WAFFLES

Plain or Chocolate

A Tested Recipe

2 cups pastry flour 2 eggs
3 teaspoons baking powder 1 1/2 cups milk
1 tablespoon sugar 2 tablespoons Crisco

YOUNG COUGAR KILLS CHICKENS

A yearling cougar was killed by Perry Edwards, North Myrtle farmer, Sunday afternoon, says the Myrtle Creek Mail. The animal entered the poultry house Saturday night and slaughtered approximately 220 fine young pullets which Mr. Edwards had selected for egg production next fall and winter. The varmint entered the poultry house where only a burp covering was used to protect the fowls from intruders. After killing and eating what was desired the animal apparently slaughtered the remainder of the fowls within reach just for the lust of killing. The loss of the fowls was discovered Sunday morning, but thinking it had been the work of skunks Mr. Edwards left the carcasses in the poultry house, purposing when evening came to poison some of the fowls and thus get rid of the skunks. When he returned home from Sunday School in the afternoon he found that the intruder was a cougar and that it was back for more chickens. The family dog soon had the varmint up a tree and its appetite for chicken was quickly ended by a rifle bullet which Mr. Edwards annoyingly sped through its head.

Mr. Edwards brought the animal to town and will subsequently receive a bounty from the county and state, which will, however, meagerly recompense him for the loss of the lot of valuable young pullets, which under normal conditions would have added some \$400 to the farm income within the coming year.

DEMPSEY NEARS WHAT HE BELIEVES OLD-TIME POWER

SARATOGA LAKE, N. Y., July 5.—Jack Dempsey is satisfied he will again be the devastating body puncher of pre-champion days when he touches gloves with Jack Sharkey at the clang of the opening gong on the night of July 21.

Based in mind by the rugged training drill that has kept him physically active since the suicide of John Dempsey, his brother, Jack is certain that he can and will regain the sledge-like hammering power that carried him to the world heavyweight championship over Jess Willard's punch-slashed bulk on the Fourth of July eight years ago.

In training Jack surprised critics during early workouts when he chose to sacrifice development of speed for temporary display of socking power. The weaving attack of the former titleholder slowly is developing a fast, head bowed charge that carries him thru a hail of straight punches into close quarters, where he slams away effectively with both hands to the body.

For the time being, however, Dempsey will confine work to paring down his weight, now about 201 pounds, shortening punches, and improving the speed of his attack.

Working out yesterday, for the first time under an official object of Manager Leo P. Flynn, harrying all but newspapermen from the boxing session for duration of the stay here, Dempsey stepped six fast rounds, displaying excellent wind and stamina for this time in the training period. For three of the 18 minutes, Jack bobbed about the ring against Dave Shadd, weaving California middleweight, and found little trouble equaling the coast boy's best efforts.
