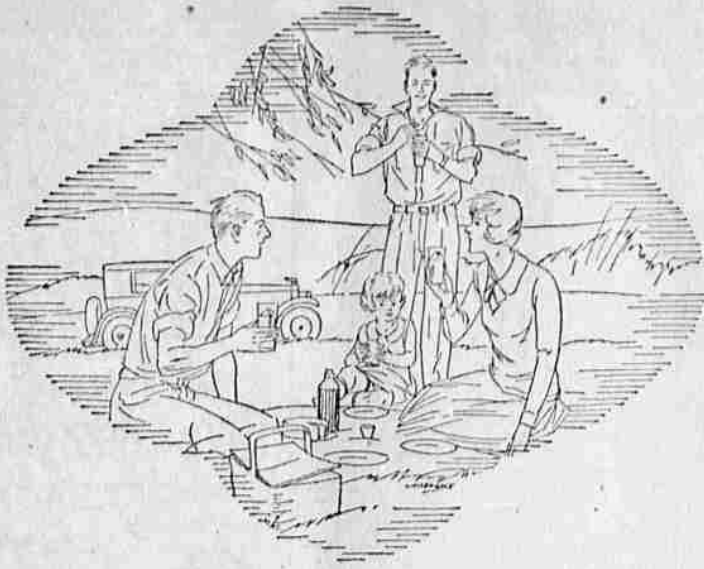

CORN CROP TO BE SMALLEST IN YEARS

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Details by status of the condition and acreage of the corn crop, forecast by the Department of Agriculture as the shortest in 26 years, were issued today.

The indicated corn crop is placed at 2,274,424,000 bushels; winter wheat crop at 579,416,000 bushels, and the spring wheat crop at 274,218,000 bushels.

The problem of the great mortality among wild fowl in our western states, which has puzzled biologists and sportsmen for a number of years, is to receive renewed and intensified study during the present season by the Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture.

be the cause at Great Salt Lake, Utah, and at some other western points, bird mortality has been encountered in other localities where the cause has not been definitely determined. For instance, it is not known to what extent alkal poisoning has resulted in the death of many thousands of wild ducks and other birds at Lake Lake, Calif., the Government Stamp at Klamath Lake, Ore., and at Malheur Lake, Oregon.

Naturally, intensive study of the disease must be confined to the few localities where there is likelihood of great mortality. It is highly essential, however, for a full understanding of the problem that all possible information concerning outbreaks, even though limited in extent, be assembled.

NEW STATE OFFICE BUILDING ACT IS DECLARED INVALID

Law of the state. * * * We hold the statute in question to be unconstitutional.

RAILWAY TERMINAL WORK AT KLAMATH STARTS AT ONCE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 12.—Development of railway terminal at Klamath Falls will be begun at once under the direction of L. C. Gilman, executive vice president of the Great Northern railway.

Mr. Gilman accompanied the Great Northern president from Seattle, and will make his headquarters here during the preliminary stages of the Great Northern's expansion in central Oregon.

The Great Northern also plans on developing its own terminals at Bend. While the site has not definitely been chosen, one that is known to be under consideration is along the Shevlin-Hixon railway, about a mile south of Bend.

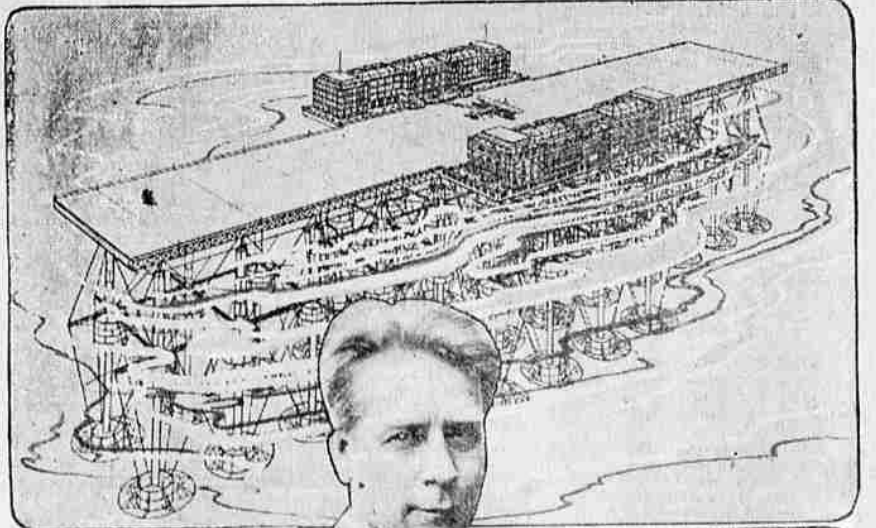

NOW TO BUILD MID-OCEAN AIRPORTS

Engineer Prepares to Test His Plan For Floating Landing Fields, Hangars, Hotels, Etc.

WILMINGTON, Del., July 12.—Within the next two years we ought to have a good commercial air passenger service between the United States and Europe, and five years from now the big ocean liners may be reduced to carrying cargo, according to Edward A. Armstrong, inventor of the seadrome.



The seadrome of the future, providing an ocean landing place for airplanes, as Engineer Armstrong conceives it is shown in the upper picture. The buildings would be for hotels, hangars, and gasoline storage.



Armstrong, who is one of the head engineers of the I. E. Dupont de Nemours & Co., in Wilmington, Del., estimated cost of the seadromes at approximately \$1,500,000 apiece.
