ROCK USED FOR ROAD WORK HAS VALUABLE ORE

of flux and so its great value is immediately apparent, particularly as the joint created by use of this solder is stronger in many instances than the piece being treated. The metal is being found of extreme value by telephone and telegraph companies in their construction work.

There are other metals present, Mr. Boyer says, but so far the chemists and assayers have not been able to find a satisfactory system for extracting the metal.

While the metal has a low melting point, it may be tempered until it is harder than steel and will take a razor edge. Because of its many peculiar characteristics, it is expected to have a great value when its extraction in commercial quantities is made possible.

Govt. to Experiment.
The government is interested, Mr. Boyer says, because of the fact that the rock bearing this metal is to be found on much government land near Canyonville and Grants Pass.

These lands have been classified as agricultural or timber lands, and the presence of mineral will make a change in their classification, and will increase their value to the government. For this reason the government experts will conduct experiments and investigations to determine the best method of extracting the metal and separating the various elements and also determining the uses to which it may be placed.

There are very extensive deposits of the ore in the Canyonville vicinity, Mr. Boyer says, and much of the ore is to be found on government land. In a test made yesterday a 7-pound rock was made to yield 113 ounces of the metal.

The inspector is greatly enthused over the outlook for the future of this metal and the mining possibilities in Southern Oregon and expects to give considerable time and attention to investigating the possibilities of the metal.

DEATH TAKES LINGUIST AT WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY

GRAYSON CONVICTED; LIFE IMPRISONMENT

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 18.—James H. Grayson, elderly Modoc county, Calif., rancher, was convicted of murder in the second degree by a jury here late yesterday, following his trial on a charge of murdering his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Myrtle Grayson. His sentence was life imprisonment.

The jury deliberated an hour and a half.

Grayson thought his son's wife was accepting the attentions of a man, who, it was claimed at the trial, was courting her sister instead.

In opening his statement, he said: "In my first message to the legislature January, 1927, I urged the enactment of an income tax law to bring about a more equitable distribution of state taxes.
