(Associated Press Special Wire) SARATOGA LAKE, N. Y., July 12.—Jack Dempsey has been up to something at his cottage very deep in the woods—a rifle from the lake shore training headquarters—and now the secret is out.

Every morning Dave Shade, Jack's middleweight pal, from California, steals from the camp just after dawn and meets Jack in the hay field back of the cottage. There, with Trainer Jerry Lavada, the pair hold a secret workout for 30 minutes before Jack takes to the road for a five mile run.

formed a "pool" to pay back \$155,000 he had borrowed from the Kentland bank and a similar amount borrowed from the state board of agriculture.

Meeting with creditors here he insisted that he had assets of \$5,223,000 and listed liabilities of \$2,650,000. A Marion county (Indiana) grand jury indicted him, however, on charges of forgery, embezzlement, and larceny. A jury disagreed and after he was tried in federal court the county writ was dismissed.

McCray refused to listen to pleas that he resign as governor, withholding that action until the day he was found guilty in federal court, on April 24, 1924. He was sentenced to ten years in prison and fined \$10,000.

STILL Has Two Homes His thousands of acres of farm land over the country are going to satisfy his creditors. Scattered also is the herd of more than 600 Hereford cattle, once called the finest in the country. Only his family home at Kentland, and — it is understood — a summer home in Michigan are left to him.

McCray was 62 in 1927. His physical condition was reported poor soon after his confinement, but he was widely respected by prison officials and inmates. He edited the prison newspaper and taught a Sunday class.

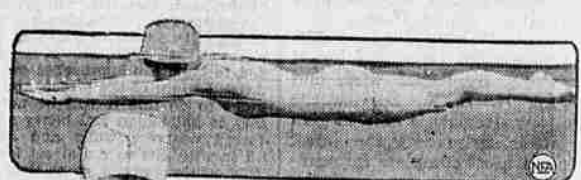
