The Chicago Cubs were leading the national league by a single percentage point this morning, having defeated the Pirates.

The Cubs' 2 to 1 victory over the Buccaneers which gave them the edge yesterday, came after a pitchers' battle well worthy of the two top teams it brought together.

In another hard fought battle between keen rivals, the Brooklyn

Robins defeated the New York Giants, 3 to 2 and threatened to push them out of fourth place.

Hard hitting gave the St. Louis Cardinals a 12 to 1 decision over Boston and the Cincinnati Reds a 11 to 4 victory over the Phillies.

More hard walling appeared in the Detroit-St. Louis game, the only contest carded in the American league. Fourteen Tiger hits to 13 for the St. Louis club gave Detroit the edge and the game 9 to 6.

Great Forest Fire Set to Make Screen Thrill

A forest fire of such dangerous dimensions, that the entire local fire departments were present to keep it in check, provides the big scene of "Flames," a moving picture feature which is to be shown at the Liberty Theatre today.

Archaic Blue Laws

A decision of the supreme court of Pennsylvania, on a professional baseball case, has upheld the validity of a Sunday blue law of 1794.
