FIVE POWERS ACT TO KEEP RUSSIA IN GOOD TEMPER

War Against Poland Would Involve Other Nations Attempting Aid in Serious Plight.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

GENEVA, June 17.—Three steps to preserve the peace of Europe in the present troubled situation have been decided upon by the representatives of the Locarno treaty powers attending the league of nations council session here, a spokesman for the German delegation declared today. Great Britain, France, Germany, Belgium and Italy, he said, had decided:

1. To make individual friendly relations between the Polish government and the league of nations council session here, a spokesman for the German delegation declared today.

2. That the powers should make individual representations to the Soviet government to do nothing to endanger the peace of their two countries.

3. To advise both Jugoslavia and Albania to adopt a conciliatory attitude and settle amicably the incident of the arrest of a Jugoslavian legionary dragoman which was followed by rupture of diplomatic relations.

The German spokesman denied that Foreign Minister Stresemann had been sounded by the British foreign secretary concerning the possibility of troops passing through German territory in case Russia attacked Poland. Germany, he added, was more anxious about Franco-German relations than about the Russo-Polish situation, believing the latter not dangerous.

Germans Displeased

The Germans, he continued, were going back to Berlin deeply disappointed because they had only been able to get vague promises that the French troops in the Rhineland would be reduced in number. The Berlin government, he said, wanted more than promises. It appeared that the population of the Rhineland would become incensed at the continued presence of a foreign army, hence the belief that Franco-German relations were more delicate than Russo-Polish.

The French, he charged, were raising questions about the actual legal fulfillment of minor treaty points, such as conversion of military barracks and demilitarization of the Prussian police. Germany would sell or convert the barracks as soon as possible, he asserted, and a bill concerning the police was now before the reichstag.

As for the dismantled military works on the Polish frontier, the spokesman said it had been suggested that an American officer be elected to verify the dismantling.

The French, however, had refused this suggestion and the Germans, acting in the spirit of Locarno, would accept a French officer.

Under these circumstances, the spokesman went on, it would be a bad time to raise the question of using German soil for the passage of French troops to Russia in the event of possible though unlikely Russo-Polish hostilities, because it would mean that Germany, being overrun by French troops, would occupy the same position in Belgium during the world war.

ANALYSIS FOREST DISTRICT COMPLETED

Earl W. At Grants Pass he will be joined by A. O. Waha, assistant district forester from the Portland office, who, passed through here today. They will be accompanied in the Chetco district by forest supervisor Billingslea, of Grants Pass.

HOLD SCHOOLS MEN IN FOREST SERVICE

O. C. Houser and D. N. Matthews are conducting training schools for short term men in the forest service at the respective ranger stations and at the supervisors' offices at various points in the county. The men have just come from Cottage Grove where they completed a school of training and will go to Tillamook to conduct another one June 20 and 21. A school will be held at Steamboat on the North Umpqua also, the dates being June 22, 24 and 25. F. H. Brandage, chairman of the board of fire control of the forest service, of Portland will be present at each of the meetings.

WILL CONSTRUCT NEW FOOT BRIDGES

T. P. Flynn, engineer of the district forest office is spending some time at the districts near Rose-

burg, and with G. A. Bonebrake is supervising some improvement work in the forest district. They have been chiefly concerned with putting in six foot bridges across the North Umpqua between the boundary and Ilahoe, the primary purpose of these bridges being to accommodate fire fighters in the service in getting across the river when necessary.

MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 17.—The local produce market was steady this morning, with plentiful supplies of all seasonable fresh vegetables at attractive prices.

The strawberry market continues steady at attractive prices to home canners. Good local berries are offered at retail as low as 5c per box and \$1.25 per crate. The going retail price for large good quality berries is at 8c per box, 2 for 15. On the wholesale market, Gold Dollars move for from \$1 to \$1.15 per crate, while Marshalls bring from \$1.25 to \$1.35.

Sacked new white potatoes are offered at from 6 to 6 1/2c wholesale. Butter and egg prices are unchanged from yesterday. The fresh country dressed meat and poultry market continues sluggish with demand slow and hens in over supply.

Hogs are around 14c for top and veal top is at 17c. Demand showed signs of greater strength this morning.

BOSTON, June 17.—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"There has been a fairly good movement in wool on the local market during the past week and prices are showing distinct tendency to rise; in fact, some descriptions have been marked up a half cent to a cent a pound and the fractional advance has been paid. The fact that the mills are buying more freely and that there are wider inquiries for tops and yarns is indicative of a better situation in the goods market. The woolen mills are finding a fair volume of business on the whole, although it is not so well distributed.

"The foreign markets are all against the buyer, East India sales in London being up par to five per cent. In the west, buying continues steadily and values are showing an upward tendency, although no marked changes are reported for the week.

"Mohair is steady on moderate trading."

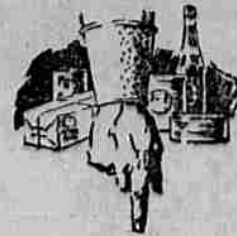
same direction, and as if an order had been issued, they come to a stop at a grain field and begin destruction.

Poison and Fire Used

Man's most effective weapon is poison composed of bran, sawdust, molasses, antyacetate and arsenic. Already thirty tons have been used, with known heavy toll. A grasshopper burner was used to good effect while the different armies were bunched, but with the grasshoppers on the move, the burner could not cover the territory.

When the hoppers are moving to a grain field, poison is ineffective, it must be distributed while they are feeding.

Eggs are laid in hatching beds from one-half inch to one and a half inches in depth. Hatching is induced by warmth. Top layers of eggs were hatched several weeks ago, but only now have the sun's
