COURTHOUSE IS INVOLVED IN LAW QUESTION

(Continued from page 1.)

fund is a matter entirely discretionary with the county court. If this is true in the case of the courthouse, the county court, having discretionary power, may proceed to spend the general fund money for a courthouse without going through the procedure which is provided in other cases.

In the event the court is required to give 60 days notice, then conduct a meeting, and perhaps hold a special election, there will be considerable delay in getting the building underway, and it is the desire of the county court to get started on construction work in the near future. Following the procedure laid down in the law, however, would necessitate, it is plainly seen, long delays and perhaps considerable additional expense in the way of an election.

In order to determine whether or not the law applies where the county already has the money, as is only operative where funds must be raised through taxation or some other way, the attorney general has been asked for an opinion. The law in question reads as follows:

"Section 1. Whenever the county court or board of county commissioners in any county of Oregon deem it advisable to build a new county courthouse, to replace one already in existence, or one destroyed by fire or other natural causes, they may make a levy or in some other lawful manner take the necessary steps to provide funds for this purpose, provided, first, that they shall give notice to the people of the said county not less than sixty (60) days before date of making said levy or taking the necessary steps to provide funds for this purpose. The order for the giving of the said notice shall be made at a regular meeting of the county court or board of county commissioners and shall be entered upon the journal by the clerk at the time and date of making the order. The said notice shall specify clearly the intention of the court or board as to the date of the meeting when the proposed levy is to be made; shall definitely describe the site upon which it is proposed to build the new county courthouse; the approximate cost of same; the approximate date upon which it is proposed to commence construction of same; and the date upon which a public hearing will be had upon the matter, as hereinafter provided for. It shall also be the duty of the county court or the board of county commissioners to make an order for the publication of the said notice in some county newspaper of general circulation, the date of the first publication of same to be not less than sixty (60) days before the date of the proposed levy, and shall be published weekly for four consecutive times thereafter. In the event that there is no newspaper published within the said county then they shall cause the notice to be posted at various places throughout the

county where it may be seen by a majority of the people thereof.

"Section 2. At the time of making the order for the publication of the notice, as provided for in section 1 of this act, it shall also be the duty of the county court to make an order for the date of a meeting at which time a public hearing shall be had upon the matter. The date of this meeting shall be less than ten (10) days not more than thirty (30) days before the date of the meeting when the proposed levy is to be made.

"Section 3. At the time of the meetings of the county court or board of county commissioners, as provided for in section 2 of this act, petitions may be presented asking that the question of making a levy, or otherwise providing funds, for the construction of a county courthouse as proposed by the county court, or the question of the location of the proposed site, or both, be submitted to a vote of the people of the said county. Petitions may also be presented at such meeting proposing the selection of another site or sites for the proposed county courthouse and question of selecting such site or sites be submitted to the people of the county, in which case the question of building the county courthouse, as proposed, and the question of locating the courthouse on the site proposed by the county court, or on the site of sites proposed by petition, shall be submitted to the people of the county. The said petition or petitions shall be signed by not less than ten percent of the qualified electors of the county as shown by the vote for governor within the said county at the last general election, said signers to be also taxpayers as of record upon the assessment rolls of the county for the previous year. Any petition presented in accordance with the provisions of this act must specify clearly the matters therein proposed to be submitted to a vote of the people and shall set forth the form of the proposed ballot in accordance with the provisions of section 4 of this act.

"Section 4. Upon the presentation of a petition or petitions, as provided for in section 3 of this act, it shall be the duty of the county court or the board of county commissioners, at the time of the presentation of the petition or petitions, or within ten days after, to make an order submitting the questions as outlined in the petition or petitions, or within ten days thereafter, to make an order submitting the questions as outlined in the petition or petitions, in accordance with the provisions of said section 3, to a vote of the people at the next regular election or at such purpose, if for any reason it might seem expedient. The ballot for such election shall have printed upon the same, separately and in a definite manner, the questions to be voted upon, and the form of said ballot shall be in the usual form submitting questions to the voters at regular elections. The said ballot shall be in accordance with the rules and laws governing elections in the state of Oregon.

"Section 5. County courts or boards of county commissioners shall not levy or take any other steps to provide funds for courthouse construction, as herein provided for, except in accordance with the will of the people of the said county as shown by the majority vote upon the question submitted at the general or special election held for that purpose; provided for in section 4 of this act, in case the majority vote of the people of the county at said election is in favor of the construction of said courthouse. But nothing in this act shall be construed as to prevent a county court or board of county commissioners from making a levy, or for taking lawful steps to provide funds for new courthouse construction; provided, that the said county court or board of county commissioners shall have observed all of the laws as set forth in sections 1 and 2 of this act; and provided further, that if upon the date set for the hearing, as referred to in said sections 1 and 2, no petitions, as herein provided for, were presented; and provided further, that this act shall in no wise be construed as modifying the law as to the change of county seats nor to authorize the construction of any courthouse on any site outside the boundaries of the county seat, as established by law.

"Section 6. This act shall not apply in cases of the repair and maintenance of county courthouse structures; or in cases of additions thereto, such as jails, vaults, additional offices, etc., but in all cases where the construction of a new county courthouse is proposed in any of the organized counties of the state of Oregon."

WEEK SEES BUSINESS GAIN FOR LUMBER INDUSTRY

NEW YORK, June 17.—The Oregon lumber industry of the United States reported a substantial margin of gain for the week ended June 11 in production, shipments and orders compared with the week before, says the National Lumber Manufacturers' association. Soft wood mills showed gratifying increases in all three items, particularly heavy in new business. Hard wood operations showed marked increase in shipments and slight gains in new business. Unfilled orders of 174 southern pine and west coast mills were 499,209, 254 feet, against 495,883,000 the previous week.

WASHINGTON, June 17.—After August 5, the American Railway Express company must provide for delivering shipments of fruits and vegetables from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and California directly to the Erie railroad pier in New York City, without additional charges for the movement across from Jersey City.

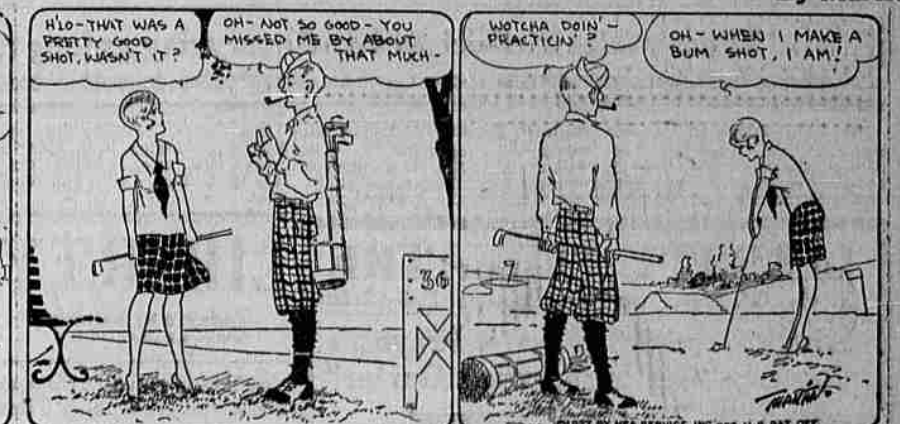
