BECKLEY BRIDGE NEAR ELKTON TO BE REBUILT

Former Bridge Washed Out During High Water Last February—New One to Be Higher.

Plans have been drawn for the new steel bridge at Elkton, replacing the Beckley bridge which was washed out during the high water in February. The new bridge is to be higher than the former structure, and will also be longer, so that it is believed it will be out of the way of future high water. The former Beckley bridge was built by the removal of the old Winchester bridge at Elkton, where the steel spans were placed on new piers. Despite the warnings of "old-timers" in the Elkton community, the bridge was put only about 35 feet above low water level and during the high water in February the river went clear over the floor of the bridge, piling enough drift against it to carry away the entire structure and two of the piers.

Because of the fact that this bridge served a very rich territory in the Elkton and 30 families reside, the county court is very anxious to rebuild the bridge at the earliest possible date. At present the families must drive between eight and ten miles out of their way in order to get out, and must traverse steep grades and poor roads.

The new bridge will be about 800 feet long, counting the two spans and trestle approaches. It will be about 45 feet above low water level, and the spans will be made longer, so the piers will stand nearer the sides of the stream instead of in the strong current.

The district has a large sum of O. and C. tax refund money to apply to the construction of the bridge, and this will be augmented by market road money. The cost will be about \$25,000.
