MENUS for the Family

BY SISTER MARY
Breakfast—Stewed figs, cereal, cream, asparagus omelet, popovers, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Casserole of spring vegetables, brown bread, cottage cheese, drop cakes, milk, tea.

Dinner—English mutton chops, diced potatoes in cream sauce, lettuce cabbage, lettuce and tomato salad, cherry pie, milk, coffee.

English mutton chops are cut about two inches thick. They can be pan broiled or broiled under or over the broiler heat.

Casserole of Spring Vegetables
Three tablespoons butter, 1 small head lettuce, 2 cups new peas, bunch new carrots, 1 bunch asparagus, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 cups chicken stock.

Melt butter in casserole. Add lettuce trimmed and cut in thin slices. Stir with a fork until thoroughly blended with butter. Add peas, carrots scraped and cut in strips and asparagus cut in inch lengths. Season with salt, sugar and pepper and add chicken stock. Cover and cook in a moderate oven for one hour.

If the stock is heated to the boiling point before using, the dish will cook in less time.

CARMEL, N. Y., June 21.—Edward West Browning believes "Peaches," his Cinderella wife, is not a public entertainer to pay for her own legal battles.

In six affidavits filed in court here in answer to his wife's plea for an additional \$10,000 for legal fees, counsel for the wealthy real estate operator alleges: Mrs. Browning has earned more than \$36,247 since April from theatre and night club contracts.

Mrs. Browning told the court she was "not in a position to financially prosecute" her appeal from the supreme court decision granting Browning a legal separation from her and denying her further alimony.

BYRD'S PLANE OF TYPE OF ONE USED IN POLAR FLIGHT

America Can Carry Nearly
1,300 Gallons of Gas,
Enough to Take It
4,000 Miles.

NEW YORK, June 20.—The America, triple motored Fokker monoplane, is patterned after the craft Commander Richard E. Byrd used to cross the North Pole but 71 feet, a length over all of 48 feet is large.

The plane has a wing span of 47 and a height of 12 1/2 feet. Its wing spread is 735 square feet. Empty it weighs 5,640 pounds and equipped for the flight to Paris scales 12,297 pounds.

With nearly 1,300 gallons of gasoline on board, Commander Byrd estimated that his plane would fly possibly 50 hours with a radius of more than 4,000 miles.

One huge tank, suspended from the wing beam instead of being built in the fuselage, holds 800 gallons.

One motor is placed in the nose of the fuselage, with the other two suspended on each side of the wing.

The plane has a dump valve attached to the main tanks and in case of a forced landing the heavy cargo of gasoline can be emptied in a few minutes.

Two rubber fabric boats are carried with compressed air generators, hand pumps, signal devices and food in a compartment in the rear of the plane, this being the last part of the craft likely to be submerged in case of disaster. Fishing poles, lines and bait are also carried.

It is estimated that the rubber boats will remain afloat 30 days and in their water-tight pockets are enough food to last Byrd and his two aides that period.

The America will be identified in the air without difficulty. In addition to the distinguishing mark of the three motors, its name is painted in large red, white and blue letters and a gigantic star has a monogram, A.T.C. in the center, these initials standing for the owning company, the America Trans-Oceanic company.

CHANCE OF SEEING 10,000 FARMERS IS GIVEN COOLIDGE

RAPID CITY, S. D., June 21.—The opportunity of seeing 10,000 farmers at one time has been opened to President Coolidge and it has been indicated that he will avail himself of the chance.

The farmers will assemble in Ardmore, S. D., nearly a hundred miles from Rapid City, for a picnic, an invitation for which has been presented to Mr. Coolidge by a delegation from the city. The picnic will be held July 16 and the farmers are expected to come from South Dakota, Nebraska and Wyoming.

Should the president accept, he would see a large portion of the Black Hills this summer since he has already decided to go into the northern hills for the western celebration at Deadwood in August. A trip to Belle Fourche, also to the north, for a roundup next month, is under consideration and the president has received an invitation to attend an Indian picnic at the Pine Ridge Indian Agency, 125 miles from here, south of the Bad Lands.

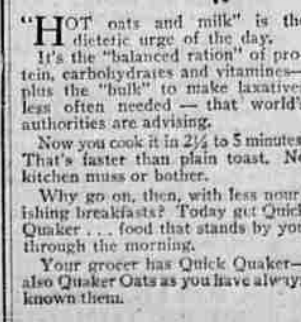

Fresh picked Oregon's of good quality sold around \$1 per crate wholesale. On the retail market, crate prices were \$1.15 and \$1.25 with single boxes selling at five and six cents.
