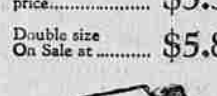

THE SECOND EPISTLE OF PETER AND THE EPISTLE OF JUDE—WARNING AGAINST FALSE TEACHERS

Both of these letters were written about the same time and for the same purpose of warning their readers against false teachers. Peter's second epistle differs from his first in that the purpose of the first letter is to encourage Christians to remain steadfast against persecution and trial of their faith assailing them from outside the fold, while the second letter warns against the perils of foes within the fold.

Quite naturally, since he is dealing with false teaching as opposed to what they had been led to know as the truth, his keywords are "knowledge" and "rememberance". He speaks with the authority of an eyewitness of the deity and glory of Christ and not as a "follower of cunningly devised fables." And yet he reminds them that in the holy scriptures they have "a more sure word of prophecy" because these scriptures "came not by the will of man, but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost."

The Christian who falls a prey to false teachers is the one who has not known or has not held in remembrance the truth taught in the scriptures.

The marks of a false teacher which he mentions are covetousness and licentiousness perpetrated in the name of religion and the making mockery of the second coming of Christ.

His solemn warning is the fate of the fallen angels, of the world in Noah's day and of the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah. To these he adds the warning of the fate of Balaam as an outstanding false teacher of their own history.

Peter's final appeal is made in two great words which sum up the message of the entire letter, viz. "Beware" and "Grow." "Beware lest ye also, being led away with the error of the wicked, fall from your own steadfastness. But grow in grace and in knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."

The key-note of Jude's brief letter is "Content earnestly for the faith which was once for all delivered unto the saints."

Those with whom his readers must contend are the same false teachers against whom Peter had warned them, and Jude's description of them is quite similar and his warnings almost identical.

These false teachers are "ungodly men, turning the grace of our God into lasciviousness, and denying our only Master and Lord Jesus Christ."

He cites from their own history the fate of their ancestors in the wilderness, the fallen angels and the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah, together with Cain, Balaam and Korah, much as Peter does in his letter.

He exhorts them to keep themselves in the love of God, and for this keeping commends them "to him that is able to keep them from falling and to present them faultless before the presence of His glory."

Both of these letters are like an echo of the words of Christ in the Sermon on the Mount, "Beware of false prophets which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening wolves."

Employment of some fifty men of Drain and vicinity, is given by the Drain sawmill which is now operated by R. A. Harlan, under lease from Ernest Whipple, who has owned the mill for a number of years and formerly managed it. The sawmill started up in April and is running full shift, as is the planing mill.

Logs are bought mostly on contract, and a large crew of men are working in the woods around Drain, while six trucks are hauling to the mill.

The majority of logs are No. 1 fir, and these are saved and shipped as rough and dressed lumber. A small part of the rough lumber is used locally, but the major portion of it is shipped out. Part of the No. 1 timber is made into ties which are readily taken by the railroad companies.

According to Mr. Harlan, a ready market is found for all the lumber they can ship, and while the lumber market has been so weak for three years, that only fair profits are made, they are doing well in the smaller mills. Mr. Harlan is shipping six cars a day, nearly all of it going east.

The Drain mill is putting out about 20,000 feet a day, and about twenty-five men are at work in the mill, and when business justifies it the output may be increased to upwards of 40,000 feet per day.

BEND PEOPLE BUY SERVICE STATION AT DRAIN

Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Mason, recently from Bend, have purchased the service station at the south city limits of Drain, formerly owned by I. F. Clark, and are enlarging and improving the place.

Mr. Mason, who understands mechanics, is fixing up a repair shop, while Mrs. Mason is in charge of the little store and is also serving meals. They draw a good trade and are finding business good. They plan to erect a number of cabins next year, believing that Douglas county presents more opportunities than the many other sections they visited while looking for a location.

LEONA MILLS NOW OPERATING AFTER 5 YEARS' IDLENESS

Town Taking on New Life as Result of Activity in Timber and Mills.

After a shut-down of five years the little town of Leona, three miles north of Drain, which seven years ago was a thriving city, only to sink again into apathy—a deserted town—is once more on the map, and the sound of the whistle is once again heard in the land.

Through a slump in the lumber trade five years ago the Leona Mills, which gave employment to a large number of men, making a town rated as one of the busiest lumber centers of the state, were forced to close down, and for five years silence has reigned in Leona and nine miles of logging railroad has rusted with disuse.

This spring, Roy A. Beebe, owner-operator of the mill at Comstock closed down there and moved his equipment to Leona, to add to that already there, having secured the mill and timber holdings.

Fifteen men are employed in the woods and the logs, which run mostly No. 1 grade, are being hauled in by truck. Work on a three mile spur track which will tap enough timber to last for 25 years of cutting, is to begin shortly, and if finished by fall, the crew

will be kept in the woods all winter and the mill can continue operating through the rainy season. Twenty-five men are now employed in the mill which has a capacity of 40,000 feet a day, and a number of men are employed in repair work. The finished lumber is being shipped out, mostly to eastern markets. Grant Tower, formerly of Cottage Grove, and for 35 years an auditor and public accountant, has taken position in the office and is in charge of the books. Mr. Leonard, formerly of Drain, is in charge of the store and some 20 families are living near the mill, while still other employees drive down from Cottage Grove.
