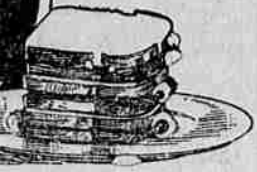

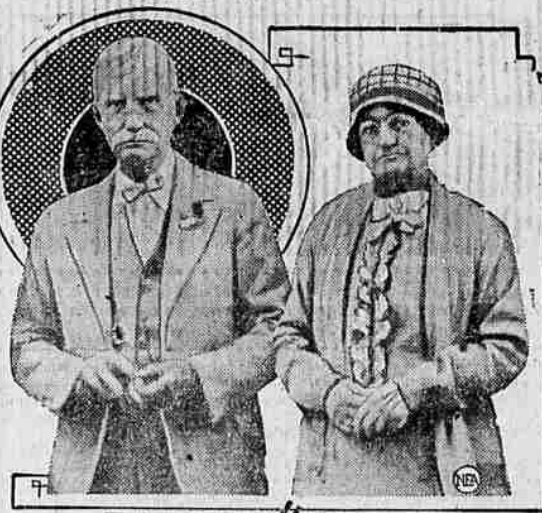

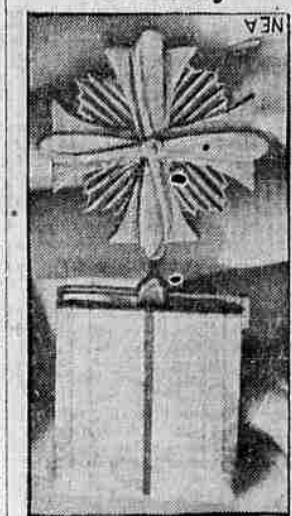
To Portland.—Ford Singleton went to Portland this morning to attend the Rose Festival, while there participating with the local drum corps in the parade.

STATE FOREST BE CREATED IN WEST DOUGLAS

State Today Files on Lands in the Reedsport Section.

TRACTS ARE GROUPED

Oregon and National Government to Exchange Timber Land to Merge Holdings.

The state of Oregon through G. G. Brown, clerk of the state land board, this afternoon filed 118 applications with the Roseburg land office to cover lands granted by the last Congress in exchange for isolated school tracts located in national forest and grant land areas. The lands upon which the state has filed applications lies in Townships 22, 23 and 24 South, range 11 west, being on the Mill-coma river, and situated on the boundary of Coos and Douglas counties a short distance southeast of Reedsport. The tract contains about 70,500 acres.

The transaction is one which has been pending for many years. The state has owned isolated timber tracts scattered among national forests and O. and G. grant land and has been endeavoring to group its holdings in one block, extensive surveys having been made to determine the value of the various scattered tracts. The last Congress passed an act permitting the proper authorities to make the exchange with the state of Oregon. The state today accepted the agreement by making its filings covering the lands conveyed by the federal act.

The state forest is to be used as a laboratory for the students in

the school of forestry at the Oregon Agricultural College, while the revenue from timber sales, will go to the state school fund. It is estimated that the forest will have an annual yield of about 900 board feet an acre, with an annual cut of 1100 acres.
