TILDEN DEFEATED IN LAST MATCH; HELEN WILLS WINS

WIMBLEDON, England, June 30.—Henri Cochet of France in a great uphill battle eliminated William T. Tilden of the United States today from the singles of the Wimbledon lawn tennis championships. Cochet took the match in the semi-finals at 2-6, 4-6, 7-5, 6-4, 6-3.
Cochet's victory made certain an all-French final, Rene Lacoste and Jean Borotra being the other semi-finalists.
Miss Helen Wills, former American champion, reached the finals of the women's singles by a straight set victory over Jean Frye of England at 6-3, 6-1.
In the match for the title she will play Senorita De Alvarez of Spain, who defeated Miss Elizabeth Ryan of the United States in the other women's semi-final today, at 2-6, 6-0, 6-4.

GRINDS PLATE GLASS TO MAKE TELESCOPE

FREMONT, Neb., June 30.—With a section of stovepipe and a piece of plate glass, Gilbert Luenig, a student at Midland college, has made a powerful telescope.
It took him ten months. He fashioned the glass into a parabolic mirror, the most important part of the instrument, by more than a hundred hours of grinding, polishing and figuring. In the final polishing he used, by hand, irregularities of less than one one-hundredth of an inch.
He took a piece of 10-inch stove pipe and painted it black and white to make the barrel of the telescope. Except for a right-angle prism and

an eye-piece, the whole instrument is hand made.
The device has a magnifying power of 90 diameters—strong enough to enable its maker to study four satellites of Jupiter, the crescent of Venus, the rings of Saturn, the Orion nebula and the topography of the moon.

METHODIST CHURCH HAVEN FOR HEAT SUFFERERS

CHICAGO, June 30.—Grace Methodist Episcopal church was opened to refugees from the heat here today.
The extremely thick walls of the church, some of them 36 inches, were said to provide such thorough insulation that the temperature inside was twenty degrees cooler than the outside air.
Chicago's temperature at 9 a. m. was 84 degrees, as against a stifling reading of 80 yesterday, when the heat, intensified by a high humidity, rose to a record of 93.6.

FIGHT OF RED CROSS IN FLOOD AREA IS TOLD

A graphic account of how a Red Cross concentration camp in Louisiana sheltering 19,000 refugees was whipped into shape in less than two weeks is given by Ernest P. Krick of San Francisco, one of the few persons sent from the Pacific Coast to the Mississippi flood area. Mr. Krick was released from his duties as Red Cross Field Director at Letterman General Hospital, Presidio of San Francisco, to serve in the disaster. A recent letter from him, received through the local Red Cross chapter, gives a vivid picture of the work being carried on at Lafayette, La.

"During the early days the transportation department had over 300 trucks operating. They were bringing refugees in at the rate of 400 per hour. You will realize what a job it was to register and keep moving that number of people. That rate of registration kept up for two days. At the present time we have registered over 19,000 people, white and black.

"Livestock is harder to handle than people—to date we have handled over 10,000 horses, cows and mules, 7000 hogs, and no one knows how many chickens, cows, horses and mules were registered with tall tags and hogs by ear tags. Chickens have all been sold as we had no way of caring for them. Some hogs were sold—the remaining number is scattered in pens. The cattle have been shipped to various points west for keeping in pastures. When horses, cows, mules, pigs and chickens pour in on you by the thousands you will realize that you have some job on your hands.

"The getting back to the proper owners all this livestock will be a terrific problem; we have as yet not even begun to try to solve this problem. We wired towns west of here for miles for cowboys—the towns responded wonderfully. They came by the carload. When the first group arrived our morale went up 75 per cent as we knew that with trained cattlemen the stock situation would be much relieved, which it has been. We are now branding all cattle with a Red Cross so as to designate it to be refugee cattle, and thus prevent a lot of cattle rustling.

"The feeding problem was a hard one. You can realize the magnitude of the task when you start with nothing and whip into shape means with which to feed 19,000 people within a period of two weeks. Sandwiches and coffee were the main diet for several days.

"We now have in operation 3 mess halls, each with a capacity of 6500. It requires 4 hours to serve each meal. The menu is good.

"Housing in the beginning was difficult, due to the fact that we did not have sufficient tentage. To tide us over we had to construct barracks. With housing comes the job of water lines, electric lines, roads and drainage. The country is very flat so drainage has been a problem.

