SUPPORT THE SPORTSMEN.

The action of the Douglas County Sportsmen's Association in urging the electorate to vote for the closing of the Nestucca river to commercial fishing should meet with favorable response on election day. The issue involved will sooner or later be applied to the Umpqua river, just as it has been to other streams in the state and with favorable results, and Douglas county should go on record in favor of that protection to other rivers which she intends in time to ask for her own. Almost without exception the state press is backing the move to close the Nestucca to net fishing in line with the ever-growing state-wide sentiment to abolish commercial fishing in all of the streams, save the lower portion of the Columbia, and let all of the people, to whom the fish really belong, as do the game of the forests, have the benefit of unrestricted angling. The Portland Oregonian has this to say on the subject:

"It is the right of men and women, and children, too, to have the enjoyment of streams of Oregon—unspoiled and populous waters, that are not barred by nets. Surely this demand, as it pertains to one river of many, is not unreasonable. We say this because it is the fact that sportsmen are interested in the closing of the Nestucca. But a sportsman may be, and more often is, a true conservationist. And there is yet another benefit to consider. It is certain that the Nestucca, closed to commercial fishing, will yield greater revenues for its tributary locality—far greater—than ever it has yielded through the spreading of nets. It will yield these revenues through the visits of anglers, not only from this state, but from all states. There is profit in closing the Nestucca.

"If it be a matter of sentiment, well and good; for none need be ashamed of wishing to see a river bright with its own runs of migratory fish. But it is more than a matter of sentiment. It is the soundest policy of conservation, and conservation is not to be excelled in economic soundness. The Oregonian believes that the people should close the Nestucca to commercial fishing. The Oregonian has worked consistently for the cause of conservation. It is no false prophet. Good will come of this closing—or evil will come of an open river."

HOW ADVERTISING GAINS.

It is remarkable the way advertising is going ahead in this country. A new style of developing business is being seen by an eastern periodical.

Take national advertising, for instance. According to the figures of the American Newspaper Publishers' association, this form of advertising in the newspapers increased nearly 7 per cent in 1926 over the previous year. The country is increasing in population at about the rate of one and one-half per cent annually. That means that national advertising is increasing about five times as fast as population.

It seems probable that retail stores advertising is increasing at least as fast as in the case of nationally advertised goods. The reason for this is simple, that business men have discovered that it is possible to make an enormous increase in business by letting people know what they have to sell and what the reasons are for patronizing them.

Some claim that this results in inducing people to buy more than they can afford, as wants are developed in their minds that they did not have before. But the result is also that as people find newer and better ways of living, they are induced to work and save in order to buy this new equipment. And in the majority of cases, they get direct benefits from the news forms of equipment that increase their producing power.

The business men would not be using advertising so much more freely, if they had not amply demonstrated that it pays. They find that the sale of any good article, or the receipts of any good store, can be enormously increased through the power of publicity. They have reached the conclusion that advertising is an essential element in a growing business, and that it reduces costs by so enlarging trade that their overhead and sales expenses are relatively less per article sold.

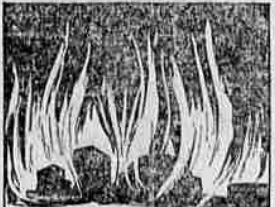

PLANS DRAWN FOR NEW HIGH SCHOOL AT CAMAS VALLEY

Portland Architect Completing Specifications for Structure to Be Started Soon.

F. Manson White, Portland architect, who drew the plans for the new high school in Roseburg, is now preparing plans for the union high school building to be erected this summer at Camas Valley. The building is to cost approximately \$15,000, the voters of the district having authorized the issuance of \$25,000 to be added to money already on hand to build the structure.

Plans, which will be out next week, call for frame construction or concrete walls, which in either case will be finished in stucco. The extreme measurements of the building, which is in the shape of a "Y," are approximately 100 by 150 feet. It will have one-story and basement.

To three sections, adjoining each to three sections, adjoining each other so as to form one large building. A unique feature employed in the arrangement is that the auditorium and gymnasium, which will form one unit, will serve the purpose of both school and community uses, having a separate entrance in addition to that connection with the school unit. This section will be 45 by 32 feet a 17 by 30-foot stage and balconies at the rear along one side.

