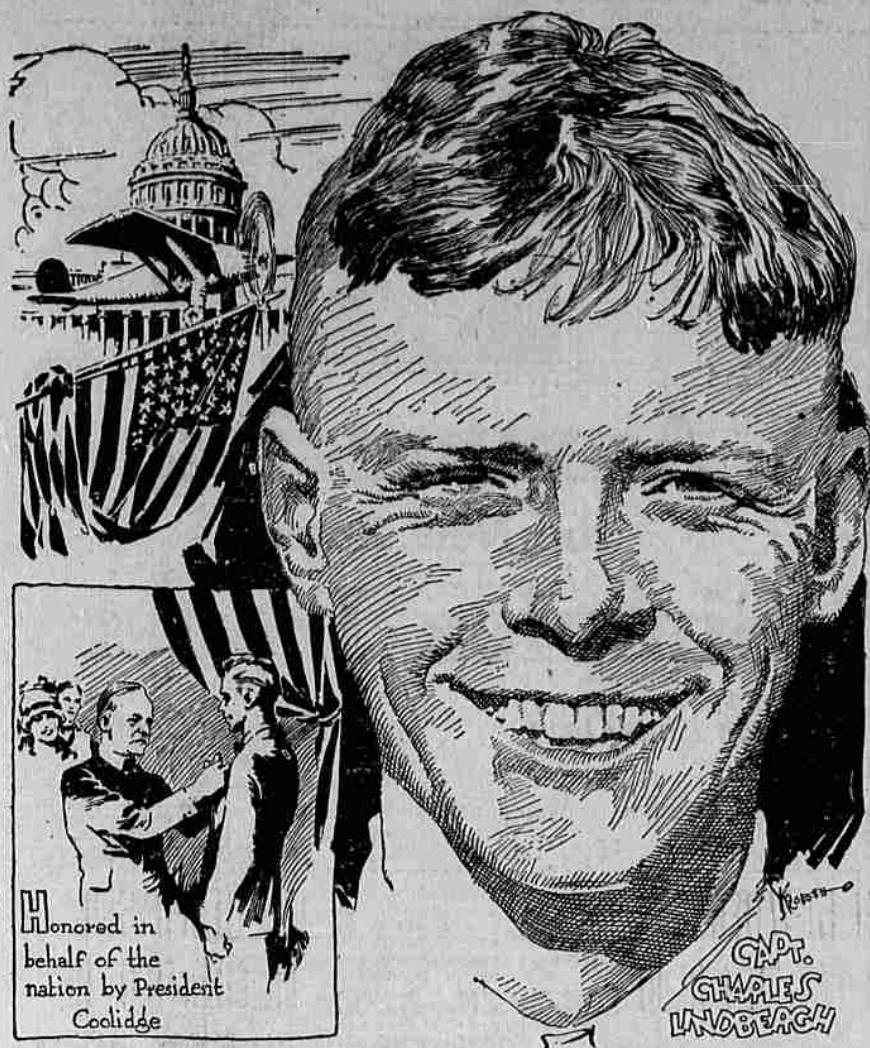


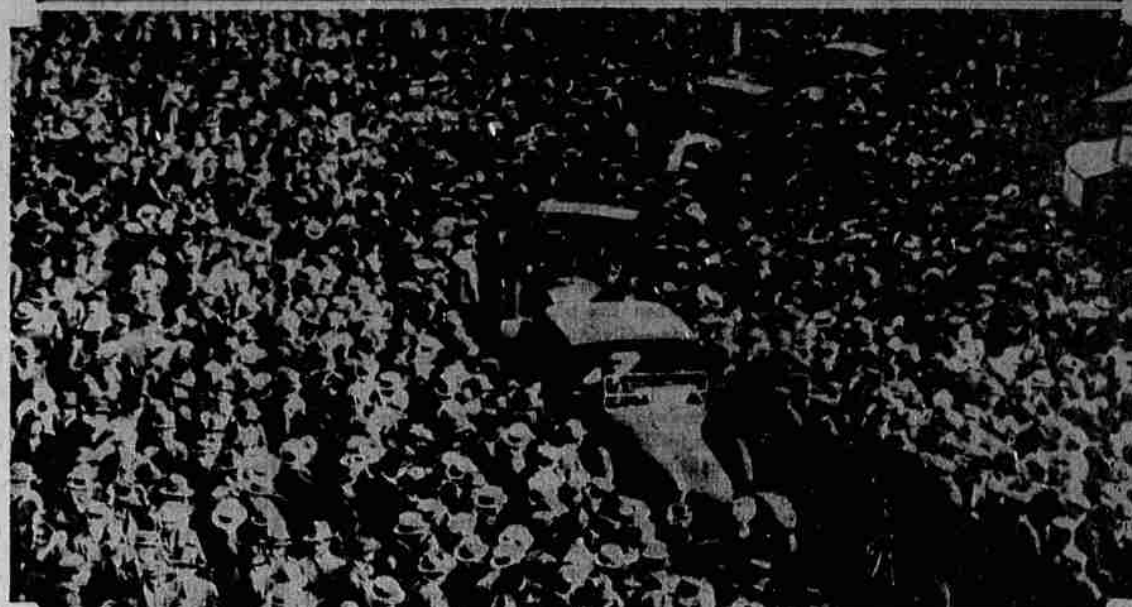

LATEST PICTURE SHOWS ENTHUSIASM FOR LINDY UNDIMMED

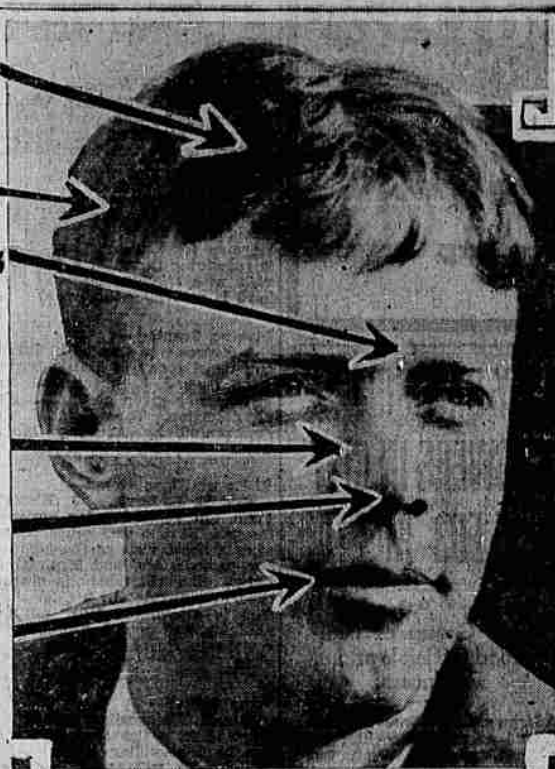

