STANDARD PACK FOR BROCCOLI TO BE ADOPTED

cially by Harry J. Schifferle, Omaha broker, who gave the growers a great deal of very valuable information and advice.

Oregon growers have not been careful in grading the heads of broccoli, it was pointed out. A purchaser sometimes finds one surrounded by an excessive amount of foliage.

Following his talk, in which he outlined brokerage methods, contracted Oregon and California broccoli, and told of the complaints regarding the Oregon products.

He said he had been an orthodox, but got no results. He has been using this new method commercially since 1922.

Mr. Rose is carrying on experiments with Philberts on the Shasta farm of Bartlett Johnston, Siskiyou, Ore.

Mr. Rose prunes prune trees mostly although he is capable of pruning many other kinds of trees.

Some people think Mr. Rose's method is too radical, but it takes some radical changes to start something.

However, summing it down to brass tacks, most people will admit that the orthodox pruning method is wrong and the Rose pruning method is very reasonable.
