FOG AND COMPASS PREVENTED LAND-ING BYRD SAYS

a great crowd was present in spite of inclement weather.

Elements Win in End

LONDON, July 1.—Commander Byrd was completely lost in continuous dense rain clouds from the moment he left the French coast at Brest last night in his effort to find Paris, says a vivid story quoted in the Evening News by its Cherbourg correspondent.

Telling of the all-night battle of the America in a rainstorm which ended with a cold plunge at 5 o'clock this morning in the sea at Ver-sur-Mer, a tiny French bathing resort, Commander Byrd was quoted as saying:

"I hoped to be able to find my way to Le Bourget by wireless and at one time, about 2:30 a. m., I must have passed very near Paris. All the way we were fighting our way through a blanket of mist and rain and couldn't see 50 feet ahead."

"We must have flown in circles for the next wireless call of which I picked up a fragment showed that we were somewhere near Havre."

"We went on, hoping for a rift in the clouds through which we might see land when day came. But we were running terribly short of gasoline. At 5 o'clock this morning there was nothing left but to come down and trust to luck. We did so and had a cold sea bath."

Commander Byrd also was quoted as saying that his wireless apparatus failed to pick up land signals and that his compass was completely out of order.

Much of Data Lost

VER-SUR-MER, France, July 1.—Much of the scientific data obtained by Commander Richard E. Byrd on his trans-Atlantic flight was lost in the sudden flooding of the America early this morning when it descended into the sea here. Commanded Byrd this afternoon expressed the keenest disappointment at the loss.

Four Going to Paris

PARIS, July 1.—Commander Richard E. Byrd and his companions will leave Ver-sur-Mer for Paris this evening and will arrive here about midnight. H. A. Gibbons, personal representative of Rodman Wanamaker, sponsor of the flight, telegraphed his wife here late today.

Mr. Gibbons who went to Ver-sur-Mer as soon as word had been received of the landing of the aviators there, notified his wife that he would accompany the American aviators.

19 Hours in Darkness

VER-SUR-MER, France, July 1.—Here is Commander Byrd's story of his trans-Atlantic flight, as he related it to J. E. Angley, staff correspondent of The Associated Press.

"We had fairly good weather during the first part of the flight off the American coast and kept up good speed, even at the start, when our load was extremely heavy."

"From the time we sighted Newfoundland until we had nearly reached Europe we saw no land or sea. The America being always in a fog which at times was so thick we could barely see as far as the tips of the wings."

"We had nineteen hours of high, dense fogs and clouds. It may have been clear on the surface at times, but it would have been impossible to go up and down continuously, seeking clearer weather, instead of getting on with the flight."

"Of course, that was a terrible experience. Imagine not seeing anything at all for nineteen hours! We were unable to make our departure from St. John's as we could not see Newfoundland at all because of the fog with which the whole country was covered."

"After nineteen hours of that we managed, by very good luck, to locate ourselves on coming out of it and reached the French coast at Finistere. I don't know exactly what time it was, for I've lost my charts and cost of my records, but it was before sundown, and we had made very good speed."

"We first got in the fog about 4 o'clock (Wednesday afternoon). New York daylight saving time, and continued in it until 11 o'clock yesterday morning."

"At Finistere, we set our course for Paris. Not long after we left Finistere darkness fell. Naturally, we then followed the compass course, having used it satisfactorily for a thousand miles."

MINISTER'S SON IS STRUCK BY MACHINE

Making the Swimming Pool Safe

Swimming pool sanitation has assumed importance with the recognition of the danger of swimming in polluted water and with the ever-increasing number of swimming pools in this state. According to a conservative estimate, there are upward of two hundred swimming pools in the state of Oregon.

Swimming pools are nothing more or less than common bath tubs. Although the swimming pool was designed to improve hygienic conditions, it may become a hygienic menace. Swimming pools are seriously contaminated from the bodies of users, even when the greatest care is taken to insure that bathers are free from diseases and cleansing baths are taken before entrance into pools. Epidemic of acute colds among users of pools of swimming pools are not uncommon and this infection is due to bathing in contaminated water.

Eye, ear, nose, and throat infections frequently occur, and intestinal infections are transmissible through swimming pools.

It is obvious that the swimming pool presents a problem in public health. If each individual could have a private pool for his sole use, with a constant inflowing stream of pure water, swimming pool purification would be unnecessary. But just as soon as the pool is used by others a health problem is presented, for the contamination of one bather pollutes the entire pool and comes in contact with every other bather. In a public swimming pool the opportunity for disseminating infectious material from ill persons, and especially from ill persons who are apparently well, to those who are

healthy is always present.

Swimming pools require good design to insure proper sanitation. The floor surrounding the pool should be constructed of material impervious to water and so arranged that all water will drain into the pool. The cleanliness of the tank should be insured by the construction of a trough at the edges to afford a place for expectoration and to prevent dirt from draining into the pool. The tank should be large—about four hundred gallons of water per bather are needed. Water in the pool should at all times be sufficiently transparent to enable a person standing by the side of the pool to see the bottom distinctly.

Filtration seems to be a necessity in swimming pools as it is next to impossible to insure the purity of the water of a swimming pool by changing the water daily or weekly. A properly operated filter will remove all of the dirt, color, turbidity, and suspended material from the water and will deliver a clear, sparkling water to the pool. Filtration is an economical procedure when the water must be heated and is an excellent sanitary measure.

The bathers are constantly introducing pollution and occasional infection should also be continuous. If clarification and disinfection are properly conducted, swimming pools can be made reasonably safe. Swimming is one of the best and most exhilarating forms of exercise, and as swimming pool water is essentially drinking water it should measure up to the same standards.

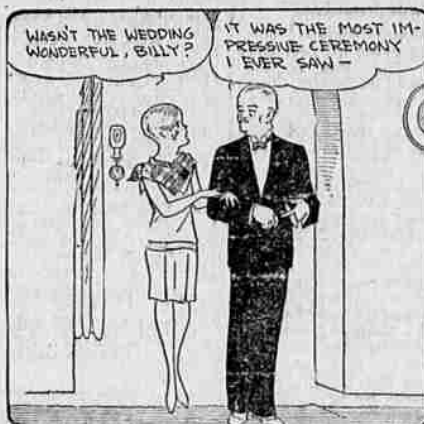
