LIFE IN DAKOTA FOR COOLIDGE IS PLEASANT SPELL

President Readily Adapts Himself to Customs of Region; Rodeo for His Birthday.

RAPID CITY, S. D., June 22.—The spirit of the West seems to have completely overtaken President Coolidge and before he returns to Washington he will have shared in large measure the life of South Dakota, which, in many ways, is typical of "the great bread basket of America."

Not only has he entered eagerly into the activities of the new life surrounding him, but he has taken a taste for its clothes as well as to the ten gallon hats, which he wears frequently around the summer White House. There have been added a pair of walking or riding breeches and some boots. In these he likes to go fishing or sit in the early evening before dinner on the porch of the state game lodge.

The president has before him on his way back to Washington another trip to the heart of South Dakota, south Minnesota and a corner of Wisconsin. On the way out he remarked upon the fine appearing crops and by the time he returns the fields of rye, wheat, corn and flax should be well on their way to a golden harvest.

But, while these will give him a glimpse of the great farming regions of the country, his trips to Deadwood and Bellefourche, S. D., will provide scenes of the dyed-in-the-wool West. At Deadwood the old mining days of 1876 will be re-staged and in Bellefourche, the President and Mrs. Coolidge will witness one of the most extensive rodeos the West knows. The Deadwood trip will be made in early August and the journey to the rodeo city comes on July 4, Mr. Coolidge's 55th birthday.

PENDLETON FEARS TRADE LOSS FROM PROJECTED R. R.

PENDLETON, Ore., June 22.—Declaring that the proposed extension of the Union Pacific system from Homestead, Oregon, to Lewiston, Idaho, along the Snake River as recommended by the public service commissioners of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, would prove an economic detriment to the communities of eastern Oregon, the board of directors of the Pendleton Commercial association last night passed resolutions condemning the action of the Oregon commission.

The local group believes that the extension would divert much of the traffic now handled over the main line and would result in a general curtailment of business being conducted over the line. The directors also feel that the Oregon commission acted without taking into consideration the effect such a line would have on Eastern Oregon.

ANNUAL BUCK AND BILLY SALE TO BE HELD SATURDAY

The annual buck and billy sale, in which an opportunist offers sheep and goat owners to dispose of or purchase purebred animals, is to be held Saturday at 2 p. m. at the Kohlshagen stockyards in North Roseburg. These sales have been held annually in the past and have been very beneficial as they enable the sheep and goat owners to dispose of their surplus bucks and billys, while those desiring purebred stock can secure such animals as they want.

The sales are conducted by the extension service of the Oregon Agricultural college through the office of the county agent. The rules provide that only purebred animals are eligible for entry and care will be taken to check up on this matter. Entries may be made at the office of the County Agent and animals must be on hand by 10:30 a. m. on the day of the sale. Food is to be furnished by the owner.

The animals will be sold at public auction to the highest bidder, any entry selling for a figure not up to the owner's expectations, however, will give the owner the option of withdrawing all additional entries.

No animal is to be removed until settlement is made with the clerk of the sale.

JOHNNY FARRELL BREAKS RECORD BY 3-TIME VICTORY

SHAWNEE-ON-DELAVARE, Pa., June 22.—Three times winner of the Shawnee open golf tournament, an achievement no other player has been able to accomplish in the 15 years the event has been in competition, was the record held today by Johnny Farrell, colorful professional of the Quaker Ridge Club, Mamaroneck, N. Y.

In winning the 72 hole event yesterday, Farrell set a dizzy pace and triumphed over one of the strongest fields in his try tournament, including Tommy Armour, recently crowned open champion of the United States, and several former national titleholders.

The Quaker Ridge star's score of 68-70-72-69—279, clipped four strokes from the old record four strokes and was 10 strokes better than Willie MacFarlane, Tuxedo, N. Y., who won second prize. In three of the four rounds, Farrell broke par; in the other he had a par 72.

NEW YORK, June 22.—Invitations to confer with President Coolidge in South Dakota within the next few weeks have been received by Minnesota Farm Bureau leaders and other agricultural experts of the northwest, it has been announced by J. F. Reed, president of the Minnesota Farm Bureau Federation.

The meetings will be a series of individual and informal visits, it was understood, rather than a general conference of a group of agricultural leaders with the executive. Although no date has yet been set for the conferences, it was indicated that they would begin soon, continuing at intervals throughout the summer.

Mr. Reed explained that the invitations he and others had received to go to Rapid City were in the form of personal letters.

STATE BUILDING ACT IN SUPREME COURT

SALEM, Ore., June 22.—That the state would create an indebtedness in excess of \$50,000 and thereby violate the state constitution was the contention of attorneys for the Eastern and Western Lumber company and Fodor Pederson in combating the argument of the state yesterday before the supreme court relative to the proposed construction of a new state office building in Salem.

The state's attorneys met this argument by declaring that the money, since it is to be borrowed from the state accident commission funds would be in the nature of an investment.
