Touring Car Damaged

Newell of Myrtle Creek was badly damaged, the top of the windshield being broken and the body dented when the machine went off the highway between Oakland and Sutherlin into a culvert at about 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. The car was brought to the Ford garage in Roseburg for repairs.

Accompanying Martin Thompson on a drive toward the Country Club Ed Noah was thrown from the car when it hit the rock gravel on the road about three miles west of town and suffered a broken left arm near the shoulder yesterday. It seems that Mr. Thompson was trying out the car, and invited Noah to go along. Also in the car was a young son of Jas. Draper. The motor not working just right, Thompson got out to inspect it, the Draper lad taking the wheel, and when the boy started the car it went into the ditch, throwing Noah out. The broken arm was set, but it being near the shoulder, it will be some time before it will mend.

Custer Suicide Tale Is Declared "Bunk"

General Godfrey, Who Examined
Corpses on Battlefield,
Describes Wounds

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The controversy over the manner of Major General George A. Custer's death in the battle of Little Big Horn 51 years ago raises no question in the mind of Brigadier General Edward S. Godfrey, retired.

General Godfrey, who lives at Cookstown, N. J., took part in the battle as a first lieutenant of K troop with Capt. F. W. Hendon's battalion, which went to the rescue of Major Marcus A. Reno's detachment.

Writing in the Cavalry Journal, he describes as "bunk" the statements recently published that Custer, finding himself the only survivor of his detachment, took his own life.

"Some of the statements of these 'suicide mongers' sound like camp gossip or rumors that are bandied about and then accepted by some credulous persons as facts," he says. "In a book which, I think, is entitled, 'The North American Indian,' the author made a statement to the effect that 'Indians never scalped a suicide.' Since then some of these sensational writers have used that statement as a basis for their dramatic stories."

Questioning Chief Gall, one of the Indian leaders in the battle, as to the reason Custer was not scalped, General Godfrey says the famous Sioux told him he "did not know, unless it was because he (Custer) was the Big Chief and that they respected his rank and his bravery."

Godfrey, himself, under orders from Major Reno to help identify the dead on Custer Hill after the battle, recalls that "the first body I was taken to was that of General Custer."

"I examined it carefully," he relates. "There were two bullet wounds, one in the left breast and the other in the left temple, either of which, it seemed to me, would have been fatal. There was surprisingly little blood on his person from either wound; there were no powder marks on his person nor any signs of mutilation."

Sundae's Birthplace in Ithaca Is Sold

Conversation Between Preacher
and Druggist Originated
Popular Confection.

ITHACA, N. Y., June 30.—The birthplace of the sundae has been sold, and with its sale the owner of the building has brought to light again its story.

It happened one hot summer day in Ithaca in 1891. It was the habit of a young clergyman to drop into a drugstore after the sermon for a dish of ice cream. But this Sunday, ice cream lacked its usual appeal and he hesitated when C. C. Platte, the proprietor, asked, "What'll it be?"

"How about a soda water?" Platte suggested.

The young minister did not want that either, but he thought himself to combine the two.

"Let me have a dish of ice cream with some of that soda syrup on it," he said. "Make it cherry."

So the sundae originated. The young minister was delighted, but the child of his brain lacked a name.

"Why not call it a 'Sunday'?" asked the preacher. And "sunday" it became, corrupted into "sundae." Cornell students, scattering, spread the idea and the word finally found its way into dictionaries.