Modern locker and lavatory quarters will be constructed in a single section between the school unit and the auditorium. This portion of the building will be 35 by 55 feet and will have stairs leading to the basement and to boys' and girls' playgrounds as well. Separate playgrounds for boys and girls will be built in the basement, which will also house the boilers, furnace and fuel rooms.

The main unit of the building will contain two class rooms for grades, a general science room, library and study rooms, waiting rooms and an office for the principal. This portion of the building will be on a higher level than the other portion, the basement being under this part alone.

Delco electric system will be installed to furnish light and electric power for fans. Septic sewage tanks will also be installed.

The work is expected to be completed by October 15.

PETER'S LIFE AND WORK

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for June 25: Peter's Life and Work. See Review of the Quarter's Lessons.—1 Peter 5:1-11.

Peter, from almost every point of view, is a figure of unfailing interest. As a man one is attracted to him because of his impetuous and passionate ways. He was a leader of men, fearless and foremost, always equal to every emergency, but not always quite achieving the part that he attempted, so that the periods of passion and impetuosity were closely related to periods of discouragement and failure.

Jesus understood Peter a great deal better than he understood himself. Jesus knew his strength, but he knew also Peter's great weakness even where Peter was hardly conscious of his own shortcomings. It was the saying of Peter that Jesus understood him and that Jesus loved him and was patient with him.

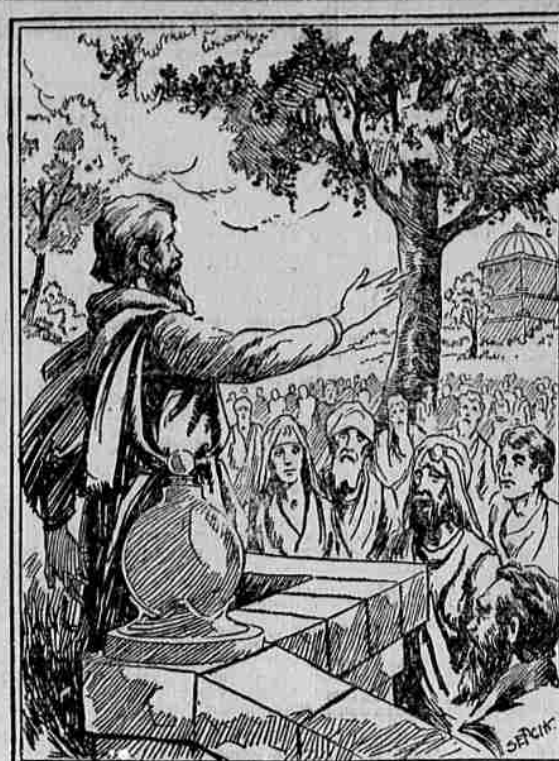
Peter as Christian

As a Christian Peter is fully as interesting as in his basal human character. Even when his life had become sanctified by Christian faith and purpose, he revealed still something of these strange and contradictory elements. His old prejudices died hard.

In the vision on the housetop he reminds God that he has never eaten anything common or unclean, and in his wakening hours he needs the distinct rebuke and inspiration of the vision to induce him to be Christlike and brotherly toward Gentile converts to the Christian way.

His impulsive strength made him a power on the day of Pentecost as his preaching convinced men and women and brought many into the Christian church. But apparently, Peter was more successful as an evangelist than as a great upbuilder of converts into their new-found faith. Paul was, apparently, much more successful in the needed task of Christian education.

The story of Peter is the story of the triumph of the Gospel. Peter

The elders which are among you I exhort, who am also an elder, and a witness of the sufferings of Christ, and also a partaker of the glory that shall be revealed:

Feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, not by constraint, but willingly; not for filthy lucre, but of a ready mind;

Neither as being lords over God's heritage, but being ensamples to the flock.

And when the chief Shepherd shall appear, ye shall receive a crown of glory that fadeth not away.

Likewise, ye younger, submit yourselves unto the elder: yea, all of you be subject one to another, and be clothed with humility; for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble.

Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time:

Casting all your care upon him, for he careth for you. Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour:

Whom resist, steadfast in the faith, knowing that the same afflictions are accomplished in your brethren that are in the world. But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered a while, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you:

To him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.

