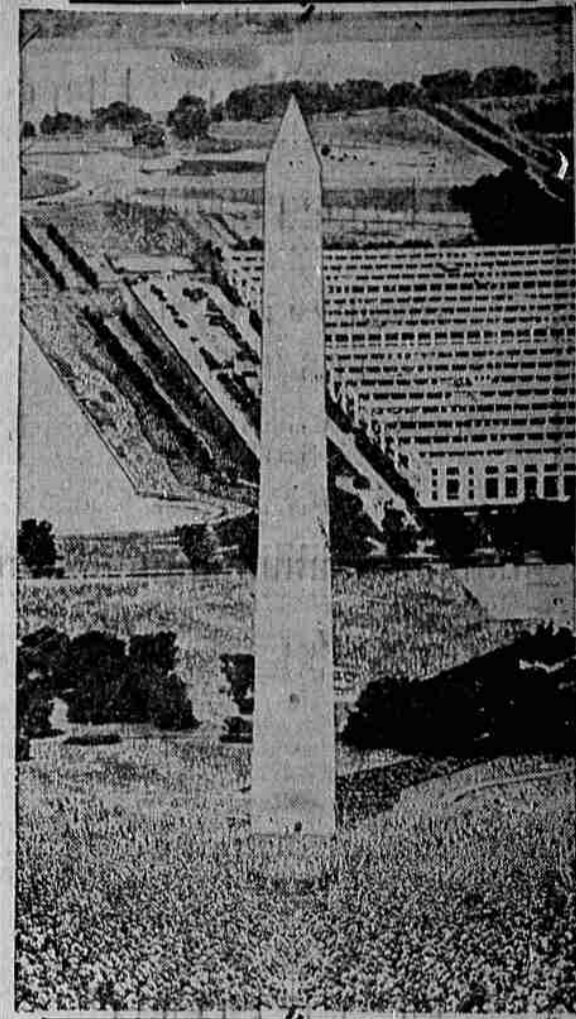

PORTLAND, Ore., June 13.—C. A. Vermillion, assistant to the president of the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway, died today, aged 63, following illness of several months. He had been employed on various railways in the middle west and in 1909 he left the Missouri Pacific to become train dispatcher for the Spokane, Portland and Seattle at Spokane.
