POULTRY REMINDERS

Filthy quarters, dampness, improper ventilation, improper feeding and introduction of infected fowls are some of the causes of disease in poultry flocks.

Chicken-pox appears on fowls as a wart like growth on the comb, wattles and head and usually by presence of cheesy deposits or canker in the mouth.

Colds in poultry are many times the beginning of more serious diseases such as roup, canker and pox.

Droppings are the most dangerous spreaders of diseases among

poultry. It is best to remove them daily or use roosts so constructed that the fowls do not have access to them.

Poor feeding methods are responsible in many cases for high mortality.

Serious diseases in poultry are often introduced by new stock. Adult birds which are bought need be kept separate from the other flock for at least 2 weeks.

The type of poultry house has much bearing on diseases in the poultry flock. Poor ventilation, draftiness, poor protection from rains and lack of sunlight, promote disease.

MAD BULL HAS 8-MILE LEAD IN THE MARATHON

WILLITS, Calif., June 16.—Mad Bull, Karok Indian, leading in the 480-mile marathon run from San Francisco to Grants Pass, Oregon, was four miles from Willits shortly after noon today, eight miles ahead of his nearest rival, Flying Cloud, a fellow tribesman. Mad Bull was 138 miles from Sausalito, from where the runners started at 11:42 Tuesday morning.

Running together approximately seven miles behind Flying Cloud and some 123 miles from Sausalito, were Melika and Chochee, Zuni Indians from New Mexico. They were slowly but surely creeping up on the leaders, a feat considered remarkable as Melika is 55 and Chochee 48 years old. Both were in fine condition. Weather conditions today were better than yesterday when the hot sun taxed the endurance of the contestants to the utmost.
