EXHIBITS PUT IN EVIDENCE AT JACKSONVILLE

commission of the holdup. Today Bonwell testified that the figures indicated the date he had talked to Southern Pacific special agents about the gun sale. He admitted that since the last trial he had conferred with the same special agents.

United States District Attorney Neumer then attempted to introduce the private sales record, and withdrew it when the defense objected. E. G. Irvine of Eugene, Oregon, express company shipping clerk, identified receipts for goods shipped and signed for by R. A. de Autremont, and afterwards claimed and received the testimony showed, by him at Portland.

Auto Transaction.
A. F. Stowe, of Portland, identified a contract signed by R. A. de Autremont, for the purchase of an automobile and a chattel mortgage, part of the same transaction. The automobile, the state holds, was used by the de Autremonts in reaching the Siskiyou mountain retreat before the robbery.

Stowe testified that when the sale was consummated, three men called, two stockily built, about 30 years of age, and one young and of slight build. The three took possession of the car August 30, 1923. An application on August 30, 1923, for a driver's license signed by E. E. James, of Silverton, Oregon, was introduced. E. E. James, the state claims, is an alias of the defendant and the attached description of the applicant, written by himself fits the prisoner at the bar. He gave his age as 18 and his occupation as a "painter."

The witness said Ray de Autremont was the spokesman of the trio and said they "were going on a vacation" and made the first payment of \$200 on the automobile. After the holdup the car was located at the home of the father of the defendant, Paul de Autremont, in Eugene.

Exhibits All Shown
COURT HOUSE, Jacksonville, Ore., June 14.—The retrial of Hugh de Autremont, charged with the murder of Charles O. (Coyle) Johnson during the Siskiyou Tunnel holdup and slayings, entered its third phase with opening of court this morning.

All the state's exhibits have been introduced as evidence, and the work of linking them to the defendant is scheduled as part of the day's testimony.

The star witnesses of the state are also slated for appearance. They include Professor E. O. Heinrich of Berkeley, Calif., criminologist, and C. D. Moore, the soldier guard of Hugh de Autremont on the transport Thomas, when he was returned from the Philippines.

Postal Man Testifies.
C. G. Welter of Portland, postal inspector, was the first witness after former Sheriff C. E. Terrill had been recalled for identification of exhibits.

Welter identified a torn portion of an express label he found in the pine needle bed at the outlaw camp. It contained the numerals 121-4, the express company's designation of Lakewood, N. 34, the home of the mother of the defendant. The state will attempt to show the torn bit was from the label on the black hand grip found in the brush, near the tunnel after the holdup.

The postal inspector described a tree, beneath which a test charge of dynamite had been fired, the detonator covered with an old-fashioned comforter quilt as "looking

like a Christmas tree." Patrick Sweeney, of San Francisco, sergeant of railroad police, identified a rich Irish brogue, identified a can of pepper as the one he found near the tunnel mouth. The state contends the pepper—a rare brand—was purchased at a Eugene store.

Harry J. Locho of Everett, Wash., secretary and credit man of the Schwabacher Hardware company of Seattle, identified an order for a .45 calibre automatic pistol from Hauser Brothers of Albany, Oregon, with the serial number, 130-763, the same as that on the automatic found in the railroad yard at Siskiyou which the state holds was carried by the de Autremonts and lost by one of them as they boarded the blind baggage of the dynamited train.

Paul A. Hauser, of Salem, Oregon, owner of sporting goods stores in Willamette valley cities, identified an invoice for a .45 automatic, the original order for same, in March, 1922.

Defense Scores.
J. L. Bonwell, former sporting goods store salesman, identified a state registration card required for the sale of a weapon, with the signature "William Elliot, 506 West Third street, Eugene, Oregon," home of the father of the accused brothers. The figures 10-30-23 at the top indicated, he said, the date he identified the card.

The defense contends the figures 10-30-23 indicate the date of the sale of the gun, or 19 days after the holdup, to which the witness testified at the first trial.

"I have had time to reconsider," was Bonwell's reply as to the reasons for his changed testimony. The state on re-examination attempted to introduce a private sales record of pistols of Hauser Brothers, and withdrew it when the defense objected.

Twins Divulge Nothing.
COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 14.—Further questioning of Roy and Ray de Autremont, Oregon train holdup suspects, captured in Siskiyou last week, was deferred yesterday by federal officials.

Captain C. W. B. Long, San Francisco postal inspector, who interviewed the twin brothers briefly Sunday, indicated he would talk to them again some time this week, but did not further divulge his plans.

Meanwhile requisition papers for their return to Oregon are being awaited. Assistant United States Attorney Bartles has indicated he will recommend that the prisoners be turned over to Oregon authorities and the prisoners themselves have said they will not fight extradition.

To Jail Twins in Portland.
COURT HOUSE, Jacksonville, Ore., June 14.—Ray and Roy de Autremont, held in Ohio for alleged complicity with their brother, Hugh, now on trial for murder growing out of the same crime, will in all probability be held in the Multnomah county jail at Portland, according to Special Prosecutor George M. Roberts and District Attorney Newton C. Chaney. The twins are expected to start for Oregon the latter part of this week from Columbus, Ohio, in custody of Sheriff Ralph Jennings.

No date has been set for the arraignment of the de Autremont twins, and the tentative date for the trial has been fixed for some time in August.

No arrangements as yet have been made by their parents for providing counsel for them.

FORMULAE TO KILL DRUG HABIT LOOT OF 8 GANGSTERS

CHICAGO, June 13.—Secret formulae, including one for a synthetic non-habit forming narcotic of reputed pain killing potency, may have been the lure which drew eight masked robbers carrying machine guns and revolvers to the Abbott Laboratories in North Chicago early yesterday.

Such was the line along which police today were investigating the robbery which required seven hours in its execution and during which the robbers carefully barricaded themselves behind their machine guns against any possible surprise attack.

Officials of the \$3,000,000 concern, who have posted rewards of \$500 each for the capture of the robbers, expressed themselves, however, as confident no practical commercial use could be made of any formulae that may have been taken, as all are protected under patent laws.

Investigators were told that scientists in the employ of the Abbott Laboratories recently completed a formulae for a synthetic narcotic of greater efficiency in easing pain, but lacking any habit-forming qualities.

Police suggested that a paying bootleg traffic could be carried on if such a formulae should have fallen into robbers' hands, even though patent laws prevented its open sale.

GRANGE IN SESSION
