FORMER ASYLUM INMATE MURDERS 2 MEN, SUICIDES

SHEBOYGAN, Wis., June 13.—The bullets from Walter Doering's revolver which took his own and two other lives yesterday, also widowed two women and made 20 children fatherless.
Doering, 27 years old and partially paralyzed, first shot and killed his 62-year-old father, Frank Doering, following a violent quarrel. Later he went to the home of the Rev. William Wambasans, 55-year-old pastor of the Bethlehem Lutheran church, and told him what had happened. When the pastor showed him no sympathy, Doering killed him and then fired a shot into his own head.
Doering, senior, was released only recently from the state hospital for the insane, where he had been confined for six months. One of his eight surviving children, William, is on parole from the same hospital. Another son, Herma, was the first Sheboygan man to die in the World War.

History Of "Lindy" In a Nutshell

1901—Evangeline Lodge Land, of Detroit, married to Charles H. Lindbergh, military congressman of Little Falls, Minn., where she went as a school teacher.
1902—February 2, son born to Mrs. Lindbergh while at the home of her mother, No. 528 Forest avenue, Detroit, Mich. Christened Charles Augustus.
1910—Charles, now fourteen, exhibits interest in planes, mechanical, and after an hour's instruction, runs an automobile.
1918—Was graduated from high school with no unusually high honors. Entered University of Wisconsin.
1921—Quitted the University of Wisconsin, explaining that he had "taught the professors all he knew."
1921—Having been more interested in aviation than in college life, he entered a flying school at Ely, Neb. Started poorly as a pilot until his first solo flight, when he seemed to develop an unusual air sense.
1922—Toured western United States with only short schooling in aviation, as a stunt and advertising flyer.
1923—Bought his first plane at an army surplus sale at Amesbury, Ore. It was Curtiss "Jenny." He continued his career as a stunt flyer.
1924—March 14. Enlisted as cadet at Kelly flying field, Texas.
1925—March 6. Locked planes with another pilot while in combat practice over Kelly field. Both took to parachutes and were saved, though their planes tumbled in a mass of wreckage.
1925—October 19. Having been 27 years a preacher, left 12 children besides his widow.

FORTY MILLION DOLLAR COMBINE OF STEEL MILLS

(Associated Press—United Wire.)
SAN FRANCISCO, June 14.—The Examiner says a merger of the Columbia Steel Corporation and the Pacific Coast Steel Company, two of the largest companies of their kind on the coast, is nearing completion and an announcement to that effect is expected soon. The merger would involve a \$40,000,000 deal. The newspaper says accountants have been working on the books of both companies to establish values for an interchange of stock.
Columbia Steel has mills at Portland, Ore., and at Pittsburg and Torrance, California. It showed a gross earning of \$6,500,000 in 1925. Officials of neither company commented on the merger report.
