Home of her father, Dr. William A. White, widely known all over the world, she was "a bit nervous." She had been informed, she said, that the take-off at Oakland was a "beautiful one," and that weather conditions were very favorable.

The wife of the aviator said she planned to meet her husband on the Pacific coast when he returns to the mainland. She was sure that he would not attempt to fly back.

Coolidge Interested

RAPID CITY, S. D., June 28.—President Coolidge is watching with interest the flight started today by the army aviators for Honolulu and from the experience of Commander John Rodgers of the navy in traveling over this course, he believes they have every reason to expect to reach their objective.

OAKLAND, Cal., June 28.—Immediately following the return of Ernest L. Smith and Charles H. Carter, civilian fliers, to the airport here, ten minutes after their take-off for Honolulu this morning, mechanics labored for over two hours to repair the broken windshield of their plane with one loan-

ed from an army plane. The army wind deflector was to be cut to fit the civilian ship and had to be cut to fit.

When the motor of Smith's plane was started at 11:35 a. m. for a second hop-off, Carter, the navigator, protested against starting the flight at such a late hour. He said it was too late in the day in the first place, and secondly that he did not care to make the trip because the army plane had a lead of over five hours. He said his only desire was to have reached Honolulu first and declared there was little chance of beating the Fokker.

"The army is too far ahead of us now," Carter said to Smith and Moffett. "Let's wait and see what happens to them." He said that when the deflector broke after the hop-off Smith was all for going on regardless and that he had to poke Smith in the back of the neck to attract his attention and make him return to the field.

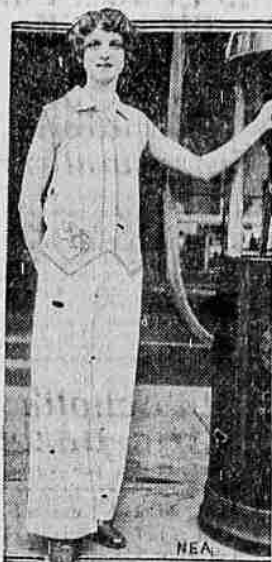
Smith Displays Grief

Moffett later announced that Smith could make the flight if he desired doing so with a new navigator.

Smith left the flying field saying he did not know what he would do. He was driven away in an automobile by a San Francisco woman friend, with his face buried in his hands.

ternoon and evening hours Salem's 18 precincts will today record the lightest vote ever cast at a city or state election.

Only 552 of the \$828 registered voters in the city, less than 10 per cent, had cast their ballots up to 12:30 o'clock, a canvass of all of the polling places revealed. Normally the vote up to the noon hour runs between 15 and 20 per cent.

Grants Pass Vote Light
GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 28.—An exceptionally light vote was being polled here today in the special election. Voting places reported at noon that an extremely small percentage of registered voters had cast their ballots. There were no indications that the vote would be greatly augmented this afternoon.

Lane Voters Apathetic

EUGENE, Ore., June 28.—Voting in Eugene, up to 2 o'clock, was extremely light, with a forecast of not more than a fifty per cent ballot.

Though the weather was perfect for an election day, and many local issues of importance were up, voters seemed to care but little concerning the outcome of the election.

Recall of Sheriff Frank E. Taylor, a re-vote on Eugene's \$500,000 municipal auditorium bond issue, bonds for the construction of a city power plant on the McKenzie river, and bonds for a municipal playground were among the local issues at stake.
