U. S. TREASURY SURPLUS BIGGEST IN ITS HISTORY

Public Debt Decreased 611
Million, Still Leaving
Balance for Later
Application.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The treasury surplus for the fiscal year which ended at midnight last night was \$635,899,921.70, the greatest in history.

Total ordinary receipts for the year were \$4,129,394,441.10 and the cost of operating the government chargeable against such receipts was \$3,493,494,519.40.

This particular surplus will have been dissipated, however, before congress meets to draft a new tax bill, and any reduction must be based on estimates of the surplus.

WOMAN TOURIST SERIOUSLY HURT IN AUTO WRECK

Mr. and Mrs. Peter C. Wells of Turlock, Calif., were seriously injured this afternoon in an auto wreck about one mile north of Roseburg. They were traveling south and started around a car driven by Paul Moore of Eugene. The Wells car struck the front end of Mr. Moore's machine, skidding across the road directly in front of an oncoming freight truck. The huge truck demolished the Wells car and both of the passengers were badly injured, particularly Mrs. Wells, a middle-aged lady, sustained a badly crushed face, broken thigh, and numerous bruises and cuts and is suffering from shock. Her husband received a crushed chest and probable internal injuries. They were rushed to the office of Dr. E. B. Stewart where their injuries were given attention and they were then removed to Mercy hospital.

WOODCUTTER INJURED

The tongue of the wagon broke throwing him from his seat so that he fell upon his hip, fracturing the bone at the joint. He was removed to his cabin and Dr. Stewart called to attend him. He was brought to Roseburg today for an x-ray examination and was removed to the county hospital.

FOR THE CURRENT YEARS.

Of the total excess, \$611,999,000 already has been applied to retirement of the public debt, the treasury announced. Part of the remaining \$24,000,500 has been carried over as an increase in the net balance in the general fund and will be used for debt retirement purposes.

"More than one-half of the surplus of \$635,899,921.70 is due to receipts on account of shipment of capital assets, back tax collections in excess of tax refunds and other items of a fast disappearing or non-recurring character," Acting Secretary Mills said. "It will be apparent, therefore, that without these special and non-recurring items which aggregate \$379,999,999 the surplus would have been about \$255,900,000, of which a considerable part is to be attributed to decrease in expenditures some of which represent a postponement rather than actual savings."

It was also asserted that the total expenditures chargeable against ordinary receipts were \$159,000,000 less than treasury estimates. The difference was accounted for by the postponement of \$39,000,000 of expenditures because of the failure of the second deficiency bill, a \$35,000,000 decrease in tax refund due to change in the revenue law, reduction of expenditures and other items.

HEAT WAVE'S END NEAR AFTER HEAVY TOLL IS EXACTED

CHICAGO, July 1.—The three-day total of heat deaths in Chicago was raised to 24 today when the coroner's office reported three women had died when heat aggravated illness of long standing.

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The break will occur in most of the Middle West today, said the Chicago meteorologist, and in the lake region and lower Ohio valley by tonight or tomorrow. Although the weather bureau does not make predictions more than 48 hours in advance, it indicated the prospect of fair weather and moderate temperatures over the greater portion of the Middle West at least for Saturday and Sunday.

Thunderstorms will shatter the hot spell, the prognosticators announced. Since Wednesday evening, thunder showers have occurred almost generally in the Rocky mountain region, the northern and central great plains area, and thence eastward into Minnesota.

Northwestern Canadian provinces also have felt the cooling fall of rain, while in the near northwest temperature collapses of as much as 24 degrees took place last night.

Phoenix, Ariz., was again the hot spot of the nation yesterday, as it was on Wednesday but it divided honors with Fresno, California. In both places maximum temperatures of 100 degrees prevailed.

Most of the country had its death toll, either from prostrations, heat-stunned heart disease or drownings. In Ohio the death list for the two days of the hot wave was 19. In Chicago alone 21 deaths during the past 48 hours were ascribed directly to the heat.

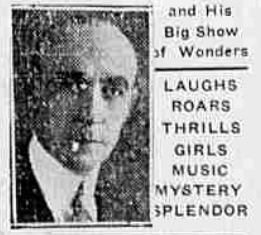
