JOHN L. TRAVIS NEW MANAGER OF THE TELEGRAM

PORTLAND, Ore., June 28—
announcement of the selection of
John L. Travis, Portland news-
paperman, as general manager of
the Portland Telegram was made
late yesterday by David Loggren,
attorney representing the purchas-
ers of the paper.
At the time of his selection he
was a member of the editorial staff
of the Oregonian.
Mr. Travis formerly was north-
west editor of the Oregonian, gen-
eral news editor of the Oregon
Journal, and managing editor of
the Seattle Times.
Mr. Travis made the following
statement:

"The Telegram will be run as an
independent Republican news-
paper and it will be the endeavor
of the management to serve its
public fairly and honestly with the
news of the day without color and
without prejudice."

CANTONESE LOSE 30,000 IN WORST REVERSE OF WAR

LONDON, June 28.—A Shanghai
dispatch to the Exchange Tele-
graph says the Chinese nationalists
admit suffering the heaviest re-
verse of the war at Suchowfu,
northwestern Kiangsi province.
Attacked by General Sun
Chuan-fang and his Shantungese,
the nationalists evacuated the city
after four days of fighting in which
they lost 30,000 men, mostly killed,
and retreated 30 miles to Pengfu.

PORTLAND WOMAN SUICIDES AT SEA

SAN PEDRO, Cal., June 28.—A
death leap from the porthole of her
cabin by Miss Cora L. McAtee, 42,
of Portland, Ore., was reported to
harbor authorities here yesterday
by Captain Harry Gries, master of
the Admiral liner Admiral Peabody,
arriving here from Portland.
Her health and despondency were
assigned as the reason for her
daughter's suicide by her mother.

ILL HEALTH NOT TO KEEP GEN. WOOD FROM PHILIPPINES

NEW YORK, June 28.—Major
General Leonard Wood announced
definitely to newspapermen this
afternoon that he would return to
the Philippines as governor gen-
eral, notwithstanding reports to
the contrary.
General Wood, who arrived here
today from the west, where he had
visited President Coolidge at the
summer White House, said he
would remain here until the Fourth
of July, when he expects to go to
Washington.
General Wood was apparently
not well and was assisted from
the train.
