom of the court to adjourn on Saturday afternoon, was set aside to speed the trial; the state objecting to a recess.

When the trial opened, there were 14 spectators in the room, but as the morning wore on, the audience, largely women and girls, increased.

Henderson identified six gunny-sack foot pads, found near the blasting machine, and by use of his mental organs, averred that the other of criminals, in which they were soaked when found, no longer remained.

The witness then took a chew of fine cut tobacco, and everybody laughed at the defendant.

A pair of overalls, found over the blasting machine, the machine itself, three kettles and a coil of rope were identified by Henderson, who guarded them, pending the arrival of officers.

The wire extended from the dynamiting machine to the tunnel mouth.

Questioned by defense counsel, Henderson told of the crowd of curious sightseers that gathered over the hillside after the holding. The witness was unable to explain why he had marked some of the articles he had found and not others.

William Flackus of Ashland, bridge foreman for the Southern Pacific testified that with his crew he ate dinner near the tunnel and was advised by a brakeman that an engine boiler explosion had occurred. He armed his men with fire extinguishers and went over the hill to the dynamited mail car and entered through the hole made by the explosion.

Mr. Benjamin F. Lohr, Sr., one of Roseburg's best known residents, having made his home in this city for a great many years, passed away at his home this morning at 8:45 o'clock after a long illness. Mr. Lohr was 76 years of age. He was born in Somerset county, Penn., April 28, 1851, and moved to Illinois in 1867, moving from there to Nebraska in the fall of 1871 and from there coming to Oregon in 1877. He resided in Portland several years, and then on December 1, 1883, he moved to Roseburg where he made his home until the time of his death.

On April 29, 1926, he was married to Harriet Barter, who survives him. He also leaves two sons, Harry H. and Benjamin F. Jr., and a brother and two sisters, Franklin Lohr a resident of Nebraska; Susan Finney, of Nebraska, and Rachel Ruzharsky, of Pennsylvania. Mr. Lohr was a retired trainman having served the Southern Pacific company faithfully for many years. He was a member of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. Funeral services will be held in the parlors of the Douglas Funeral Home, Monday, June 13 at 10 a. m. Rev. F. Matthews officiating. Interment will take place in the Masonic cemetery. H. C. Stearns, funeral director of the Douglas Funeral Home will have charge of the services.

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for June 12: The Power of United Prayer—Acts 12:5-17.

The Christian church was facing, in its earliest days, the persecution which has done so much from the beginning to shape its course and to develop its strength. Peter had been thrown into prison at a time when he was the most conspicuous figure in the church, and when the fellowship of Christians depended very largely upon his presence and influence. It is a tribute to the strength of character and faith that these early disciples, though Peter had been snatched from them did not weaken. Though he was in prison, prayer was made earnestly of the church unto God for him.

The verses of the lesson proceed to tell the story of Peter's miraculous escape from prison. One thinks in connection with it of the experience of Paul and Silas as prisoners at a later day, with their feet fast in the stocks, singing psalms and songs of praise to God. There is a certain difference in the two narratives for which one cannot account. Though Paul and Silas had the opportunity to escape, they refused to leave, and they encouraged their fellow prisoners also to remain, in that way saving the life of the church.

And when Peter was come to himself, he said, Now I know of a surety, that the Lord hath sent his angel and hath delivered me out of the hand of Herod, and from all the expectation of the people of the Jews.
And when he had considered the thing, he came to the house of Mary the mother of John, whose surname was Mark; where many were gathered together praying.
And as Peter knocked at the door of the gate, a damsel came to hear, named Rhoda.
And when she knew Peter's voice, she opened not the gate for gladness, but ran in, and told how Peter stood before the gate.
And they said unto her, Thou art mad. But she constantly affirmed that it was even so. Then said they, It is his angel.
But Peter continued knocking; and when they had opened the door, and saw him, they were astonished.
But he, beckoning unto them with the hand to hold their peace, declared unto them how the Lord had brought him out of the prison. And he said, Go show these things unto James, and to the brethren. And he departed, and went into another place.

One would almost like to believe that an element of tradition had attached itself to a story that is less noble and beautiful in its ending than the story of Paul's prison experience. However, each must interpret the lesson and its teaching according to his own sense of values.

Symbolism in Lesson
The lesson has been one of considerable interest to mystics who have seen in the guards and in the iron gate the symbols of life's barriers and difficulties which disappear when they are challenged with faith and the guidance of God. There are iron gates that seem to make the way of escape in life impossible but which open of their own accord when one comes really up to them. We are all disposed to see difficulties as we look ahead that cannot be surmounted, but when one comes forward with prayer and courage, not doubting the divine leadership, how often these things either disappear or become easy of conquest.

We all remember how, in our boyhood days, when we went bicycling touring if we traveled a very hilly road the appearance of every new hill in itself gave a discouraging sense of fatigue. How often, however, one viewed a hilly road across the valley from the top of another hill. Seen from that angle the hill which one had to climb looked enormous, but when one got down to the foot of the hill which he was descending the road had often straightened out into a very slight slope. That is typical of the hills of life. There are mountain heights that are particularly hard to climb, but in the main it is the tendency of mankind, especially in the matter of moral and spiritual progress, to make mountains out of molehills.
