DOC SNELL BEATS TOD MORGAN IN FURIOUS BATTLE

SEATTLE, Wash., June 30.—Under a furious two-handed attack which had him on his feet during the last round, Tod Morgan, Seattle junior lightweight champion of the world, lost a six-round decision to Dynamite Doc Snell of Tacoma in an open-air match here last night. The title was not at stake.

Morgan was dropped three times by Snell, who had been playing the pupil in boxing lessons during the first three rounds of the encounter. Four knockdowns marked the fourth round. Morgan in the aggressive role he had assumed from the first round dropped Snell for a five count just after he had up-set his opponent without a count. Snell returned with a terrific attack, catching Morgan with a sweeping right to the head which sent the champion down for a count of eight. Following up the blow which was the deciding one in the match, Doc dropped Morgan without a count, but kept the champion back away as he drove rights and lefts to the head and body. Morgan was plainly in distress, shaking his head to clear it. The crowd was in a frenzy. Realizing he was slipping, Tod came back in the fifth, matching blow for blow in a cyclonic exchange, but Snell finished stronger. Tod was so nearly out at the end of the round that he continued fighting after the gong had rung, and the referee was forced to pull him off. In the sixth Morgan kept his feet by sheer grit and fighting instinct as he reeled away under an avalanche of blows. Once he was dropped for the count of five, but he got up fighting.

After the fight Snell was carried around the ring by delirious fans while Morgan was being worked over by his frantic handlers. The champion made his way at almost unnoticed from the ring.

PLANE ROARS OVER FRANCE AT 2:45 P. M.

that Byrd set out to explore. The course of the America, at least for the first half of its journey, was bent with all the navigation problems Byrd hoped to solve.

Less than eight hours after the take-off Commander Byrd indicated the purpose of the flight were being achieved. "We think we are getting some scientific data," he said in a radio message picked up at Halifax.

Radio Tells of Progress
From the time the America left Roosevelt field at 5:24 o'clock Eastern daylight time yesterday morning the world followed its progress through frequent bulletins broadcast from the craft.

Greetings and cheery reports were received at the bank of the Trans-Oceanic company, sponsors of the flight, at Roosevelt field, land stations and many ships at sea. Then came terse bulletins that told of the battle against the fog and winds in the northeastern Atlantic.

"Dense fog cover all Newfoundland," the flight commander reported at 6:39 o'clock last night. "Getting above it. Have had bad adverse winds. Impossible to navigate. Can hardly see wing tips. Running into another now."

Less than an hour later Noville flashed: "No time to muck with code now. This radio is hectic job."

"Working our set constantly," another bulletin said. "Hope messages are arriving. Getting plenty cooperation. Thanks for your help."

It was believed that Noville's reference to code meant he was too busy attending to his instrument to look up his pre-arranged code.

The British government radio station at Malla Head, at the northern extremity of Ireland, picked up the America's automatic signals at 2:30 o'clock this morning, Greenwich mean time, or 10:30 p. m. Eastern daylight time last night.

World Kept Informed
In marked contrast to the flights of Nungesser and Coli, Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and Clarence D. Chamberlin, who sacrificed taking radio sets in order to gain space for fuel, the America kept the world informed of its progress in an elaborate cooperative ring that included American broadcasting stations, amateur operators and trans-Atlantic liners.

The America started at a cruising speed of more than 80 miles an hour but apparently arose tail winds at some part of the first stages of the flight brought her speed to between 50 and 100 miles an hour, a rate indicated in the twelve and a half hours required for covering approximately 1400 miles before the plane passed out to see off Newfoundland.

**NEW THEORY GIVEN
ON FATE OF LOST
FRENCH AVIATORS**

NEW YORK, June 30.—Dr. Thomas H. Cusack, surgeon of Brooklyn, today made public a letter from a priest in the parish of Morven, Ireland, which Dr. Cusack believes throws light on the fate of the French fliers—Nungesser and Coli.

The letter was written on May 26 last by the Rev. Father Patrick Madden, who in news dispatches at the time was described as the last person to see the fliers, as they

passed over Ireland. Father Madden's letter described a fight between two hawks and a carrier pigeon which is thought to have been released by the aviators when they realized their plane was not properly functioning.

