## MOTION PICTURE FIRMS TO SWING AX ON SALARIES

(Associated Press Leased Wire)  
HOLLYWOOD, Cal., June 24.—Sixteen motion picture companies, including all of the major producers, were on record today as committed to a necessitated drastic economy program involving the immediate ten to 25 per cent slashing of salaries, ranging the lists from presidents and vice presidents, through contract-featured players, down to fifty dollar a week employees.

The production cost retrenchment, which executives of the companies announced after a conference late yesterday, will have the far reaching effect of reducing incomes in not only the production departments at Hollywood, but in distribution, eastern executive offices, and probably soon to the movie company controlled exhibition houses.

Around 15,000 executives, salaried officers, directors and stars, will shortly feel the axe digging into their incomes in amounts ranging up to 25 per cent. An estimated 40,000 more non-contract players, extras, office workers, film editors, cameramen, production employees and distribution managers and employees will suffer an immediate salary slash of above 10 per cent. In this connection, it was pointed out that the movies employ a negligible number of persons at salaries of less than the stated minimum of fifty dollars weekly.

### MAJOR LILLAGAR NEW COMMANDER OF STATE G. A. R.

SALEM, Ore., June 24.—With over 200 of the remaining 700 Civil war veterans in the state present, the 1927 encampment closed here last night with the installation of Major H. S. Lillagar, Portland, as department commander.

Major Lillagar was elected over Clayton B. Zeck, of Bandon, by a 72 to 40 vote. For seven consecutive years he has been commander of the Ben Butler post in Portland. J. J. Newmeyer, Salem, was named senior vice commander; Royal Taylor, Sumner Post, Portland, Junior Vice Commander; Dr. James Lisle, Salem, chaplain; C. M. Daugherty, Springfield, delegate at large; and William Lyman, Medford; Charles True, Sherwood; R. C. Markee and T. Brulette, Portland, delegates to the national encampment in July.

Joint installation of officers in Ladies of the G. A. R. and the Women's Relief Corps was also held last night in connection with the closing of the encampment.

## SUPPORT URGED FOR BILL CLOSING NESTUCCA RIVER

The Douglas county sportsmen are being urged by the Oregon State Sportsmen's association to assist in carrying the Nestucca River referendum bill. This is a bill to close the river to commercial fishing. A meeting of the county game protective association is being called for tonight to consider what action will be taken.  
It is pointed out in a letter received by A. A. Lockwood, president of the county organization, that the river was closed by an act of the last legislature, but that commercial fishing interests have invoked the referendum, making an affirmative vote of the people necessary at the election to be

held next Tuesday. It is stated that there is no other place where net fishing is permitted in such a small stream. The Nestucca river, it is said, is an important egg taking

stream, but the use of nets is threatening the extermination of salmon and steelhead trout.

The letter draws a contrast between the value of the stream for commercial fishing and as a tourist and anglers' attraction. The commercial interest, it is pointed out, claim that the state is deriving much benefit in the way of revenue, while the actual figures show that only \$663.75 was received as license and \$1,903.69 from poundage tax, and considerably more than this sum was spent for law enforcement.

The local sportsmen are asked to give their support to the bill and to work in its behalf.

## Close the Nestucca to Nets

Vote 322 X YES, on the Nestucca Fish Closing Bill

One of Oregon's important assets is the pleasure of outdoor life. To protect these assets it is necessary to conserve the fish in our streams.

The Nestucca River is the most accessible and popular stream in the northwestern part of the state.

The use of nets in this stream threatens extermination of salmon and steelhead trout. The catch taken by commercial fishermen is steadily decreasing.

The 1926 catch was 100,000 pounds less than that of the previous year.

Let us save the stream before the fish are all destroyed.

The Nestucca river belongs to all the people of the state and not to a small commercial group who are destroying a valuable state property.

In 1926 the state received only \$663.75 in license from the commercial group on the Nestucca River.

The poundage tax paid the state in 1926 was only \$1,903.69.

It has cost the state far more to enforce the law than it has received in fees.

On the other hand, the tourist travel of residents and visitors results in millions of dollars being spent annually in Oregon. Let us encourage and develop tourist attractions rather than destroy them.

Bill will appear on the Ballot Title as follows:

**NESTUCCA BAY FISH CLOSING BILL**—Purpose: to prohibit the taking or fishing for salmon or silver food fish in Nestucca Bay and its tributaries at any time by any means whatsoever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling.

**322 X YES—Vote for the proposed law.**
