HEALTH OFFICERS GIVE ADVICE ON PUBLICITY WORK

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., June 28.—Newspaper readers are done with the bank of yesterday and they look to science, not to magic for their maximum well-being and enjoyment of life, Edward McKernon, superintendent of the Eastern Division of The Associated Press, today told the annual conference of Health Officers and Public Health Nurses.

Speaking on the subject of how the health officer can use the newspaper for the dissemination of health news, Mr. McKernon said the masses "look to you of medicine for that public health without which no nation can long endure."
"You cannot overtake disease but you can head off that which threatens. You can't treat the millions but you can teach the millions to treat themselves. Here are the people. In the press we offer you the only medium through which they can be consistently reached."

Mr. McKernon urged the health officers to approach the press in the name of News.
"That is your only claim to space in the strictly news column," he continued. "Honest news walks in the front door of the newspaper shop and is welcomed by the editor. Subliminal propaganda climbs the fire escape and is thrown out the window. It must be so."
"Do not exploit yourself. Exploit the news. Do not label every story that originates with you with your name. Occasional official statements issued by you will be good, but generally speaking make your stories impersonal."

"Get the reporter working for you by giving him tips on stories. Tell the reporter that there is a story in the health menacing dump in the north end of the city. Tell him why there is news in that situation. Help them to be technically correct in their stories, but do not be too fussy about having them use just the phraseology that you would use. You cannot write news in the Latin of medical prescriptions. You must write in the language that the newspaper readers will understand."

"Try to see the brighter side of your work. Make your stories cheerful. Emphasize not death with depressing statistics, but stress the joy of life. Let sunshine radiate from the office of the health commission. Throw a beam into the community now and then if it seems necessary, but remember that newspaper readers shrink from the unpleasant. Accomplish the thing you have in mind by telling them how they can have long and get the maximum happiness out of life. When all is said and done, that is what they wish to know."

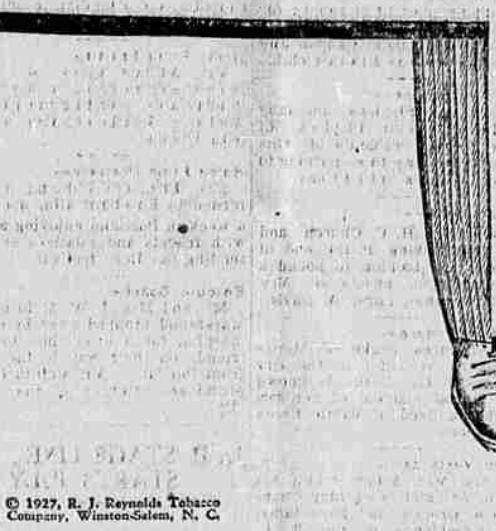
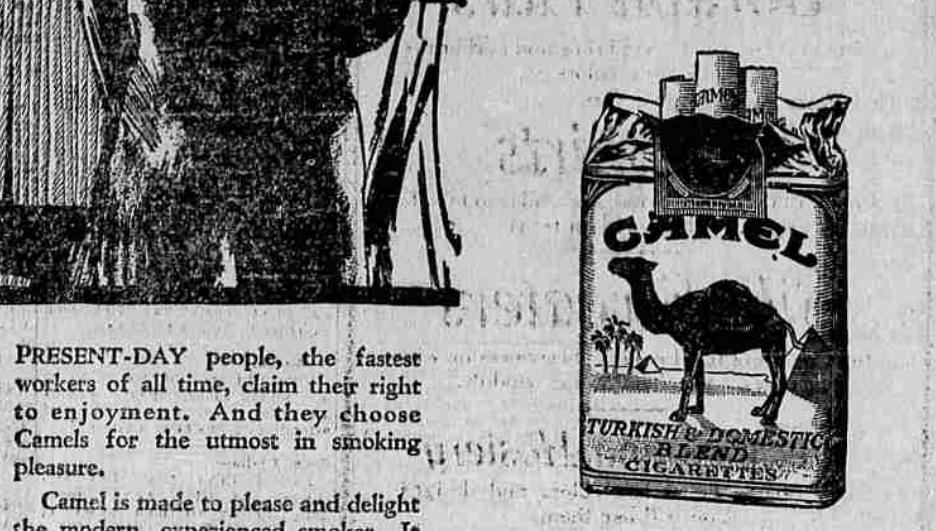

BLUE CLOUDS IN MARTIAN REGION PUZZLE SCIENCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
BERKELEY, Cal., June 28.—The planet Mars supports in its atmosphere blue clouds that defy analysis.
Such was the announcement of W. H. Wright, astronomer at Lick Observatory, who has been experimenting with color photography as an aid to the usual methods of studying the planets.

Wright explained in his report, published by the University of California yesterday, that although observers had noted the varying color of clouds on Mars previously, they had never attributed it to a difference in structure. His latest observations with color screens convinced him, however, that there are two types of clouds in the Martian atmosphere, one probably white, but appearing yellow because of the absorbing effect of the planet's atmosphere, and the blue clouds, which float at a higher altitude.

The yellow or white clouds, Wright styled water vapor clouds similar to those in our own sky. Wright has been unable to determine the exact nature of the blue clouds, but he expressed belief that much of the prominence of the planet's polar caps was due to a blue cloud floating over them.

WM. A. MARSHALL, OF COMPENSATION BOARD, RESIGNS

SALEM, Ore., June 28.—William A. Marshall, member of the state industrial accident commission since its inception in 1913, has submitted his resignation to Governor Patterson and on July 1 will enter the federal service as a deputy commissioner in charge of administering the longshoremen's and harbor worker's compensation act. His headquarters will be in Seattle. The office carries a salary of \$5,200 a year.

The accident commission administers the state workmen's compensation act and has three members, one representing the workers, one the employers and the state at large. Marshall represents the workers and is the only member who has served since the inception of the department. He has had 11 different associates. His present term would have expired January 1, 1928. Marshall left for Seattle last night to obtain quarters.

BUCK AND BILLY SALE SATURDAY QUITE SUCCESSFUL

The buck and billy sale held last Saturday was quite successful, according to reports from the county agent's office, although the prices paid for the various animals did not average as high as had been hoped for. HONEY RECIPE GETS PRIZE

The prize winning fudge recipe at the Watertown, Wis., national honey cooking contest held by the G. B. Lewis company has just been determined, says H. A. Scullen, bee specialist of the Oregon experiment station, as follows:
2 cups granulated sugar, 1 square chocolate, 1 cup cream, butter size of walnut, 1 cup honey, 1 cup milk, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup nuts.
Boil sugar, milk and chocolate for five minutes. Add honey and butter boiled until soft ball forms in cold water. Cool, beat and add nuts and flavoring. Pour on buttered pan and when hard cut in squares.