"Two weeks ago last Sunday we had a terrific rain—over 8 inches fell within 18 hours. This rain practically ruined us as it flooded our entire white camp. We had to move into town every single family and place them wherever we could. We had to put them into stables, lumber sheds, warehouses, and in fact any place that had a roof on it. As the result of this rain our camp was under 8 inches of water. We drained the camp in less than two days, so we then moved everyone back into camp. Feeding these people while they were scattered all over town was a job in itself.

"The people here have responded nobly—men as well as women worked 16 hours at a stretch without a wink of sleep. I have seen men with my own eyes who had been working in the water day after day without a chance, without sleep or rest. They have come to the medical department with blood oozing from their feet as the result of being in the water for days. In the beginning our staff worked 18 or 14 hours a day, often with only one meal in 12 hours. We are gradually getting back now to a more normal schedule."

JUDGE LINDSEY OUSTED AFTER 25-YEAR REIGN

DENVER, June 30.—Bon B. Lindsey's long career as judge of the Denver juvenile court which he founded a quarter of a century ago and made famous throughout the world, was interrupted today when a court order officially ousted him. In line with the Colorado supreme court's decision last winter that he was illegally elected in 1924, Judge Lindsey, however, will remain in control of the office records until a successor is appointed.

The vacancy is expected to be filled Tuesday by the appointment of Robert W. Steele, attorney, although there is a slight possibility that Judge Lindsey will be appointed to succeed himself. If he is not, he probably again will be candidate at a special election later in the year.

