HOPE SPRINGS IN MISSISSIPPI

"God lets great calamities fall on us in order that we may see, realize and remember the goodness of the hearts and the generosity of the impulses of our fellow men and women—the spectacle of it, demonstrating in spite of our spells of pessimism and cynicism that we are all, after all, one—in spite of differences of section, politics, religion and race. It is being displayed now north, south, east and west. In great emergencies like this our 'Common Fatherhood and Common Brotherhood' become realized facts."

These are the opening words of a message which, for sheer courage, is almost without equal. It is a message to the whole United States, a message to all who have aided in Mississippi flood relief work. It is a message written by one man, John Sharp Williams, former congressman from Mississippi, now a national director of the Red Cross, intended only for his fellow Red Cross workers. It is also, however, a message which speaks for every flood victim of the Mississippi valley. It shows that the valley folk are down, but not out. Hope is still theirs. What do they say? Here is their message:

"The old superb fighting spirit of the south, among those who are helping and those who are being helped and those helping themselves, is being manifested daily and nightly as a living thing, that has never died and can not die; and the outpouring of the hearts of the nation is bidding us 'God speed.'"

"From the Yazoo hills in Mississippi to the foothills of the Ozarks in Arkansas and Missouri and thence southward to the Mexican gulf the Mississippi river has become one vast inland sea—lands submerged, the people refugees. But they are not despairing refugees. Their magnificent sense of humor keeps them from overcomplaining. Thank heaven! these people have ever been able to meet apparent defeat and seemingly overwhelming misfortunes, not only with fortitude, but also with a jest, an anecdote and a smile of encouragement not only for themselves but for their fellows. We are doing all we can for ourselves—for white and for black—and for what is beyond our power to do, others are doing it for us with profound sympathy and heartfelt generosity. We need it all and more, we are thankful for it all and would be thankful even if it were less, and shall never forget it. Meantime where the land is unsubmerged the flowers are blooming, the birds are singing, the darkies are laughing, we are 'stiffening our sinews and summoning up our courage' and 'God is in his heavens.'"

"The great work of rehabilitation is yet ahead of us. Further ahead yet is the work of making safe for the future. The people who built the Panama canal will not grudge an equal sum of money to harness and control the Father of Waters and to make 'The Great Valley' safely habitable and cultivable. The engineering part of the problem is not difficult—it is only stupendous—that is all. It is not so much a question of what to do from an engineer's standpoint, as it is a question of how to get the money to do it with and how rapidly to expend it in the doing. Making 'The Great Valley' safe not only for this generation but for the teeming millions destined hereafter to populate it is worth more to American agriculture, commerce, transportation, manufactures and social life, than ten Panama or other inter-oceanic canals.

"Blessed of all men is he who, 'putting his hands to the plough looketh not back.' This nation will be like that man."

GLENDALE MILLS MAKE RECORD RUN DURING PAST MONTH

What appears to be a record breaker for the local lumber companies appears on the outgoing shipments of lumber which left the local yards the last month, says the Glendale Log.

Practically every mill in the vicinity is going at full tilt and putting their product on the market as fast as it can be produced. If

the present rate of shipment is continued it will not be long until Glendale will be recognized as one of the real lumber centers of the west.

A hundred carloads of lumber left the city, the product of the local mills, during the past month.

The Glendale Lumber company's output last month was the greatest since the business was established twenty-five years ago, 1,300,000 feet of lumber were cut in May, while the shipments amounted to 1,100,000 feet.

The production of the Lyndal-Lawson mill last month amounted to a cutting of 700,000 feet of lumber, which is an average run for this mill.

The Panther Butte mill produced last month 400,000 feet of cut lumber.

The complete production of the smaller mills for May was unobtainable at the present time. The general production, which is about 70 per cent normal, is probably as high as it will be at any time this year. Most of them are operating on a more diversified cut at the present time than usual and prices have held remarkably firm considering that condition. It seems to be the general attitude to keep going as long as the present prices can be secured.

The smaller mills in operation are as follows: Holman & Shelton, John Jantzer, George Jantzer, P. H. Harrel, Ora Condray, Springer & Wilson, Stogler Pine Mill, Jenks, Clair & Son.

The Character of a Good Citizen

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for June 19; The Character of a Good Citizen—1 Peter 2:11-17; 4:1-5.

A Christian is a citizen of two kingdoms. By the fact of being a Christian he has accepted his place in the Kingdom of God, in which kingdom allegiance to Christ is the supreme thing.

This must be for the Christian the place of his primary obligation and if earthly laws or rulers demand of him anything out of harmony with his duty to God, there can be for him only one course, the course that Peter himself followed when his preaching in the early church brought upon him the persecution of the authorities. When he was accused of disobeying the laws of men he replied, "We ought to obey God rather than men."

Earthly Duties Important.

But the Christian is likewise a citizen of an earthly society in which orderly government, no matter how far it may be from ideal government, usually marks a great stage in the progress of man from barbarism. It is the function of government to establish just and fair relations between man and man in society, and it is the duty of every good citizen to strengthen the forces of government, to obey all reasonable and just laws, and to do everything in his power to make society as nearly as possible like the Kingdom of Heaven itself.

Hence the New Testament always represents the entire moral and spiritual obligations of life as related to earthly tasks, relationships and duties. Though the Christian is free and is under a law of conscience, he must not use his freedom as a cloak of offense against his fellow men. His Christian insight and his conscientious scruples must make him all the more careful to do everything possible for the betterment of the life of the community.

It is doubtful whether there can be any good sound citizenship upon any less substantial a foundation. For the time past of our life may be a relationship in which men regard law and government merely as a convenience or as a power for protecting their own property and their personal rights, society will very soon lapse into a condition of anarchy.

RENO, Nevada, June 18.—No longer caring to be a poet's inspiration, Valentina Venitskaya, beautiful young Russian actress, won freedom from Hamilton Phelps Clawson, poet of Brooklyn, New York, in the Washoe county district court yesterday.

Their shattered romance has been the subject of special articles printed in newspapers throughout the United States for several weeks. Their courtship, which took place in England, was said to have been a whirlwind affair as became the wooing of a beautiful Muscovite by an ardent young poet who had been born "with a silver spoon in his mouth." They were married April 12, 1924, in London.

In her complaint she charged that her husband allowed her to purchase her own clothing until her money was gone after which

she was forced to depend on women friends for castoff garments.

Other items in her extreme cruelty complaint were that Clawson neglected her, refused to take her to social functions and when he did occasionally consent always humiliated her by his actions and that he called her "a fool" whenever she ventured opinions of her own.