"You may not have heard that the aviators released a pigeon," said the letter. "It came in over Morven and then two hawks attacked it and brought it down. Some young lads witnessed the fight and rushing up captured the dying pigeon. The message must have been destroyed or lost in the attack, but the rings and rubbers for securing messages still were on the bird."

"My reading of the affair is that the aviators hovered over Tarbert thinking to come down. They chanced a further flight then, and when about 200 miles out they decided to return. They doubtless were going very fast, so they released the pigeon which got back here about two hours after they left."

"Making back to Ireland they fell into the sea about 75 miles off Loop Head. No search was made around here, while valuable time was lost searching the channel and your side. It is all too bad."

INCOME TAX "NO" LESS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—Straggling returns from Tuesday's special election today cut down slightly the majority against the income tax. With 1732 out of 1847 precincts tabulated this afternoon, the count stood: For income tax 46,487; against 54,988, majority against tax 18,501.

Counties which returned majorities for the tax were: Benton, Clackamas, Crook, Gilliam, Hood River, Lane, Lincoln, Linn, Malheur, Polk, Sherman, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Wasco, Washington, Wheeler and Yamhill.

JUDGE LINDSEY OUSTED AFTER 25-YEAR REIGN

DENVER, June 30.—Ben B. Lindsey's long career as judge of the Denver juvenile court which he founded a quarter of a century ago and made famous throughout the world, was interrupted today when a court order officially ousted him, in line with the Colorado supreme court's decision last winter that he was illegally elected in 1924.

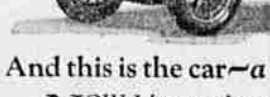
Judge Lindsey, however, will remain in control of the office records until a successor is appointed.

POLITICS HINDERS DRY BUREAU, SAYS FORMER OFFICIAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

NEW YORK, June 30.—Political patronage and not personal efficiency is the keynote in holding a job as prohibition administrator, Major Chester P. Mills, who resigned last week as federal prohibition administrator here, declared today in a formal statement on his resignation.

At the time he characterized the service as diluted with political patronage, Mills was describing a conference at Washington last February. The conference, he said, was attended by "high treasury officials and a political leader of New York." Mills told of being introduced as the "most efficient administrator in the United States." The reply was, he said, "we won't question his efficiency, but let's talk patronage."

The names of those attending the conference were not divulged. At the time he accepted the post as federal administrator, Mills said, the assistant secretary of the treasury assured him there would be no political influence. The assurance did not relieve him of the problem of coping with political leaders "who look upon the prohibition bureau solely from the standpoint of political favor and patronage," he said.

"I have incurred the displeasure of certain political groups by not acceding to all their requests, which I could not do and still administer the law," he added.

TWO IRRIGATION DISTRICTS ASK STATE INVESTIGATION

SALEM, Ore., June 30.—The Warm Springs and the Deschutes irrigation projects have requested the state reclamation commission to make investigations, of these projects as the first step toward reorganization under an act of the 1927 legislature. The commission, at a meeting today, granted the request.

Notwithstanding inability of the Grants Pass and the Summer Lake districts to pay the interest past due on bonds issued by the state to guarantee interest on bonds of the two districts the state will pay the interest on the district bonds as guaranteed. State Treasurer Kay was inclined to hold up the guarantee payment, but the board today voted the other course.

TRUSTEE IN BANKRUPTCY SUES FOR ACCOUNTING

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—Lloyd J. Wentworth, trustee of the Wheeler-Olmstead company, today filed suit in federal court against F. Hill Hunter, the Lumbermans Trust company and Burt E. Hawkins, sheriff of Klamath county, asking that Hunter, reputed holder of mortgages and liens against the concern, an adjudicated bankrupt, be directed by the court to give an accounting of amounts allegedly in his possession, and asking also that certain mortgages be declared void. Wentworth claims in his petition that Hunter attempted to purchase various conditional sales contracts and other secured claims against the company, before it went into bankruptcy.
