\$10,000 VERDICT AGAINST REO AUTO CO. IS AFFIRMED

SALEM, Ore., June 21.—A judgment of \$10,000 granted by the lower court for Multnomah county to the Northwest Auto company in its suit against the Reo Motor Car company, was upheld by the supreme court today in an opinion written by Justice Bean, affirming Judge J. M. Hatchelder. The case was an action for damages for termination of a contract with the Reo Motor Car company for distribution and sale of Reo automobiles. The original contract was modified by subsequent agreement, and the defendant contended there was no acceptance of the contract under the plaintiff's claims. The defendant further claimed that the plaintiff refused to take delivery of various models of automobiles as stipulated. The opinion that no error was made by the trial court in refusing a motion for non suit or in refusing certain requested instructions for a verdict in favor of the defendant.

Other opinions today included: Gordon Lawson, plaintiff and appellant, vs. Thomas A. Huchet, defendant, and respondent, Mary C. Demund, defendant and appellant, appeal from Douglas county, motion to dismiss denied in opinion by Justice Rand.

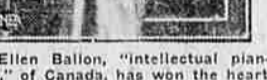
P. M. Matthews Here—Philip M. Matthews, of Salem, formerly of this city, is spending a few days in town visiting with old friends.

Portland, Ore., June 21.—The local butter market holds to a very steady tone. The only price change on the dairy exchange effected for today's trading was a half cent drop in the price of standards, a mere adjustment of prices between grades. With lighter receipts from the country, dealers have been withdrawing from local storage supplies which heretofore have been mounting. Needs of short holders to fill orders have been an additional cause for withdrawals. All grades of eggs were advanced a cent on the dairy exchange yesterday. The market trend is firm, with lighter receipts developing with the continued warm weather. The wholesale market for poultry and dressed country meats continues about steady with the week's opening low price ranges. Trading is generally slow. Strawberries of finest quality are new on the market in large quantities at season's lowest prices. The season is regarded as having reached its flood. Lettuce and peas are still being shipped from this district, with peas selling at 6 1/2c a pound. Cabbage brings from 5 to 6c a pound.