Criminal Information Amendment—Purpose: To provide that if any person appears before any judge of the circuit court and waives indictment for the commission of any crime or misdemeanor such person may be charged in the circuit court with any such crime or misdemeanor on information filed by the district attorney.

304 Yes. I vote for the amendment.

305 No. I vote against the amendment.

Vote yes or no.

Submitted by the Legislature—Legislators' Pay Amendment—Purpose: To fix the compensation of members of the legislature at not to exceed \$10 a day, during regular and extra sessions, and such pay not to exceed in the aggregate \$400 for per diem allowance for any one regular session.

The presiding officers to receive additional compensation equal to 50 per centum of their per diem allowances as members.

306 Yes. I vote for the amendment.

307 No. I vote against the amendment.

Vote yes or no.

Submitted by the Legislature—State and County Officers Salary Amendment—Purpose: To amend article XIII of the constitution of the state of Oregon so as to require that the compensation of all state and county elective officers shall be provided by law, but no salary of any such officer shall be increased during the term of office for which he shall have been elected.

310 Yes. I vote for the amendment.

311 No. I vote against the amendment.

Vote yes or no.

Submitted by the Legislature—City and County Consolidation Amendment—Purpose: To authorize any city of over 100,000 population situated wholly within one county to consolidate by its charter with any or all other public corporations of said county. Such consolidation may include territory without the city, but within the county. Such charter must be submitted separately to the electors of said city and of the territory proposed to be consolidated with it, and to be adopted must receive a majority vote in each. If so approved notice thereof with copy of such charter shall be sent secretary of state. Legislature shall provide for government of any remainder of county.

313 No. I vote against the amendment.

Submitted by the Legislature—Veterans' Memorial and Amory Amendment—Purpose: To authorize any county having 250,000 or more population to issue bonds not exceeding one-fourth of 1 per cent of assessed valuation of property therein to provide a site, and for constructing, furnishing and equipping a veterans' memorial and amory building in any city having 100,000 or more population and one or more fully organized veterans' units, and to levy annual taxes free from the

6 per cent limitation, of not exceeding one-half mill on each dollar of assessed valuation to provide for payment of such bonds with interest.

314 Yes. I vote for the amendment.

315 No. I vote against the amendment.

Vote yes or no.

Submitted by the Legislature—State Tax Limitation Amendment—Purpose: To authorize the state to levy upon property in December, 1925, an amount of tax not exceeding \$250,000, plus 6 per centum thereof, less the estimated collections of income taxes during 1925, and in any year thereafter not to exceed said amount with any authorized increase thereof previously levied, plus 6 per centum thereof, less estimated collections of income taxes during ensuing year; the constitutional limitations applying both to general property and income taxes, but not to millage levies authorized by the people, nor to taxes levied for payment of bonded indebtedness, or interest thereon, nor to other revenues.

317 No. I vote against the amendment.

Submitted by the Legislature—Income Tax Bill—Purpose: To levy annually a progressive state income tax upon net incomes of per-

sons and corporations resident and non-resident in the state from every source within the state; excepting from net income of a single person, \$1,000; married person, head of family, or husband and wife together, \$2,000, and for each child or dependent under certain conditions, \$400; corporations, \$2,000 each; and submitting to the legal voters the question whether the state shall raise by taxation during 1925, \$2,000,000 in excess of the 6 per cent limitation provided in section 11 of article XI of the constitution.

318 Yes. I vote for the proposed law.

319 No. I vote against the proposed law.

Referred by L. B. Smith, 119 Oregonian building, Portland, Oregon—Property Assessment and Taxation Enforcement Bill—Purpose: To authorize State Tax Commission to supervise and control administration of assessment and tax laws, of county assessors, equalization boards and other taxing officers; to examine, test and correct assessors' work, assess omitted property, reassess improperly valued property, direct county equalization boards to raise or lower valuations; to authorize assessors and tax commission to require production of books, records, and

sworn information concerning capital assets, liabilities, earnings, expenses, taxes, and amount and value of property; authorizing appeals from county boards to state commission and from latter to courts; punishing failure to furnish such information and other violations with heavy penalties.