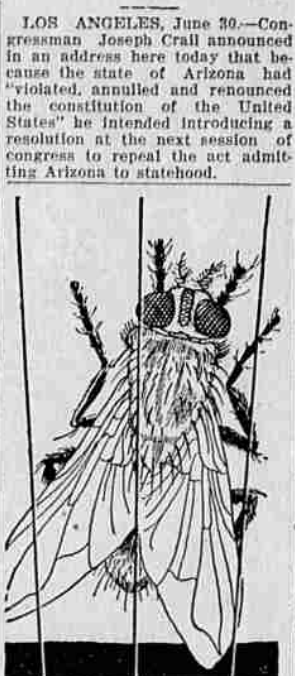

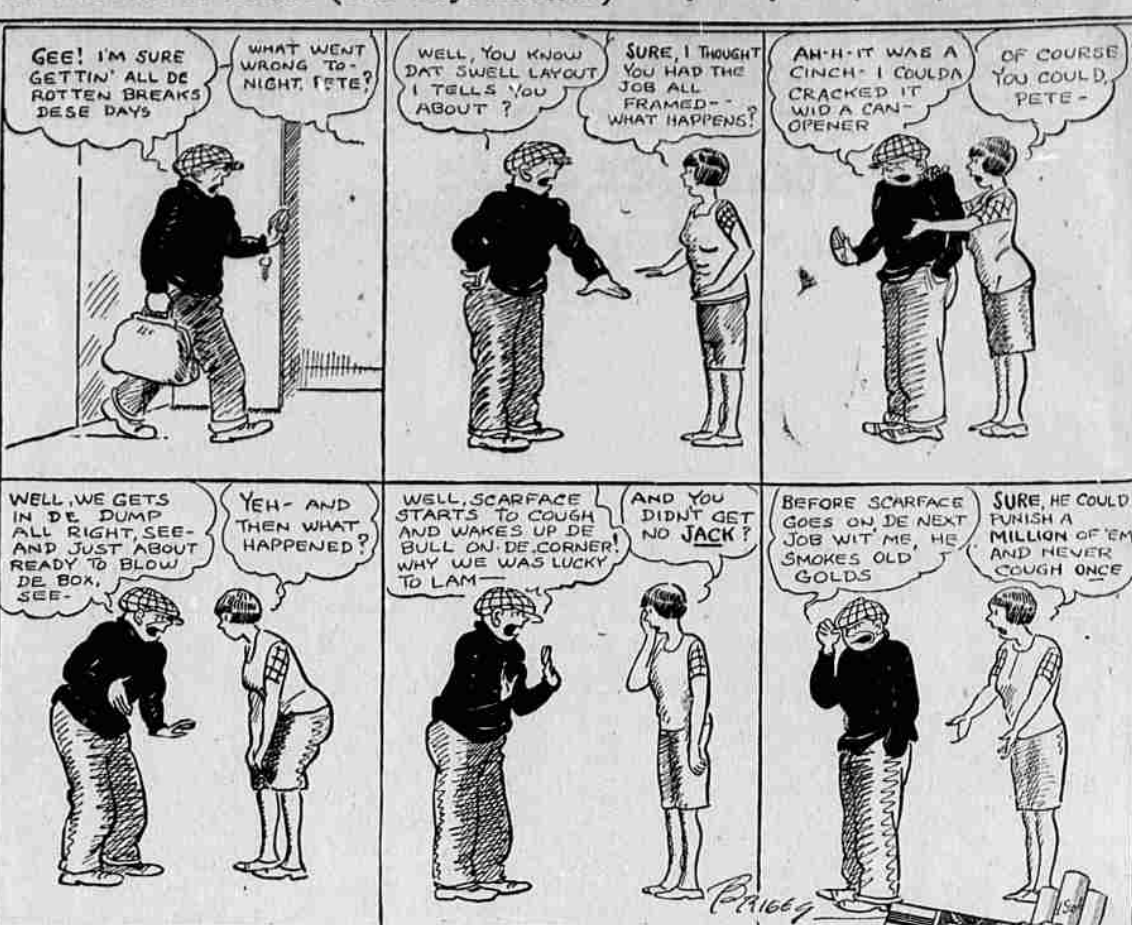

STATE GIVEN HIGH PRAISE BY VISITORS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—Western Oregon received high praise from twenty farmers from Iowa, North and South Dakota and Minnesota when the spent the week visiting points of interest. The group, brought west by the Northern Pacific railway, under the direction of H. W. Hyerly, general immigration agent, were filled with enthusiasm after they had been showered with hospitality by the commercial organizations throughout the Willamette Valley and the lower Columbia region.

Accompanied by T. F. Lang and L. E. Lowe, of the Northern Pacific railway, and representatives of the Land Settlement Department of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce and the Portland Chamber, the midwestern farmers were taken by the Washington county delegation to Beaverton where they visited Johnson's onion farm; thence to Hillsboro, stopping at Hire's alfalfa farm and the Ray Maling Cannery. At Forest Grove, Behrman's dairy and Hrick's strawberry farm as well as walnut and prune orchards attracted the visitors. Bates' combination dairy and poultry farm at Gaston received a visit.

An outstanding event of the caravan trip was a display hastily arranged at the Yamhill Chamber of Commerce, giving a remarkable exhibition of products. Here local farmers were on hand to greet the visitors, furnish information and extend a welcome.

Other stops in Yamhill county were made at McMinnville where Chamber of Commerce representatives took the party through the condensary, creamery and city park. A drive through the Bellevue section convinced the midwesterners that Oregon has splendid grain fields. Walnut orchards were visited at Monmouth.

The Corvallis delegation met the party at Independence, taking them through diversified farms of Benton county, visiting Hanson's poultry farm, and the Oregon Agricultural College grounds. After a bounteous dinner, Corvallis business men drove their guests to Eugene where the party was kept for the night.

Lane county garden and truck farms and Dorris' filbert orchard made a great appeal to the home-seekers who also visited Gent Brothers poultry farm and Thompson's dairy.

At Harrisburg a group of Albany business men met the party and took them to Albany for a luncheon, out to Lebanon, visiting Arnold's poultry ranch, and back through Tennessee flats and the forks of the Santiam to Jefferson.

In Marion county the party marveled at the great cherry and prune orchards and prosperous farms on every hand. They were taken to Howell Prairie, Mt. Angel and back to Woodburn whence they proceeded to Portland Friday evening in anticipation of

their trip to the lower Columbia on Saturday and Sunday.

A few dairymen were in the group and they were especially interested in the dyked lands near Clatskanie, Brownsmead and Astoria. They were astounded at the remarkable growth of potatoes, beans, and other vegetables in that district, and at the yield of seed flax some men have obtained there. They enjoyed viewing the cranberry marshes which they had never seen before.

Representing fifteen different communities, these touring farmers will do much to advertise the attractiveness of the Willamette Valley and other Western Oregon lands. Several have indicated their intention of staying here permanently and have scattered in various sections of the valley to choose homesteads. Others will remain for a time before returning to their homes in the midwest in anticipation of arranging their affairs there in order that they may come west again in the fall to remain.

LARGE PART OF WORLD WEARS AMERICAN HOSE

WASHINGTON, June 30.—An increasingly large and, presumably, important part of the world's population is wearing American hosiery.

Styles and colors favored in the United States are taking the fancy of more and more feminine purchasers abroad. The popularity of the American exports, the Commerce Department learns, is increasing throughout the world, rising last year to a total of 6,956,737 dozen pairs valued at \$22,111,259.

Though it may seem incredible, 68 per cent of the hosiery exported was the cotton variety, as compared with 14 per cent made of silk. The cotton hose represented only 38 per cent of the total value, however, whereas the silk accounted for 41 per cent.
