JAPAN BARNYARD MILLET
PROVES GOOD COAST CROP

Japanese barnyard millet is being established as a regular forage crop in some sections of the Oregon coast, says a new experiment station report, written by A. E. Engbreiten, superintendent of the John Jacob Astor station near Astoria. Coast county agents have been using it as one of their demonstration crops for three years.

The station recommends it for one purpose only, selling or green feed. It is ready to use from August 10 to September 20, just when pastures are shortest and dairy cows falling off in milk production.

It has proved the best green feed available in the coast region at that time of year, taking the place of corn, which is not suited to most coast locations. It does better than corn in the cool districts and does not ripen over the long feeding period.

This millet is a high-yielding, palatable, selling crop, giving an average yield of 12 to 15 tons per acre with as much as 20 on rich soil well moistened. It has not been seen by the station ever to lodge, no matter how heavy it is when struck by wind and rain storms.

In growing the crop the seed bed is the most critical factor, preferably well worked down into a fine and firm condition from early plowing. It starts slowly and suffers from weeds if present, but after a good start competes with any weed. It calls for a rich soil, manure being the one known necessary fertilizer, which is applied on uplands at 15 tons per acre. It is seeded at 20 to 30 pounds per acre depending on the richness of the land. It will not grow if planted too deep, the best depth being a half to three-fourths inch. It will not germinate and grow well in cold weather, so it is not usually sowed in the southern counties before May 1, in the northern before May 10, in average seasons. It may be sowed as late as June if there is enough moisture to start it.

It is cut and fed when 2 1/2 to 3 feet high, being a mass of leaves and stalks. It is not full grown out, except for a little of the very earliest. A second or even a third crop may be grown if frost holds off and conditions are favorable. It will not stand freezing and is to be fed up before killing frosts occur.

EXPLOSION MERE TRIFLE IN U. S. SCIENTISTS' MINE

From the black mouth of a coal mine, gaping in the side of a ravine, suddenly belches a terrifying mass of flame, smoke and gas. A dust explosion—the thing most feared by coal miners—has swept through the workings with annihilating speed. Trained rescue men, wearing grotesque masks and oxygen equipment, plunge into the hole and grope through the deadly murk.

But in that mine, strange to say, are no men to be rescued. The only workers are marvelous instruments of science. For this coal mine is like no other in the world, says Popular Science Monthly for July. It has no production nor profits. Operated by the U. S. Bureau of Mines near Bruce, Pa., its sole output is a new knowledge gained by remarkable experiments to make coal mining more efficient and less hazardous. Engineers and chemists deliberately fill the mine with coal dust and explode it to learn its hazards. They fill the workings with poisonous gas, then enter to observe the effects. At other times they test the safety of mining methods and machines.

To study the effects of made-to-order explosions, observation stations have been established at intervals of 100 feet throughout the mine. In each of these are delicate instruments which record the force and speed of an explosion.

Rock Dust Checks Blast
In producing an explosion, the experimenters first scatter coal dust along the mine entries. Then they load a cannon with black blasting powder and place it near the main entry, pointing outward. An electric switch fires the cannon. From the muzzle shoots a flame. The coal dust, flung into the air, is ignited, and the explosion begins.

Recent tests demonstrated that finely powdered rock dust, scattered through the mine, will act
