OPERA BE GIVEN IN CONNECTION BUYER'S WEEK

SEATTLE, July 6.—Ranking as the most attractive and comprehensive show window of wares manufactured and jobbed in the Pacific Northwest ever presented in the history of this section, the fifteenth annual Pacific Northwest Merchants' Exposition will be staged in the spacious Smith Cove port terminals during the week of August 8-13.
