The points upon which scoring is based are as follows: General appearance, 8 points; evenness of bake, 12 points; flavor (aroma), 10 points; texture, 30 points; taste, 40 points. In the pie contest the scoring will be general appearance, 10 points; tenderness of crust, 40 points; evenness of bake, 12 points; flavor (aroma), 8 points and taste, 30 points.

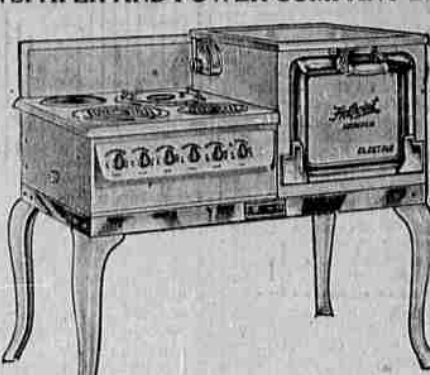

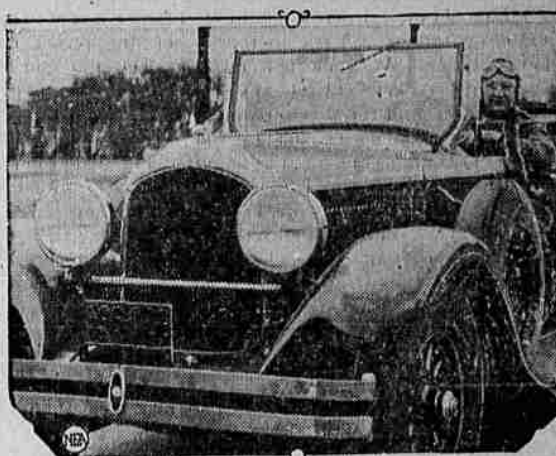

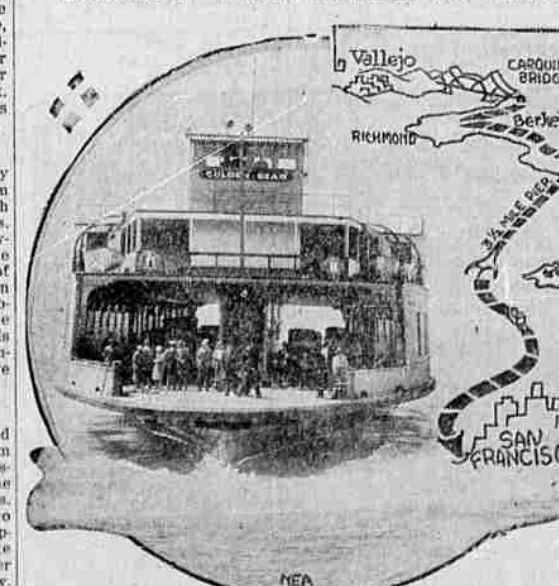