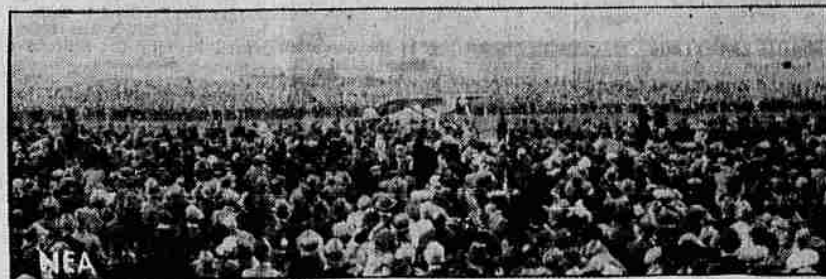

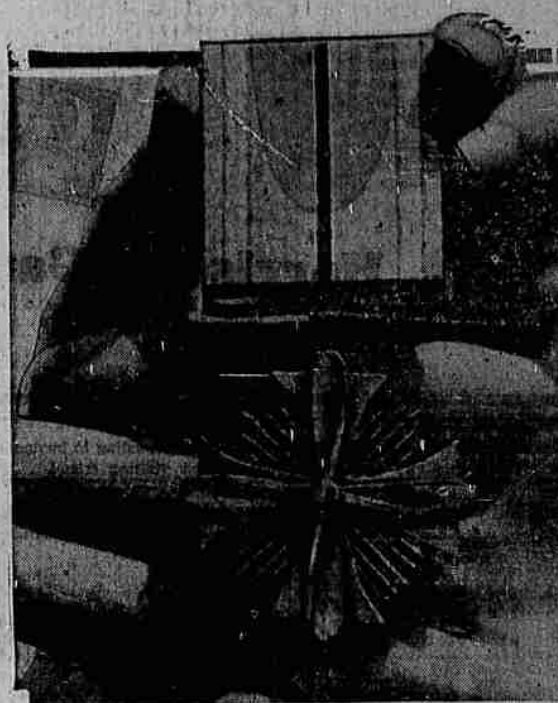

A MASS OF HUMANITY ON CROYDON FIELD, LONDON



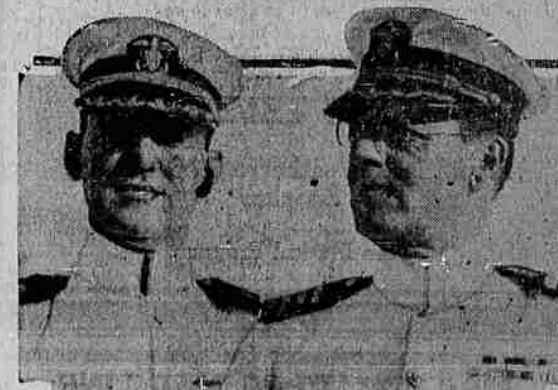
