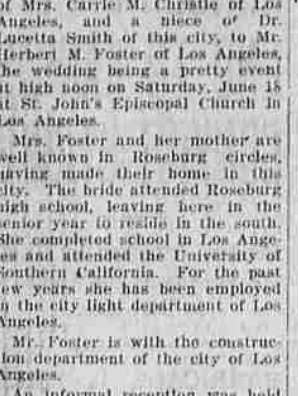
Lovely Affair Honors Miss Gertrude Wickham
